PRESIDENT'S REPORT

GRANT POVEY

The highlight of the year, in a condensed season, was the Club fielding 3 teams in the Grand Final and winning the prestigious Rodriguez Shield.

I'm proud that the Board worked together to make hard decisions in February to reduce costs, and manage our financial commitments during the Pandemic. The Board is appreciative of all our sponsors, patrons, platinum members and members who stuck with us during the tough times.

The Board's vision for the next 5 years is to:

1. Be the powerhouse Club of the WAFL, on and off the field;

2. Invest in our Talent Pathway to ensure that 90% of our league side is comprised of players developed from within our zones;

Be a community hub for our junior football teams; and
 Have sustainable, strong financial performance, with no debt

The Football Affairs Committee, comprising Darcy Coffey (CEO) Kepler Bradley (FM) Tony Evans (Football Director), Brian Beresford (VP), Darrel Panizza and myself carried out a review to determine what the Club required for the next 5 to 10 years - in the context of a changing football environment. Following this review, and upon the completion of Darren Harris' contractual commitment with the Club, the Board unanimously determined to seek a new Coach rather than offer Darren a new contract. These decisions are never easy, but it was made with the best interests of the Club at heart.

We would like to thank Darren for his efforts over the last 4 years, which culminated in the narrow Grand Final loss, and we wish him all best for the future.

The Board is excited to have appointed former Claremont player and Coach, Ash Prescott, as our Coach for the next 3 years. Ash returns to the Club with an impressive resume. Ash has spent the past 13 years (since leaving Claremont in 2007) coaching within the AFL system, including holding Senior Assistant roles at Essendon, Fremantle and Gold Coast.

I know that Ash has already made an impact on the players that have had the chance to meet him. I am confident that the players are ready for the next chapter of their careers and will be striving to take that next step together to get the ultimate success.

I would like to thank my fellow board members. (My philosophy is to surround myself with people who are smarter than me!)

The WAFL industry is envious of the quality of our Board. I take great pride in the fact that we have robust, honest discussions around the board table, and we are all prepared to listen to the views of others.

FINANCES

The Club has recorded an nett operating surplus of \$562,292 for the financial year ended 31 October 2020. This is an outstanding result, although we are conscious of the vulnerability of our revenue streams to a potential future COVID related lockdown. Our strong result was aided by Government Assistance programs, including Job Keeper, PAYG incentives, that were put in place due to COVID. The shortened season, and a corresponding reduction in player payments that was mutually agreed by the WAFC with the COP that also contributed to the strong financial result.

The pleasing financial result means that we ended the year with no outstanding bank debt, having paid down the 5 year term loan almost 2 years ahead of schedule, and with our overdraft facility being undrawn.

Nevertheless, the Club is still very much reliant on the continued support of our members, sponsors and volunteers. The Club would simply not exist without your continued support.

COACHES AND PLAYERS

I would like to also thank all the coaches, managers, support staff, medical teams in all 3 grades for their amazing efforts during an extraordinary season. To make the Grand Final in all 3 grades was an outstanding effort by all involved.

VOLUNTEERS

We are indeed fortunate to have a team of loyal and passionate volunteers that give of their time to the Club.



I would like thank:

• Monday's Dad's Army led by Ian Haggerty, for keeping the club in order as well as keeping me accountable. We all thank you for your hard work with anything that needs to be done;

CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

DARCY COFFEY

Unprecedented – clearly the word of 2020 and an apt description of the year that was.

A pre-season that went for close to 8 months, a third of which was completed in isolation. Staff members losing their jobs as our function rooms became dormant indefinitely. Our changerooms empty and motionless at a time when they should have been full of life and activity. And people across the country were literally fighting over toilet paper.

Throughout April and May, as our Club implemented our own austerity measures in the face of the invisible threat to our livelihoods (e.g. Kep mowing the oval with his whipper snipper), the competition congregated over Zoom to determine how to commence the playing season with the health and financial constraints the globe was facing. Sacrifices were made, conditions were set, and then reset, and then tweaked again in the ever-shifting landscape.

