The highlights for the 2016 year being:

- Ross McQueen winning the Coach of the Year for 2016
- The appointment of Darren Harris as our Senior Coach for 2017
- The appointment of Graham Moss as our CEO
- TFS (Tropical Forestry Services) becoming our Major Sponsor
- Peter Laurance accepting the role as Patron
- Watching our club facilities slowly rise out of the ground with completion scheduled for February 2017
- The five players taken in the 2016 draft -

Our loss for 2016 of \$ 178,188 was better than budget and my estimate as the cost of playing at the Showgrounds. 2017 will again be financially challenging as we incur the costs of moving back to our new premises and the bulk of our rental income steams will start in the later part of 2017.

We have negotiated a line of credit with the Westpac Banking Corporation which will ensure we have adequate funds for the foreseeable future.

The good news is thanks to the Redevelopment Committee our development costs have been retained within the funds available from Land Corp. This is a wonderful result.

The current Board of Directors and the CEO are focused on implementing changes to ensure the Club is cashflow positive by the start of 2018.

Our Football Department led by Darcy Coffey and Senior Coach Michael Broadbridge has again performed brilliantly and I would like to thank all the people involved with football and especially Michael who retires as our senior coach after three years which were all played at the Showgrounds. I believe we have the best senior group of players in the WAFL thanks to Michael and the Football Department.

I thank our Patron and our Vice Patrons who are listed on page 3 of the Annual Report. You all play an important role in this great club and I thank you all sincerely on behalf of the Board for your continuous support and generosity.

I again thank all our Sponsors for their generous support throughout the year. Without Sponsors our Club could not exist.

Volunteers are the backbone of our football club. I again list below the volunteer groups that exist within our club excluding junior and country volunteers:

- The ladies committee.

- The Monday group " dad's army

CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

It was an honour to be approached late last year to consider taking on the role as CEO for a Club that I have been involved with as a player, coach, Life Member and supporter of for some 50 years. I accepted the offer knowing that there were many challenges ahead but in the knowledge that the Club was about to commence one of the most exciting eras of its 90 year history.

The redevelopment of Claremont Oval and the construction of the new clubrooms and associated facilities will not only provide members, sponsors, players, coaching staff and supporters with facilities second to none in the WAFL but also ensure the long term viability of the Club. Construction of the new building is now well advanced with completion scheduled for the end of February 2017 allowing us to take occupancy in time for the start of the 2017 season.

2016 was a year of mixed fortunes both on and off the field.

On the field the League team, although finishing 7th on the Premiership ladder, was competitive throughout the season losing many games by narrow margins which was reflected in its percentage being the third highest in the competition. Senior Coach Michael Broadbridge advised the Club towards the end of the season that he would not be seeking reappointment due to his significant work commitments at the WA Institute of Sport. We thank Michael for his contribution to the Club over his three years as Senior Coach and wish him well in his role at WAIS.

The Development team took out the Premiership coming from behind in a determined fashion to beat East Perth. Congratulations to Kepler Bradley in his first season as coach and to the players for a well deserved victory.

The Colts side made it two in a row winning the

Premiership in another come from behind victory. Congratulations to coach Ross McQueen who also won the prestigious JJ Leonard Award for coaching excellence in the WAFL for the 2016 season.

Jye Bolton won the Sandover Medal and the Simpson Medal in an outstanding first up season with the Club. He plays an exciting brand of football and has fitted in extremely well to the Club environment. We certainly hope to retain Jye's services for many years to come.

The Club was extremely fortunate to secure the services of Darren Harris as Senior Coach for at least the next two seasons. Darren brings with him a wealth of experience and success as a player and coach. Darren has assembled an impressive group of coaching assistants and we look forward to seeing the continued development of our entire playing group under his leadership.

Off the field the Club continued to struggle financially and recorded a loss of \$178,188 compared to last year's loss of \$49,776. This year the Club received no relocation funding from Landcorp (\$102,246 in 2015 and \$233,625 in 2014) and there were down turns in revenue from marketing activities, bar, ground admissions and AFL draft fees. Total expenditure was reduced by some \$60,000 compared to the previous year.

The Club received conditional approval from the Westpac Banking Corporation for a Business Overdraft to assist it through the next 12 months at which time the significant revenue streams from the new facility will see the Club return to a profitable operating position.

Redevelopment of Claremont Oval

As mentioned previously construction of the new clubrooms and associated facilities is progressing well despite initial delays caused by encountering significant limestone formations during the excavations for the underground carpark. Practical completion is currently scheduled for the end of February 2017 which will enable the Club to commence operations in the new building in time for the start of its 2017 home games.

Leases are in place for the Gymnasium. Physiotherapy Centre and Café and negotiations are progressing to lease further areas within the building. Negotiations are also progressing in relation to contracting the catering services.

