POLICY BACKGROUND

This policy documents the procedures and rules involved in conducting Junior & Youth matches controlled by the WAFC. The various sections of this policy have been divided up into the following sub-procedures for ease of access and editing:

WAFC POL.13A Match Operations Policy: Ground Preparation

POLICY BACKGROUND

This policy documents the procedures involved in preparing the ground for Junior & Youth Football matches controlled by the WAFC. Each team shall be responsible for following this policy at its home games. Where a game is allocated to a neutral venue, the WAFC shall nominate a home team which shall be responsible for all provisions as if the game were being played on the home ground of that team. The WAFC will have final discretion for use of all competitions.

1 a	The ground shall be marked in accordance with the Laws of Australian Football, which shall include a spectator line at least two metres outside the boundary line and six metres behind the goals.



WAFC POL.13B Match Operations Policy: Team Sheets

POLICY BACKGROUND

This policy documents the procedures involved in submitting Team Sheets for Junior & Youth Football matches controlled by the WAFC. All competing teams shall ensure all players, coaches and team officials representing the team for any given match are included on the team sheet in the WAFC approved Registration System. Each team shall be responsible for following this policy at all games.

1. TEA	1. TEAM SHEETS				
1a	Each competing team shall provide WAFC approved team sheets for each match.				
1b	All players' jumper numbers shall be displayed on the team sheet.				
1c	Players may only enter the field of play if they are listed on the team sheet and in attendance at the game.				
1d	A player can only be listed on the team sheet if they enter the field of play.				
1e	Late arriving players cannot take to the field until presented to the umpires at the next break between quarters. Late arriving players shall not enter the playing field after half time.				
1f	Late arriving players must be presented to the umpire before the start of the third quarter to be eligible to play.

This document outlines the duration of Junior & Youth matches controlled by the WAFC, including the length of time between quarters and any rules surrounding time on/extra time.

POLICY BACKGROUND

This document outlines the Game Day Player Even Up Rules and Field Positions that are to be enforced in all Junior & Youth Football matches controlled by the WAFC. The Even Up rule is in place to ensure both teams have equal numbers on the field while maximising participants' playing time and shall be applied to all home and away matches. Criteria for finals are explained below in 2a.

Field positions are detailed in the Junior Bylaws and are in place to maximise game flow and opportunities for players to touch the ball, whilst developing skills in decision making.

WAFC POL.13E Match Operations Policy: Send Off Rule

POLICY BACKGROUND

This document outlines the Send Off Rule that is to be applied in all Junior & Youth Football matches controlled by the WAFC. The Send Off Rule is in place to positively address the Game Day Environment in Junior Football

	(OLES			
1. G	ENERAL			
1 a	Umpires can issue Yellow and Red Cards to any player, official or spectator as deemed necessary.			
2. Y	ELLOW CARDS			
2 a	An offender ordered off for a Yellow Card offence can be replaced immediately but is prohibited from taking the field for 15 minutes playing time.			
2b	In the event that a Player or Official:			
	 i. Is issued with two Yellow Cards on the day of the match, then the offender shall take no further part in the game and cannot be replaced for 15 minutes and receives an automatic 1-match suspension. ii. Is ordered off for a Yellow Card offence and fails to leave the field immediately when directed by the field umpire, then the offender shall be reported for misconduct and consequently be deemed to have committed a Red Card offence. iii. Is issued with three Yellow Cards over the duration of a season, then the third and every yellow card received thereafter shall be upgraded to a Red Card at the conclusion of the match, resulting in an automatic one-match suspension. 			
3. R	ED CARDS			
3 a	An offender ordered off for a red card offence cannot be replaced for 15 minutes playing time. The offending person may not return to the field for the remainder of the match.			
3b	The offending person will be penalised in line with the Junior Football Tribunal Guidelines.			
3с	A player, club/team official or spectator who fails to leave the arena immediately when directed by the umpire shall be reported for misconduct, the match shall be terminated, and the offending person's team will forfeit the match.			
3d	Once leaving the playing arena, the participant's club should assist the person receiving the red card to remove themselves from the venue as soon as practically possible.			