Yet, how guickly things change. Be it luck, location, good management or some of each, the State bounced back to work quickly. Suddenly, the pause on life that the pandemic had created here seemed like a distant memory. Our single round season finally kicked off in July, and for all the restrictions in place, pretty much ran like clockwork. We witnessed some fantastic football across the 6 grades, we had some magnificent lunches and events, we saw the emergence of exciting new talent, attendances were up, and people were thirsty. Whilst Grand Final appearances across the three men's grades did not result in the cups we craved, we were able to earn our first Rodriguez shield in 7 years and this is certainly a measure of a strong club and something we can be very proud of.

But whilst separation was a near universal solution to the global events facing us, the sense of togetherness and community it inadvertently fostered should not be forgotten. The care and compassion people displayed for others during this time was profound. In the months of uncertainty between March and June, not one of our 1,500+ members asked for their money back. Not only that, but a couple of people even made some regular deposits to the Club for which we are extremely grateful.

Despite the economic impact of the pandemic, there was also little hesitation from our loyal sponsors to honour agreements in what ended up being a very different season to what they expected. Particular mention must go to our key partners during this extraordinary time;

I believe they have handled the challenges of 2020 with incredible resilience and commitment and I would like to thank Grant, Brian, Tony, Tim, Darrell, Jenny, Jeremy & Rachel personally for their support and leadership through the trying times that this year has presented.





In relation to the club's staff, who have all endured plenty over the course of the year, I would like to thank:

• Darren – Thank you for your four years at the helm. Your care of players in particular was unquestionable and although not able to taste premiership success, much of what you fostered will help us continue to develop and grow as a Club.

• Likewise to our faithful coaching lieutenants in Steve, Brayden, Josh, Ryan & Dave for all their time and effort over the past year and previous campaigns.

• Matt, Ash and their respective coaching groups within the colts and futures programs. We have not had the highest percentage of locally zoned players at senior level for decades by accident – the work put in at this level is critical and I couldn't think of better custodians. • Kepler, Jordan & Jodi have managed their playing groups through this disrupted and disjointed campaign. The impacts of the season's hurdles are far greater than football and even a physical perspective, so to help our playing groups and support staff navigate this was no small feat.

• Will, Zoe & Georgina who all left us throughout the year as a consequence of the Covid lockdown.

• Lisa, Holly & Pat who have picked up myriad responsibilities, taken everything in their stride and carried the Club through the year from an operational perspective.

• Ari, Mitch, and, more recently Emma, have taken on running the bar and function centre with aplomb – the feedback on their manner and level of service has been phenomenal.

Although shorter in number of games played than any other season in my lifetime, Season 2020 will leave a long and lasting impact on us all. As we look forward, I must congratulate Ash Prescott who takes the reins as our senior coach in 2021. Not only does he bring a wealth of experience from his time in the football industry, when going through the interview process Ash talked about taking the role would be tantamount to 'coming home'. You can make a dollar from rent, or over the bar at a function, but it's this connection to the Club that will take us forward into the future.

I would ask everyone who supports the Club to celebrate the positives of the season, and to harness the challenges we have faced to drive the Club forward. And in the spirit of how we tackled 2020, let's do it together.

The Claremont Football Club pays tribute to the following members of the Tigers "family" who passed away during 2020

TULLY Collin, Player No. 644, who delighted Claremont fans in the early 1970s with his dashing play in the centre, died in Victoria this year at the age of 71. He joined Claremont in 1971 and made 53 appearances for the Tigers over three seasons before returning to Victoria.

BRADY Brian, Past CFC Player, passed away on the 13th May 2020. Brady played 59 Games during his time at the club from 1953 to 1956, as Player No.401.

MITCHELL Dawn, Nan of CFC Captain Kane Mitchell, as well as an inspiring person to many Claremont Players, passed away at the age of 91. Dawn's love for watching Kane play football was so strong throughout his entire career. She never missed a game and supported the Claremont Football Club specifically in so many ways.