The AFL have provided a grant of \$250,000 which will be applied to fit out of equipment within the new building.

Administration

On taking up the position as CEO I relied heavily on the experience of Marina Manuel, the Club's Finance and Administration Manager and her wealth of knowledge was invaluable in enabling me to understand the workings of the administrative side of the Club's activities. Marina left the Club in September to return home to

Zimbabwe and I thank her for her contribution to the Club over some 4 years.

Jessie Fear was appointed as the Club's Business Development Officer in January this year and has made an excellent contribution in the areas of Sponsorship, Communications and Events.

Emily Harvey was appointed as the Club's Membership and Administration Coordinator in July and has worked hard to improve our membership services and will head up the Club's front of house area in the new building. Emily has also taken on some finance duties with Marina's departure.

Football Department

The Club's Football Department headed by our Football Operations Manager, Darcy Coffey has done an outstanding job under difficult circumstances in ensuring that all of the Club's football related activities, and they are extensive, are carried out in a professional and effective manner.

Warren Parker, Talent Development Officer, runs the Club's talent development program which extends from the Kimberley region to the Great Southern and throughout the Club's metropolitan zone. Claremont's talent development program is regarded as one of the best in the WAFL and this is due in no small way to Warren's tireless and enthusiastic contribution.

Kepler Bradley, in addition to his coaching duties, carries out the role of Player Development Officer. This involves assisting players with employment opportunities, accommodation and relocation assistance and many other player welfare issues. This is an extremely important role in ensuring off field stability of our playing group and Kepler's contribution in this area is highly regarded.

The Football Department comprises many other personnel including the assistant coaches, medical staff, trainers and property staff, strength and conditioning staff, Team Managers, statisticians and of course the players themselves. To all members of our Football Department thank you for a job well done.

District Football

The Claremont District Football Development Council oversees the organisation and promotion of junior football in the CFC metropolitan district. Its Chairman Paul Donovan is dedicated to ensuring the success of junior football and commits an enormous amount of his time in this direction.

The District staff do a tremendous job in promoting the Claremont brand in the schools and junior clubs throughout our district and I would like to thank Sam Cousens and Dylan Ross who are based at our office for the great work they do in this area.

Sponsors

This year we were fortunate to secure a new major sponsor in TFS (Tropical Forestry Services). TFS operates the largest plantations of Indian Sandalwood in the world in Western Australia, Northern Territory and Queensland. TFS Chairman is former Claremont great, Dalton Gooding and I thank him together with Managing Director Frank Wilson and Kylie Smith for their support throughout the season. We look forward to a long and rewarding association with TFS.

Liquor Barons joined the Club as a major support sponsor this year and I thank Chris O'Brien and the Team at Liquor Barons Swanbourne for their support.

Qatar Airlines together with Travel Tree provided the major raffle prize for the season with two return Business Class fares to any Qatar destination in the world. The raffle raised over \$40,000 and I thank Nicole Bennett from Qatar Airlines and Travis Smith from Travel Tree for their generous support.

There are many other new and existing sponsors who are recognised elsewhere in the Annual Report and I thank them sincerely for their support and I look forward to continuing a mutually beneficial relationship in the future.

Volunteers

The Claremont Football Club is extremely fortunate to have a large group of hard working and dedicated volunteers who carry out a wide range of activities which not only save the Club significant

expenditure but generate substantial income.

To Carol Millband who heads up the Ladies Committee and the ladies themselves thank you on another outstanding contribution to the Club's catering activities. The ladies run the kiosk for members and spectators on match days and provide meals for many other football related activities throughout the season. This year Carol on behalf of the Ladies Committee presented the Club with a cheque for \$27,000 which was a magnificent effort and one which is greatly appreciated.

The Monday Group led by Ian Haggerty continued to provide countless hours of support taking on a wide range of tasks throughout the year. A huge amount of work went into setting up the Showgrounds for the start of the season and then preparing the venue for match days, cleaning up after home games, carrying out many maintenance tasks, assisting in mailouts to our membership and finally decommissioning the Showgrounds and packing equipment into storage containers in preparation for our move back to Claremont Oval. I can't thank Ian and his team enough for their contribution to the Club and I look forward to their ongoing support when we move back to our new home at Claremont Oval.

Ron Dingwell coordinated the Royal Show parking again this year and with the assistance of his Deputy Andy Webster and a dedicated band of volunteers ran a highly successful operation under extremely trying weather conditions. Ron described the last day of the Show as the coldest and wettest conditions he had ever experienced. Despite this

over \$100,000 was taken in parking fees which provided a much needed boost to the Club's financial coffers. A sincere thank you to Ron and his team on a job well done.