WAFC POL.13F Match Operations Policy: Removal of Players from the Playing Field

POLICY STATEMENT

No Coach or Club/Team Official may remove a team from the playing field during play. If a Coach or any club/team official removes a team from the playing arena whilst a game is in progress, such person and a responsible official from the person's club shall be required to appear before the WAFC and show cause why a penalty should not be imposed on the club and/or person, for their actions.

A match will not be determined as abandoned until the game is officially called off by the Field Umpire, Umpire Coach or WAFC Competitions Staff member. Any Officials on the Field will be deemed to be in breach of Policy 13G 'Match Operations Policy: Ground Encroachment' with a minimum penalty of 12 month suspension applied.



WAFC POL.13G Match Operations Policy: Ground Encroachment

POLICY BACKGROUND

This policy documents the rules and procedures that are to be adhered to following encroachment of the playing arena by an unauthorised person or persons. This policy applies to all Junior and Youth football matches controlled by the WAFC and is in place to ensure the safety of all community football participants and a means of positively addressing Game Day Environment.

RULES	
GROU	ND ENCROACHMENT
1	In the event of an encroachment of the area of play by unauthorised persons, or that play is prevented by any other means, the field umpire shall seek the assistance of fellow umpires and/or any member of the WAFC to clear the playing arena so that the match may be resumed. If the field umpire is unable to do this within a reasonable time, they shall terminate play at that time and report all circumstances to the WAFC. This body may award the result or declare the match abandoned, forfeited or call a replay at its discretion or in line with AFL Laws of the Game.
2	 Any Club whose officials, players and club spectators are found to be responsible for the unauthorised encroachment of any playing arena (and any official, player and club spectators so responsible) shall be liable for penalty. As per WAFC COMPETITION RULES – Match Day Roles Section 3b; i. If the WAFC deems a match has been impacted by encroachment of an adult(s), the minimum penalty for individuals is 16 matches. Less significant penalties will potentially apply to under 18's. ii. If the encroachment includes any physical or verbal contact with opposition players, the penalty may be increased up to a Life Ban from all WAFC Competitions. iii. If the encroachment includes any physical or verbal contact with Umpires or WAFC officials, the penalty may be increased up to a Life Ban from all WAFC Competitions.
3	The home club (or the team mentioned first in the fixture) is responsible for ground security on the match day but cannot enter the venue unless requested to by the Umpires.

WAFC POL.13H Match Operations Policy: Match Balls

POLICY STATEMENT

Each team competing in a WAFC controlled match shall supply a football. The home team shall provide the match ball and the away team is to provide a suitable spare football.

All match footballs must be:

- Of an age-appropriate size as per the WAFC Competition Rules.
- Manufactured by a WAFC agreed sponsored brand (Burley Sekem)
 - Leather footballs to be *Premier* quality
 - Synthetic footballs to be *Attack* quality.
- Display branding of the nominated WAFC Ball Sponsor (Healthway Go for 2 & 5)
- Yellow in colour

WAFC POL.13I Match Operations Policy: Stretchers

POLICY BACKGROUND

As per WAFC POL.13A – Ground Preparation, a stretcher is required at all Junior and Youth matches under the control of the WAFC, including finals.

RULES

1. CA	LLING FOR A STRETCHER
1a	Any player who in the opinion of the injured player's team officials requires the assistance of a
	stretcher shall be attended to by a suitably trained and certified medical officer trained in the
	use of a stretcher prior to removal of that player.
1b	Only authorised persons are permitted to enter the field of play and no team meetings or
	coaching is permitted during this time. Players must remain in their positions ready for
	recommencement of play.
1c	Should a coach enter the field of play during a stretcher call and in the opinion of the umpire
	was doing so to provide instruction, a free kick will be awarded to the opposing side in front of
	goal at the end of the 10-metre square. (This rule will not apply if the 10 minutes or quarter
	break becomes enforced).
1d	Should both teams' coaches enter the field of play for the purpose of giving instruction, play will
	resume as would be the case under the rules of the game and both teams will have a fine
10	imposed at the discretion of the WAFC.
1e	Umpires will report all stretcher call outs and the outcomes on the match documentation. MOVAL OF A PLAYER
2. KE	If the stretcher has been called for by an authorised person, then the player will be removed
	from the playing field via the most direct route for play to recommence and the injured player
	may be replaced through the interchange.
2b	If a player is removed from the field on a stretcher, then that player will not take any further
	part in the game whatsoever.
2c	If a field umpire or team medical officer is of the opinion that a player cannot be moved from
	the field of play due to the severity of an injury, then play may be abandoned for the game at
	the discretion of a meeting between the two Team Managers and the Field Umpire and/or any
	league appointed official (i.e., match day steward). The WAFC shall be advised of any such
	abandonment for the purpose of either rescheduling the fixture or determining a result
	according to the progress score and point of the game at which the game was abandoned. For
	all final round matches all decisions pertaining to the above rules will be controlled by the WAFC