JOHNSTON Rob, has been a supporter and member of the Claremont Football Club his entire life. He passed away at the age of 82. He was such a likeable character and the Dad's Army were so excited when he joined them 7 years ago.

LEACH Quenton, Player No. 881, played 61 games and won Best and Fairest in 1994. With heavy hearts we have lost 1993 Claremont premiership player Quentin Leach to cancer, aged 47. Tough as they come Quentin went on to become an inaugural Fremantle Docker and more recently has been involved back within the Tigers District at his boyhood club Marist JFC.

CLARKO Jim, a dedicated Claremont supporter and benefactor, died at the age of 87. He made a valuable contribution to the club, serving as a vice-patron for 22 years, from 1997 to 2018. He was much loved by the club as an enthusiastic supporter at home matches and at club functions.

POWER Doreen, The Ladies Committee wish to express their sadness on the passing of a wonderful lady Doreen Power, a long-time volunteer of the CFC Ladies Committee. Her wonderful company and sense of humour will be sadly missed.

GOLDIE Ian, Player No. 454. Former Claremont footballer and club president Ian Goldie passed away this year, aged in his early eighties. Ian became Club President in 1986. He was a ruckman/forward who played in 24 league matches, making his debut against East Fremantle at East Fremantle Oval on June 9, 1956.

CLUNE Kevin, Player No.413 ("The Carnamah Kid"}, who became a Legend, and one of the most popular players at our Club passed away this year. Clune played 231 games, being a two times Best and Fairest and a State Representative. Kevin's Funeral took place on 2 January 2020

LEWIS Irwin, Player No.493. A hard hitting, "no nonsense " player in the 50s and 60s, who played in the 1964 Premiership team. Irwin's three son's Cameron, Clayton and Chris, all played with distinction for Claremont, the latter becoming a star for the West Coast Eagles. Irwin passed away on 28 January 2020

CLUNE Gary, Kevin's son, passed away on 18 February 2020

HYDE John, Player No. 430, Captain/ Coach in 1955 and 1956. John played 37 games for Claremont, winning the Best and Fairest in 1955 and representing WA in the same year. He was previously an outstanding Dual Premiership Player and Best and Fairest player for Geelong in the 50s. John passed away on 26 March 2020.

FOOTBALL OPERATIONS MANAGER KEPLER BRADLEY

After a gruelling 5-month pre-season which started in November 2019, the WAFL season was put on hold in March due to the global Covid-19 pandemic. This brought great uncertainty to not only the WAFL competition but to all competitions around Australia. When we notified the players that we wouldn't know if or when the season would start, the playing group led by our leadership group were straight on the front foot, asking what they could do to get the edge on other teams and help us win the next WAFL premiership. The players started training individually and then in groups of 5, then 10, then 20, until we got to a point where we could train as a whole group, adhering to the strict government protocols along each step of the way. The WAFL Commission eventually gave us the green light for the season start on Saturday 18th July. The hybrid season saw an 8-game home and away season with a top 4 finals series and when the fixtures were released our round 1 game was against raining premiers Subiaco at Leederville oval.

To have all 3 grades (Colts, Reserves, League) finish top 3 on the ladder and eventually play in grand finals was an incredible effort despite not quite hitting the heights we were expecting. Our young Reserves team, led by first year coach Ryan MacKenzie, started the season slow having won 1 game of the first 4. Despite losing in round 5 against an unbeaten East Perth team, it was an encouraging display and with the leadership of senior players (Curren, Lee, Manuel, Ledger), it was the catalyst to winning the last 5 games including both Semi Final and Preliminary Final victories. A mature East Perth outfit got the better of us on grand final day but one thing our football department is confident of is that a number of young players have bright futures. Anthony Davis was best on ground in the grand final using his deadly kick to great effect. The development of key position players Jack Buller, Steve Miller, Billy Reilly and Max Minear has reassured us that we have the best talented talls in the competition. Charlie Malone looked dangerous up forward, while Max Spyvee and Ben

Elliott had terrific seasons through the midfield, which saw Max eventually make his League debut and play in a League grand final.