Past Players and Officials Association

The Past Players and Officials Association continued its great work within the Club encouraging past players and officials to stay involved in the Club and raising valuable funds to support the Colts and the Club in general. I would like to thank its President Sam Drabble and his Committee for their untiring efforts in supporting the Club.

I would like to thank President Kevin Somes and the Board of Directors for their support in what has been a steep learning curve year for me.

Thankyou also to the Administration and Football staff who work tirelessly to ensure the effective operation of the Club both on and off the field.

Finally to you the Members thank you for continuing to support the Club during our time at the Showgrounds. Your patience will be rewarded when we move into our new building next year. I look forward to sharing that experience with you.

FOOTBALL DEPARTMENT REPORT

SENIOR FOOTBALL

2016 was a year of 'what ifs' that saw the League side fall to a devastating 8 losses by under 8 points, along the way setting a WAFL record in the competition's 131-year history. With the eventual premiers in Peel coming from 4th position on the ladder and East Perth sneaking into the top 5 with 10 wins, what if we could have held on in at least half those 8 games? What if we were already in our much feted clubrooms that have been a shimmering light on the horizon for so long? What if we were able to train and play on our home ground before round 5 of the season? Not that you ever heard a complaint from any player or coach throughout the season, they just got on with it. So despite a blistering round 1 performance against an AFL stacked East Perth, consecutive losses to eventual 8th & 9th place getters Perth and Swan Districts set the tone for yet another frustrating season at the Tiges. It wasn't all doom and gloom though. The contrast to our close losses were a number of substantial wins that resulted in the 3rd highest % in the competition come season end. Some people say that % is a good reflection on your team's performance. I think I'm with those

We had a number of young players return to the club after brief stints in the AFL with Rowen Powell & Jared Hardisty returning from West Coast and Hawthorn respectively; Tom Shanahan made the move from East Perth after being starved of opportunity under the alignment model; and there was also a confident 23 year old from Werribee in the VFL who we managed to lure west by the name of Jye Bolton. All of these guys made an instant impact in 2016 but it was undoubtedly Bolton who made the biggest mark, taking the competition by storm by not only claiming the Sandover Medal and EB Cook Medal, but also the Simpson medal in a 46 possession, 3

goal performance in the state win over Tasmania mid-season. He started on the bench too he keeps telling me. His outstanding ball winning ability, skills and work rate set a new standard at the club in 2016. One which we are confident he can replicate either in the navy blue and gold of Claremont, or in the AFL if the deserved opportunity arises in 2017.

Along with veteran ruckman Mitch Andrews who carried the ruck for the entire season with aplomb, wingman Tom Ledger had the ball on a string to round out the top three placings in the Club Champion awards at League level. Other players to emerge in 2016 included Harry McCracken whose dash and precision kicking were hallmarks of his 16 League games in his debut league season; Zac Langdon who arrived on our doorstep from Dampier and powered his way to 11 League matches; the mercurial Alex Manuel made his mark at half forward after debuting in round 16; Justin Speed's ruthless contested ball winning and tackling earned him 8 league games; and Morgan Davies grew considerably throughout the year, nabbing his opportunity at League level late in the season which was highlighted by a classy 24 possession performance in just his 2nd game of League footy.

Ryan Lim and Darcy Cameron took their games to another level in 2016, Gerrick Weedon returned to the club and knocked off his 50th league milestone to go with his Development Premiership and B&F, and Francis Watson was able to make a remarkable comeback from a devastating broken leg in 2015 to play 10 league games this year. So there was plenty of good stuff!

Welfare

My role in the welfare space is to provide off field assistance to our players, throughout their employment, study or living requirements; or with any other personal or prevailing matters where myself or the club can be of assistance. Below are a few key areas I will touch on that have really helped our playing group this year.

Claremont House

The house has again been a success providing a home away from home for our young indigenous players, moving down to Perth or transitioning to their next phase of life after school. A big thanks must go to Dylan Ross (house parent) who has done an outstanding job in providing a really good environment for our players.

Employment, Study and Relocation

Players moving from our country zones to Perth settled in quite nicely this year, with most players obtaining opportunities in employment or further education. I have been working hard to build relationships with employment providers, such as Skill Hire, AFL Sports Ready, West Australian Group Training Scheme and MIGAS. A big thank you goes out to these organisations, as well as companies such as Lexus, EMCO and Frogmat Landscaping, who have helped a range of players in finding apprenticeships, traineeships or meaningful employment throughout the year.

Life Skills

We have been lucky enough to have Steve Allsop (a Professor at the National Drug Research Institute) come on board this year to help our playing group understand the Football Club's requirements and expectations of them both on and off the field. Steve has presented on such topics as respect and responsibility, alcohol and drugs, mental health and social media. Steve comes with over 30 years of experience in delivering these seminars and has helped so many of our players this year. A big thanks Steve for all your wonderful work with our playing group.