3. Th	The timekeeper shall stop the clock once the field umpire has called time after a stretcher has
	entered the field of play and shall restart the clock at the time the field umpire recommences
	play and calls time.
3b	The timekeeper shall record the time out and the time of the quarter at which point the clock
	was stopped.
3c	If the time taken to attend to the injured player exceeds 10 minutes from the time out the
	following will apply:
	If the quarter would have ended during the delay - time will be called for the quarter and
	play will recommence for the next quarter after the standard break.
	 If the final quarter is in progress and the stretcher is called for, the remaining time will be
	played out once play recommences.

WAFC POL.13J Match Operations Policy: Mercy Rule

BACKGROUND

This Policy is established in accordance with the Mercy Rule principles of the Australian Football Match Policy and the Spirit of Junior Football. The purpose of this Policy is to instil in all participants that is serves no beneficial purpose to inflict massive losses on an opposition Team.

This policy applies to all Junior and Youth football matches controlled by the WAFC and is in place to ensure a better competition for young players and reduce the number of one-sided matches. Youth retention is a key focus for the WAFC and this Policy forms a key part of the strategy to ensure players are involved in competitive competitions.

RULES	
1. SCC	RES
	As per WAFC Year Competition Rules section 4a, teams in competitions in Year 3 to 6 have no
1 a	match results published, no scoreboards present, no premiership points awarded nor ladders
	kept. As per WAFC POL10E Competitions Policy: Results, Premiership Points & Epoints 1a, teams in
1b	competitions in Year 7 and above will only be credited a with a maximum of 60 points (10 goal)

	is part of the developmental journey but must remain secondary to the primary focus of player
	development and player retention.
2b	In the event of a one-sided game, both the Home and Away team coaches have a responsibility
	to even the game up to the best of their ability. There is no discretion for Coaches to agree to
	non-implementation of the Mercy Rule.
2c	Clubs and Coaches may be required by the Competitions Team to explain any circumstance in
	which there is evident failure to take equalization measures or achieve a competitive balance

3. API	PLYING THE MERCY RULE – LEADING TEAM
За	Scoring endlessly is not only unfair on your opponents but will not aid the development of your players. Below are some techniques Coaches can implement when applying the mercy rule;
	 Rotation of dominant/influential players and adjust positions for all players. At junior
	 Rotation of dominant/initial players and adjust positions for all players. At junior level its vitally important that all players develop the skills required for all positions.
	 Setting a challenge of maintain possession for certain periods of time or amount of
	possessions before scoring. This will develop their game sense allowing increased
	player involvement.
	• Challenge the playing group to use non preferred hand and foot. There is many long-
	term benefits of having players develop skills on both sides of their body.

4. APP	PLYING THE MERCY RULE – TRAILING TEAM
	Motivating a team that is trailing in a one-sided game can be a tough challenge, however it is
	achievable when the win/loss situation is not overemphasised by the adults around them.
	Redefine the definition of winning so your players are focused on self-improvement and
	individual goal attainment rather than the scoreline. Below are some examples Coaches can set
	their players;
4a	• Defenders can be tasked with blocking a shot on goal.
	• Players can be set the objective of taking a free kick and making a good pass to a team
	mate.
	• Forwards could be tasked with taking a mark in front of goal.
	• Teams can be set the objective of conceding fewer points in the next quarter than the
	last or no points in a set period of time.