The football played by the Reserves team late in the year certainly had a positive influence on where the League side finished on the premiership table. Our League side had a strong start beating Subiaco in Round 1, where we played 4 debutants and saw Ryan Lim achieve his 100 games milestone. We then had an indifferent period during the middle of the season until we played West Perth in our last game of the year needing victory to have any hope in finishing 2nd on the ladder and giving ourselves a double chance. We kicked 5 goals in the first quarter to set up victory while strangling West Perth's scoring opportunities throughout the game and eventually running out 31-point winners. Our attention turned to the last game of the year between West Perth and Subiaco where we relied on percentage to jump ahead of West Perth. West Perth at 3 guarter time were 46 points up and looked certain to finish in 2nd spot until a gallant Subiaco team kicked 5 of the last 6 goals to send Claremont into 2nd spot by just 0.2%.

With our tails in the air after an unlikely result we ventured down to Fremantle Oval to play South Fremantle in the 2nd Semi-final. A confident South Fremantle knowing they have had the better of us in 4 of the last 5 clashes were met by a determined Claremont side which held South Fremantle goalless to half time. The performances of Jye Bolton, Alec Watermen and Declan Mountford made sure Claremont went on to secure a grand final appearance. South Fremantle now had to beat West Perth in a preliminary final the following week which they were able to do.

The stage was set for a Claremont v South Fremantle Grand Final. It was a highly physical high-pressure game which saw the scores tight throughout. Heavy hits and gut running from both sides saw a range of injuries. Captain Kane Mitchell dislocated his shoulder in the first quarter and amazingly returned to the field to help his team mates out. Ben Edwards copped a heavy hit in the 2nd quarter which forced him off the ground until after half time where he returned and contributed well. With the game being played at high intensity both teams were fatiguing late in the game with a number of players from both sides cramping. In the dying minutes we had it locked in our forward line only needing a goal to lead. Ball up after ball up, tackle after tackle, we were unable to get a clear kick away. South Fremantle eventually got a clearing kick away and as Haydn Busher was running back in defence to gather the loose ball, the siren went. Although we were on the wrong side of the scoreboard no one can knock the effort of the 22 players that took their place on the field. Alec Watermen was impressive again up forward kicking 3 goals whilst Declan Mountford and Jared Hardisty worked tirelessly in the midfield and Baily Rogers again provided bounce off half back. Rylie Morgan was a shining light with his best performance to date

at League level in his short career and Jye Bolton had an incredible game and was clearly the best player on the ground, winning the Simpson medal in a losing side.

There is a lot to like about our 2020 Tigers. 6 players made their League debut in a significantly shortened season. Tom Baldwin won best first year player playing all 10 games whilst Alec Waterman won his first E.B Cook medal after an outstanding year playing in the forward line. Recruit Ryan Nyhuis provided much needed leadership to our young group as well as playing multiple positions and Kimberley product Ed McGinty provided a spark around goals. Oliver Eastland was back to his best in the ruck whilst Declan Mountford, Jye Bolton and Jared Hardisty continue to be among the competition's elite midfielders. Bailey Rogers was used both in the midfield and across half back to great affect and Anton Hamp played a new role up forward where he looked dangerous. Callan England had an outstanding year playing both in the forward line and midfield. Haydn Busher and Declan Hardisty were ever reliable in defence and rarely got beaten.

As we look forward to 2021 there is a real excitement amongst the playing group. Key players Lachie Martinis (ankle) and Jack Beeck (ACL) will return after both missing the entirety of season 2020. New recruits Jason Carter, Francis Watson, Anthony Treacy and Isaiah Butters will strengthen both forward and backlines next year. I look forward to seeing these guys have great pre-seasons and add to an already talented and driven young group.

• 89% of players were local zoned, once again leading the WAFL competition with the next best at 71%.

• Top 3 in this years League B&F was Alec Waterman, Jye Bolton and Jared Hardisty.

• Top 3 in this years Reserves B&F was Tom Curren, Ben Elliott and Jack Buller.