In the off season I will meet with a range of potential players that the football club is keen to add to our already talented football team. I will endeavour to assist these players to make the transition to Claremont Football Club an easy one. We also have a lot of kids moving to Perth from our country zones to play in the Colts program so it will be a busy period finding them employment options and living arrangements. I will be doing everything I can to make sure the football club will be heading in the right direction in 2017 and I'm looking forward to working with the players in the year ahead.



TALENT - Warren Parker

2017 brought with it a great amount of success and its fair share of challenges, but I can say with great confidence that the Claremont Football Club is in good shape looking forward from a talent point of view.

Our Development Squad Programs continued to showcase a great amount of young developing talent which is being refined by some of the best and most dedicated youth development coaches going around. The Colts squad finished the season as back to back WAFL Colts Premiers under the great man Ross McQueen and his talented coaching and support staff. And to top it off we saw a number of current and recent Colts players make their debuts for the club at both Development and League level.

Our country zones in the Great Southern and Kimberley regions also put together fantastic development programs over 2016 in the form of the Great Southern Storm and the Kimberley Spirit which continue to not only develop the region's best young players on the field, but assist them in developing good off field habits and attributes which will be required for those with the ambitions

of transitioning to Perth to pursue football here at Claremont.

Mix that in with the impending move to our new facility early next season and the Claremont Football Club looks be a very exciting place for our players to continue developing their craft going forward which we hope will result in continued success for the club both on and off the field.

CFC Tigers Academy

Our Development Squad programs saw a slight re-vamp in 2016 as the WAFL moved away from the traditional 14s and 15s programs to accommodate for the cohort school system and encompass Year 8, Year 9 and Year 10 age groups instead. This saw us open the Academy to our youngest ever participants and an additional 50 players compared with 2015's programs.

Although the format changed, the goals of our Development Squads stayed the same and focused on providing young developing players with exposure to an elite program designed not only to refine their footballing skills but to develop their off-field behaviours and habits aimed to assist them to grow into quality young men.

The Year 8, Year 9 and Year 10 Development Squad programs began in July and ran through until the October school holidays where more than 140 players represented the club and participated in the 2016 WAFL Talent Carnival. Players were not only exposed to a high level of training and competition, but also completed various life skills sessions aimed to develop them as young men off field.

The CFC 16s Development Squad program, which ran from February until April was a great success with 50 players from our metro and country zones being selected to represent the club during the WAFL 16s Carnival. Congratulations to Jordan Clark (Great Southern), Tyron Smallwood (Great Southern), Jason Carter (Kimberley) and Rylie Morgan (HALE) who were selected to take part in the WA State 16s Academy with special mention going to Rylie who was named captain of the WA side. Jason Carter was also selected as a Level 1 participant in the NAB AFL Academy after a strong showing during the 16s National Championships.

I would personally like to acknowledge the support shown by all of our CFC Tigers Academy Coaching Staff and Volunteers, in particular Mark Paris, Bevan O'Farrell and Craig Nitschke who assumed head coaching roles throughout the season. Also Craig Rogers, Dave Filmer, Bailey Banfield, Peter Belcastro, Max Bentley, Jacob Sounness, Chris Tan, Sam Marson, Tony Fitzpatrick, Sam Cousens, Cameron Tweedie, Brandon Giles, Heather Johnson and Kara Malkovic who assisted us in delivering quality programs throughout the 2016 season.

Colts

The Colts Squad once again proved to be successful both on and off the field with players being exposed to one of finest under 18s

programs in the country. The season was capped off as the boys claimed the 2016 WAFL Colts Premiership defeating East Perth by 18pts in a tightly contested match to make it back to back flags for Ross McQueen and his coaching staff.

6 players were selected to represent Claremont in the 2016 WA State 18s Academy after showing some great form in the early part of the season. Congratulations to Jeremy Goddard (Marist JFC), Jake Waterman (Marist JFC), Sam Petrevski-Seton (Halls Creek), Matt Guelfi (Wembley JFC), Bailey Banfield (Scotch College) and Jake Patmore (CCGS) with a special mention going to Jake Waterman who was named captain of the WA side.

Declan Hardisty, Joshua Bennett, C.J. Oakley, Jeremy Goddard and Jacob Sideris were selected in the WAFL Colts Team of the Year with Jacob Sideris finishing a very close 2nd in the Jack Clarke Medal count (WAFL Colts F&B) before winning the CFC Colts Fairest and Best Award for 2016. Jake Waterman was also awarded the Mel Whinnen Medal for his Best on Ground performance in the Grand Final.

One of the biggest focuses for the CFC Colts program is developing long term League footballers for the club and we take great pride in the 12 players who moved up the ranks to play Senior Development football with special congratulations going to C.J. Oakley, Jake Waterman, Matt Guelfi and Bailey Banfield who had the opportunity to debut for the League side during the season.



REPORT

Upon commencing my role as the Club's Business Development Officer in January 2016, one of my main priorities was to increase the Club's communication to its Members and Supporters through online platforms such as our Website, Social Media and E-Newsletter.

Some key progress statistics include:

- Near 150,000 website visits during the 2016 Season
- 20% increase in Facebook followers (over 700 new page likes for the season)
- 60% increase in Instagram followers
- A Season high 30,450 views on a singular post (meaning one Claremont Football Club post was seen by over 30,000 different people on Facebook)
- The average views per post on Facebook increased five-fold from below 500 to well over 2,500 people per post

I believe these pleasing statistics came as a result of scheduling and publishing regular content throughout the Season with a focus on quality rather than quantity. Claremont currently sits in 8th position when comparing Social Media followers to other WAFL clubs but with a closer focus on encouraging online fan engagement and leveraging off the hype around the new facility, we will look to better these figures once again in 2017.

I am pleased to reflect on the success of Claremont Football Club's fundraising initiatives carried out this year. Our first telecast game for 2016 was dedicated to raising awareness and fundraising for Breast Cancer through the National Breast Cancer Foundation's (NBCF) Real Men Wear Pink Campaign. With help from the Tiger supporter base and promotion through various media channels we managed to donate \$3,700 to the NBCF, including \$1,000 raised from the sale of our special edition "pink" Guernseys worn by the League team that day.

Just two weeks succeeding the NBCF charity day, a further \$3,700 was raised for the Warrick Proudlove Foundation. The annual "Proudies Day" was held in a bid to raise funds to assist with the care of past-player Warrick Proudlove who was involved in a tragic car accident 5 years ago. This included two very generous donations of \$500 and \$1,000 from our Major Sponsor TFS and the Past Players and Officials Association respectively. Thank you to all members of the Claremont Community who were involved in these two initiatives, both Charities and the Club are forever grateful for your astounding support.

The Club hosted several major events throughout the year including the 2016 Season Launch, 90th Anniversary Dinner Auction, Family Fun Day and Club Champion Awards Night.

Ladies Day made a late return to the event Calendar this year being held on the last Round of the Season. Over 50 Girlfriends, Sisters, Mothers, friends and even God Mothers of Players and the Club enjoyed a day full of football and fun. The aim of this event was to introduce the Club's female affiliates to one another so their place within the Claremont Community doesn't feel like an isolated one. It is important for the longevity and success of the Club to create a welcoming environment for all members and supporters. I hope to expand on the success of events such as Ladies Day and the Family Fun Day (highest Showgrounds attendance for over two seasons), looking to better them for 2017.

In 2017, we will be focusing on the Club's "revival". The last three years at the Claremont Showgrounds have been particularly tough and unfortunately, a steady decline in Membership numbers has occurred, with just 836 financial Members for 2016. As we return back to Claremont Oval and into a brand new state-of-the-art facility our aim is to rally the troops and

reignite people's passion for grass roots football. Renewing, returning and new Members will be welcomed into a euphoric Claremont Football Club community. 2017 is a time of celebration and elation so we will open our doors to all types of community Members.

It is very important to mention a few key people who worked tirelessly throughout the season and volunteered their time

WEEDON STANDS ALONE

A three-year sabbatical in the Kimberley has not dulled Gerrick Weedon's football skills nor lessened his desire to perform at a high level with Claremont.

He capped his comeback season with the Tigers in grand style, starring in the club's splendid grand final victory over East Perth and being awarded the Denis Marshall trophy as the reserves fairest-and-best player in 2016.

The 25-year-old Weedon, who started at Claremont as a 16-year-old in the colts in 2008, holds a unique place in the history of the Claremont Football Club as the only one to have played in six premiership sides for the club.

"I feel pretty honoured and privileged to have been a member of those premiership sides," he said with typical modesty. "All the hard work has paid off and now I'm looking forward to a full pre-season and cementing a spot in the league side next year."

Weedon returned to the city and started his pre-season training early in March, just before the opening round of fixtures. To his credit, he was able to quickly prove his fitness and play 19 matches for the reserves and three in the league side.

A strong pre-season should enable Weedon to be fit and ready to make a flying start to the 2017 season when he hopes to build on his 44 WAFL league matches for the Tigers and to help the club win another premiership flag.

Not only is Weedon an outstanding footballer, full of courage, possessing deft skills and a fearsome, determined, robust, hard-tackling and versatile player, he is also a wonderful role model.

He took a break from city football at the end of the 2012 season and spent the next three years in Derby where he played for the Derby Tigers and worked in the Kimberley Regional Prison as an Aboriginal education worker.