• Jye Bolton won his 3rd Simpson Medal.

• Milestones achieved by Anton Hamp- 150 games (life membership), Ryan Lim- 100 games and Harry McCracken- 50 games.

TALENT MANAGER

2020 was already a different year for the Claremont Talent Programs long before the COVID-19 Pandemic took hold. A new Talent Manager, a new Colts Coach, a new Futures Coach and a fresh and inexperienced Colts Squad all made for some exciting challenges, but through plenty of hard work by many amazing people, our programs were again able to achieve terrific outcomes both on and off the field.

WAFL COLTS

With only five players from last year's Colts Premiership team returning to our 2020 squad, our Colts group went into the season with many external observers doubting their credentials. A mixed bag of performances throughout our practice matches only served to enhance these doubts, however these had long been dispelled by the time the boys reached a 6-0 win-loss record to begin the home and away season.

At times leading up to then, there were doubts whether we would even have a season, and it must be said that the maturity and dedication with which the boys approached our enforced 10-week group training hiatus was outstanding. Led by Coach Matt Angus, the group remained in very regular contact throughout the break and kept each other's spirits up while training in smaller groups. I have no doubt that the work completed during the COVID break to keep our playing group connected (and in actual fact bringing them closer together) was a significant driver behind our eventual successes on the field once the season got underway.

The end result after the shutdown period was an 8-game home and away season, which was obviously a great outcome in comparison to other underage competitions such as the NAB League in Victoria which were unable to get any season underway, but clearly still frustrating in the limitations this placed on the number of players we were able to expose to Colts football throughout the season.

That being said, we were ultimately quite satisfied with still managing to play 36 players throughout those eight games, of which 24 were debutants throughout the season and another three had played only one game prior to this year. Within this 36, we were also proud to have played five players from our Great Southern zone and two from our Kimberley zone. Particularly in a 'COVID Year' where our regionallyzoned players were even more impacted by the 12-week shutdown than others by heading home over this period, these are figures we should be really satisfied with.

Our only home and away loss came in Round 7 against a highly talented East Fremantle side who managed to piece together one of the best quarters of Colts football by any team all year to see us down six goals to zero at quarter time. Outside of that, we had a mix of dominant and closely fought wins, which ultimately saw us finish on top of the ladder with a 7-1 record. Highlights were gutsy victories over more fancied opponents Subiaco and West Perth to bookend our home and away season, and two large triumphs in consecutive weeks over Swan Districts and South Fremantle in Rounds 2 and 3.

Our finals campaign kicked off with another brave victory over a gallant Subiaco side in the 2nd Semi Final, who went on to demolish East Fremantle in the Preliminary Final meaning they approached our Grand Final match-up with plenty of confidence. Unfortunately, Subiaco proved far too good on the day – a disappointing outcome

for our players and staff who deserved a positive result for their efforts all year, but credit to the Lions. They had been a formidable opponent in our two previous encounters where we managed to get over the line, so we were not surprised by their impressive performance on Grand Final Day.

While October 4th ended up becoming a somewhat sour day for the entire football club, as a Colts group we ultimately look back on the year incredibly satisfied with what we achieved and the manner in which we approached the year. We played an exciting brand of football and had an incredibly tight-knit playing group that have formed bonds that will last a lifetime. What the boys achieved together this year as a group stretches far beyond defeat in the last game of the year.

As would be expected in a minor premiership-winning side, we had several players who achieved a great deal of individual recognition at the back end of the year.

The absence of a U18 National Championships this year provided an increased number of players with the opportunity to take part in two NAB U18 All Star Matches during October. Well done to the following boys who achieved selection for these matches and all performed admirably: Samuel Alvarez, Jack Avery, Logan Guelfi, Kalin Lane, Jacob van Rooyen, Joel Western, Jake Willson and Logan Young. CFC Senior Player and 2019 Colts Premiership Player Max Spyvee was also selected after his outstanding season which shows the possibilities for what young players straight out of Colts football can achieve through plenty of hard work and dedication.