He is now working at Casuarina Prison in a similar role and takes pride in being able to be a mentor to offenders and supporting them and giving them advice

"Rehabilitation in prison is most important and I want to help them to turn their lives around," he said. "I want prisoners to set goals and to look forward to achieving them after they have been released. They must focus on employment, study or whatever else they want to achieve."

Regarding Kimberley youngsters venturing to the city to chase their sporting dreams, Weedon preaches the need for sacrifice and commitment. He wants them to set goals and to have a balanced life outside of football --- to keep their minds occupied.

Weedon has completed a mentoring course at TAFE and has a firm belief that he can help young people with family problems, particularly problems involving alcohol. He is a strong advocate for young indigenous people to attend school regularly and one of his main aims is to assist youngsters to follow their dreams.

His parents William and Louanne are teetotallers and have wielded a strong influence on Gerrick and his two brothers and two sisters. "They have played a big role in my sporting career by teaching me life values," Weedon said.

Weedon and his partner Leah are the proud parents of delightful daughters Jerayah (three) and Evarnah (nine months) and he has discovered the right balance between family, work and sport.

He was captain of the Derby Tigers in 2015 and won the Kevin Bullen Medal as the fairest-and-best player in the West Kimberley League. His six premierships for Claremont have been with the colts in 2009, the reserves in 2010 and 2016, the league in 2011 and 2012 and the Foxtel Cup in 2012.

Originally from Broome and a student at Clontarf for two years, Weedon represented WA in the national under-18 carnival in 2009 and was chosen in the WAFL colts team of the year that season.

After the 2012 league premiership Weedon decided to take a break from top-level football and moved to Derby. He has no regrets about his decision to continue his football with the Claremont Tigers.

"It was more relaxed and enjoyable playing in Derby, but I'm privileged to have been part of the Claremont reserves premiership side this year," he said. "It was a great feeling to be able to play with the boys after a late start."

BOLTON JOINS ELITE CLUB

Star midfielder Jye Bolton celebrated his first year as a Claremont footballer in 2016 by joining an exclusive club. He became only the third player in the club's 91-year history to be awarded the Simpson Medal and the Sandover Medal.

And to cap this outstanding achievement the 24-year-old Bolton was a convincing winner of the E. B. Cook Medal as the club's fairest-and-best league player.

Not only did the robust, hard-running Bolton delight Tigers fans with his skill, strength and consistency, but he deserves high praise for being able to achieve such excellent standards after a restricted pre-season program while he recovered from a fractured left foot.

Bolton was recruited from VFL club Werribee Tigers, but it is not generally known that he was feted by East Fremantle and went within an ace of joining the Sharks.

As a rookie with Collingwood in 2011 Bolton lived in Melbourne with Alex Fasolo and Jack Perham, who had just been recruited by the Magpies from East Fremantle.

"The plan was always to go to East Freo, with Perham back playing for them and Jesse Crighton, one of my good mates from Werribee, signing with the Sharks in October of last year," Bolton explained.

"However, I had a good feeling for Claremont and in the end Darcy Coffey (the club's football manager) and Jake Murphy (captain) pretty much got me over the line. And I couldn't be happier with my decision and the way Claremont has looked after me. I've made so many great mates and I simply couldn't have imagined that things could have been that good."

Coffey invited Bolton to Perth to watch the Tigers play East Fremantle at the Showgrounds in a round 21 match in 2015 --- when the Sharks led by four points at three-quarter time before the Tigers piled on 9.1 to East Fremantle's 2.4 in the final term to win by 35 points.

Bolton's remarkable 2016 season came just a year after a most frustrating 2015 when he damaged a shoulder in the first quarter of a round two match for Werribee (which forced him to miss three matches) and then he was laid low by his foot injury in July.

"We were playing against Geelong and it was Dan Menzel's comeback game," Bolton said. "I was playing on him and as I went to push off him I heard this big crack. It didn't hurt that much, but when I tried to put my foot down I knew that I'd done something bad. I had been complaining of pain in my foot for 12 or 15 weeks and the surgeon said that I'd had a stress fracture which finally cracked through."

This required immediate surgery, during which a titanium pin was inserted through the damaged joint into the fifth metatarsal. Bolton played the entire 2016 season with this in place without discomfort.

Bolton was a dynamic performer for Claremont throughout the year and was awarded the Simpson Medal for his dazzling display when WA crushed Tasmania by 134 points at Bassendean Oval in June. And he continued in superb form for Claremont and was a most deserving winner of the Sandover Medal as the best player in the WAFL competition.

He polled 49 votes and finished seven votes ahead of Peel Thunder midfielder and former Claremont player Matt de Boer. Bolton then won the E. B. Cook Medal by a handsome margin from ruckman Mitch Andrews and utility player Tom Ledger.

Bolton was thrilled at receiving his awards and said that his focus was now on improving his game.

"I've got heaps of room for improvement," he said. "I want to continually improve my running, my contested ball winning, my kicking and my defensive skills. I want to work on my weaknesses and continue to make my strengths even greater."

Born in Geelong, Bolton started his football journey as a three-year-old in Auskick ranks before graduating to the Drysdale Hawks as an eight-year-old. From the age of 14 he played for the Leopold club in the Geelong district competition and was a skinny 17-year-old wingman when he made his debut in the senior side.

However, he was overlooked by the coaches and missed selection for the Geelong Falcons in the TAC Cup. That kept him out of the Victorian side in the national under-18 competition, but it did not stop Collingwood, the 2010 premiers, from drafting him as a rookie for the 2011 season.

"My experience at Collingwood was one of a lot of learning," he said. "I realised how much effort the best players put in. It was a real eye-opener for me. It was just another level, learning the professionalism of players like Scott Pendlebury and Nick Maxwell.

He played in Collingwood's first four pre-season NAB Cup matches, but was unable to force his way into the league side which boasted the best midfield in the competition, a group which included Pendlebury, Dane Swan, Luke Ball, Steele Sidebottom and Dale Thomas.

He played in 16 matches for Collingwood in the VFL competition and was delisted at the end of 2011. "I thought I had done enough to stay on the list and I was pretty shattered at being delisted," Bolton said. "I was a casualty, but unfortunately it's a business and clubs have to do what is best for them."

So off he went to join some of his best mates at Werribee. He booted five goals in a losing preliminary final against Box Hill in 2013 and in 2014 he finished second in the club's fairest-and-best award and was named in the VFL Team of the Year.

Thanks to CFC director Kaye Maskiell Bolton secured a job as a sales representative with O'Rourke Realty in Scarborough and he is now studying for a commerce degree at Edith Cowan University.

For the record the only other Claremont players to have won the Sandover and Simpson medals are Sonny Maffina (Sandover in 1949 and Simpson in 1950) and Luke Blackwell (Simpson in 2010 and Sandover in 2011).

The RP Rodriguez Shield honors a distinguished West Australian football administrator and respected contributor to WA Football, Pat Rodriguez. Basis for Qualified Auditor's Opinion

Revenue Recognition

As is common for organisations of this type, it is not practicable for the Club to maintain an effective system of internal control over cash receipts until their initial entry in the accounting records. Accordingly, as the evidence available to us regarding revenue from voluntary activities was limited, our audit procedures with respect to voluntary activities had to be restricted to the amounts recorded in the financial records. We therefore are unable to express an opinion whether all income relating to voluntary activities is complete.

Redevelopment Activities

We draw attention to Note 4 in the financial report with respect to the Club's redevelopment activities. These activities have not been accounted for in this financial report, and as such our audit procedures have been limited to that of the Football Operations as presented in the financial report. As a result, we have not obtained appropriate audit evidence to provide a basis for an audit opinion on the redevelopment activities and the effect of these has not been determined.

Qualified Auditor's Opinion

In our opinion, except for the matters described in the Basis for Qualified Auditor's Opinion paragraphs, the financial report presents fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Claremont Football Club Inc. as at 31 October 2016 and its financial performance for the year then ended in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 1 of the financial report, and the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act (WA) 1987.

Emphasis of Matter

Without further qualifying our opinion, we draw attention to Note 1 in the financial report which indicates that the Club made a deficit for the year of \$178,188. This condition, along with other matters as set forth in Note 1, indicate the existence of a material uncertainty which may cast significant doubt about the ability of the Club to continue as a going concern and whether it will realise its assets and extinguish its liabilities in the normal course of business and at the amounts stated in the financial report.

Basis of Accounting

Without further modifying our opinion, we draw attention to Note 1 of the financial report, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial report has been prepared to assist Claremont Football Club Inc to meet the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act (WA) 1987. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose.

1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared to satisfy the financial report preparation requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1987 (WA). The directors have determined that the club is not a reporting entity.

Basis of Preparation

The report has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Act, and the following policies:

Reporting Basis and Conventions

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical cost.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the club in the preparation of the financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

(a) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash on hand and in banks and short-term deposits are stated at nominal value.

For the purposes of the Statement of Cash Flows, cash includes cash on hand and in banks and money market investments readily convertible to cash within 2 working days, net of outstanding bank overdrafts.

Bank overdrafts are carried at the principal amount. Interest is charged as an expense as it accrues.

(b) Trade and other receivables

Trade receivables are recognised and carried at original invoice amount less a provision for any uncollectable debts. An estimate for doubtful debts is made when collection of the full amount is no longer probable. Bad debts are written off as incurred.

Receivables from related parties are recognised and carried at the nominal amount due. Interest is taken up as income on an accrual basis.