Congratulations are also due for the following players who were named in the 2020 WAFL Simply Energy Colts Team of the Year: Jack Avery (Centre Half Back), Samuel Alvarez (Wing), Jacob van Rooyen (Centre Half Forward), Logan Young (Rover) and Logan Guelfi (Interchange).

To close out our individual recognitions for the 2020 Colts Program, congratulations to Logan Young whose consistent season saw him named a thoroughly deserving winner of the Tom Richardson Trophy for the Colts Fairest and Best. After building his confidence and experience at the level throughout last season, Logan stepped up to become the competition's premier inside midfielder in 2020, leading the league for Contested Possessions, Clearances and Tackles. Logan edged out emerging defender Jack Avery, whose perfect 30/30 votes in our Grand Final defeat threatened to sway the result his way. Explosive midfielder Jake Willson was rewarded for his eye-catching season with a 3rd place finish. The Tony Evans MVP Trophy was awarded to Joel Western whose performances either side of a mid-year hamstring injury were as exciting as we've come to expect from Joel over the last three seasons. Reliable key defender Jacob Blight was acknowledged by his teammates with the Players' Player Award for his efforts in regularly shutting down the opposition's best key forward, while Leith Fitzpatrick received the WAFL Combined Past Players & Officials Association's Encouragement Award following a strong season playing across half forward.

Finally, my sincere thanks to a few key football club volunteers who are the heartbeat of what we do and great supporters of the Colts program – Property Manager Jack Denton, Carol Millband and the Ladies Committee for the rolls after every home game, and Les Gillies, Frank Riccelli, Phil McGann and the Past Players & Officials Association for their monetary contributions to our program and the Thursday night Sausage Sizzles during the finals.

WAFL FUTURES

They say talent only gets you so far, and that was definitely the case for our Futures squad in the early stages of their season. A supremely talented group were given a great reality check in Round 1 but turned things around superbly from there under the guidance of new Head



Coach Ashley Clancy and his experienced team of assistants. This increase in highly credentialled coaches within our Futures Program was a big focus for this year and gladly paid significant dividends.

All Star Matches were also played at U16s level this year, with our Futures squad providing a remarkable 14 representatives for these fixtures. These were Edward Allan, Will Bailey, Mitchell Barron, Luke Brown, Harrison Cole, Alex Condon, Lewis Crump, Hugh Davies, Joshua Ledger, Rohan MacNeill, Dallas McAdam, Fletcher Netherway, Conrad Williams and William Wolf.

With such a talented group, our end of season awards were always set to be hotly contested, but in the end the following boys are to be congratulated: Encouragement Award – Julian Maceri, Tiger Award – Joshua Ledger, Most Consistent Award – Rohan MacNeill, MVP Award – Mitchell Barron and Emerging Talent Award – Luke Brown.

Thank you to Coach Ashley Clancy and his Assistant Coaches Ryan Pontifex, Craig Rogers, Declan Cormack, Sam Cousens, Ricki Smith and Scott Thornton, and Head S&C Coach Marlee Hedley and her Assistant S&C Coach Samantha Harvey for all their efforts with the 2020 Futures Program.

DEVELOPMENT SQUADS

Unfortunately, it was decided that 15s Development Squad Programs would not be able to go ahead across the WAFL in 2020. Our 14s Development Squad Program was able to take place in an abbreviated fashion though, packing nine sessions into a four-and-ahalf-week period, which was a big effort for coaches and players alike. While shorter than our normal engagements, it was great to be able to get another new 'intake' of our next Claremont players and their families through the doors and introduce them to what we're all about.

It is a credit to the work these men did in preparing the boys for games in such a short space of time that we put in three quality performances during early October which underlined what we hope will be a promising future for this group coming through our ranks in the years ahead.

REGIONAL DEVELOPMENT

It's been a challenging year for our regional academies, with all of their usual regional football carnivals cancelled.

PRESCOTT AIMS TO ENTERTAIN

Ash Prescott, delighted to be back at Claremont after 13 years in coaching roles in the AFL system, declares that one of his priorities as the club's league coach is to provide a strong brand of football that entertains and is attractive to watch.