(c) Property, Plant and Equipment

Depreciation is calculated primarily on a straight line basis so as to write off the net cost of each fixed asset over its expected useful life.

Major depreciation periods are:

- * Plant and equipment 3-20 years; and
- * Furniture and fittings 5-20 years.

(d) Inventories

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(e) Leases

Leases are classified at their inception as either operating or finance leases based on the economic substance of the agreement so as to reflect the risks and benefits incidental to ownership.

Operating leases

The minimum lease payments of operating leases, where the lessor effectively retains substantially all of the risks and benefits of ownership of the leased item, are recognised as an expense on a straight line basis.

Contingent rentals are recognised as an expense in the financial year in which they are incurred.

Finance leases

Leases which effectively transfer substantially all of the risks and benefits incidental to ownership of the leased item to the club are capitalised at the present value of the minimum lease payments and disclosed as property, plant and equipment under lease. A lease liability of equal value is also recognised.

Capitalised lease assets are depreciated over the shorter of the estimated useful life of the assets and the lease term. Minimum lease payments are allocated between interest expense and reduction of the lease liability with the interest expense calculated using the interest rate implicit in the lease and charged directly to the statement of financial performance.

The cost of improvements to or on leased property is capitalised, disclosed as leasehold improvements, and amortised over the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements, whichever is the shorter.

(f) Trade and other payables

Liabilities for trade creditors and other amounts are carried at cost which is the fair value of the consideration to be paid in the future for goods and services received, whether or not billed to the club.

(g) Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the club and the revenue can be reliably measured. The following specific recognition criteria must also be met before revenue is recognised:

Sale of Goods

Control of the goods has passed to the buyer.

Rendering of Services

Where the contract outcome can be reliably measured:

- control of a right to be compensated for the services has been attained and the stage of completion can be reliably measured. Stage of completion is measured by reference to the labour hours incurred to date as a percentage of total estimated labour hours for each contract.

Where the contract outcome cannot be reliably measured:

- revenue is recognised only to the extent that costs have been incurred.

Interes

Control of a right to receive consideration for the provision of, or investment in, assets has been attained.

1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(h) Employee entitlements

Provision is made for employee entitlement benefits accumulated as a result of employees rendering services up to the reporting date. These benefits include wages and salaries, annual leave, sick leave and long service leave.

Liabilities arising in respect of wages and salaries, annual leave, sick leave and any other employee entitlements expected to be settled within twelve months of the reporting date are measured at their nominal amounts. All other employee entitlement liabilities are measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflow to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date. In determining the present value of future cash outflows, the interest rates attaching to government guaranteed securities which have terms to maturity approximating the terms of the related liability are used.

Employee entitlements expenses and revenues arising in respect of the following categories:

- wages and salaries, non-monetary benefits, annual leave, long service leave, sick leave and other leave entitlements; and
- other types of employee entitlements are charged against profits on a net basis in their respective categories.

(i) Income Tax

The Club is not subject to income tax and as such there is no provision for income tax payable.

(j) Impairment

The carrying value of assets are reviewed each reporting date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If any such indications exist, the assets recoverable amount is estimated.

An impairment loss is recognised whenever the carrying amount of an asset or its cash generating unit exceeds its recoverable amount. Impairment losses are recognised in the income statement.

(k) Going Concern

The financial report has been prepared on a going concern basis, which assumes continuity of normal business activities and the realisation of assets and settlement of liabilities in the ordinary course of business.

For the year ended 2016, the Club made a deficit of \$178,188 (2015: deficit of \$49,775) and has an Accumulated Funds deficit of \$81,849 (2015 surplus \$96,339).

Subsequent to year end on the 17th November the Club received conditional approval from Westpac Banking Corporation (ABN 33 007 457 141), to obtain a Business Overdraft facility of \$400,000 which would be secured over the property situated at Davies Road currently being built. This approval is subject to certain conditions with which the Board believes can be complied.

The ability of the Club to continue as a going concern is principally dependent upon the support of the Westpac Banking Corporation (ABN 33 007 457 141) members and sponsors. These conditions indicate a material uncertainty that may cast significant doubt about the ability of the Club to continue as a going concern. In the event the above matters are not achieved, the Club will be required to raise funds from other sources.

The Board has prepared a budget, which indicates that the Club will have sufficient cash flows to meet all commitments and working capital requirements for the 12 month period from the date of signing this financial report, which includes the drawdown of the bank facility which will commence in December 2016 subject to the compliance of approval conditions.

Should the Club be unable to continue as a going concern it may be required to realise its assets and extinguish its liabilities other than in the normal course of business and at amounts different to those stated in the financial statements. The financial statements do not include any adjustments relating to the recoverability and classification of asset carrying amounts or to the amount and classification of liabilities that might result should the Club be unable to continue as a going concern and meet its debts as and when they fall due.