"Providing the members and supporters an attractive style of football with a team which is committed to playing together, really working hard, moving the ball fast and scoring goals," is one of my main aims said Prescott, who has been appointed as Claremont's senior coach for the next three years.

"I think that is part of coaching these days. As coaches we have a responsibility to provide a good product, and that's not necessarily being overly offensive or overly defensive. It's having a good balance between attack and defence, and, of course, being really hard at the ball.

"I'll require our players to play for each other; first and foremost that they work hard, and I don't think that it is always the person with the ball; it's about the person without the ball who is putting some protection on, whether it is a block or running to create some space for a teammate to run into.

"So, I'll be making sure that the players are working together. I watched a few Claremont games this year and the league team looked really competent. I also watched some colts and reserves football, and the club looks strong across all three grades.

"From an overall view it appears there's some really wellequipped young men and there looks to be a lot of depth and a lot of good young players coming through, as well as some senior players with good experience."

The 48-year-old Prescott has a wonderful affinity with the Tigers, with whom he represented in the 2003 season when he played in 18 league matches as a skilful and athletic midfielder and occasional half-back. He had the distinction of polling 29 votes and finishing equal third with Mark Seaby behind Shane Beros and Kris Miller in the Sandover Medal. He and Andrew Browne were the Claremont players chosen in the WAFL Team of the Year.

Prescott appeared in 90 AFL matches with Richmond from 1993 to 1998 before being drafted by the Fremantle Dockers, with whom he played 38 matches between 1999 and 2001 before accepting his first coaching appointment as the man in charge of the Claremont colts side in 2002.

In 2003 he had the arduous task of coaching the colts and also playing league football for Claremont. The seniors were defeated by East Perth in the first semi-final and the colts lost the grand final to South Fremantle.

"It was quite a big day on Saturdays for me that year, with the colts playing early in the morning and then playing for



the league side in the afternoon," Prescott said. "The ladies looked after me with some nice sandwiches and I also enjoyed an Arthur's burger after the colts games. Often, I'd have a bit of a sleep before the league match."

Prescott then was appointed Claremont's league coach, and in four seasons the club qualified for the grand final three times and finished third in 2006 after losing the preliminary final by three points. The Tigers were beaten by Subiaco in the grand finals in 2004 and 2007 and were beaten by South Fremantle in the 2005 grand final.

"They're memories tinged with disappointment, but also with the feel that we gave it our best shot," said Prescott. "We played with great spirit and a good style of play but came up against sides that were too strong for us on the day."

Prescott returns to Claremont with a wealth of knowledge after having played under many outstanding AFL coaches and then in the past 13 years working as an assistant to several more.

"At Richmond I played under Kevin Bartlett, Allan Jeans (who also coached my father David at St Kilda in the early 1960s), John Northey, Robert Walls and Jeff Gieschen," Prescott said. "With Bartlett it was just the passion and love for the Tigers, Jeans just had a great balance of being able to support you but challenge you as well."

After his four years at the helm at Claremont Prescott was snapped up as an assistant coach to his former Richmond teammate Matthew Knights at Essendon --- after the longserving Kevin Sheedy had retired.

"I was the midfield coach and in charge of offensive defence (ball movement) for three years before Knights was moved on," said Prescott. "Essendon wanted me to stay, but we (the family) had this pull to return to Perth, and the Fremantle Dockers gave me the opportunity.

"I did three years (2011-12-13) at Fremantle under Ross Lyon, who was assistant coach to Robert Walls when I was playing for Richmond and I respected him a lot as a coach. I worked with him with team defence and I was also in a development role, helping the players who were transitioning from the WAFL clubs."

Prescott joined the Gold Coast Suns in 2014 when Guy McKenna (his coach at Claremont in 2003) was there, along with Mark Riley, who coached the Claremont league side in 2001 and 2002.

"I thoroughly enjoyed my time with Gold Coast where I had a variety of roles over seven years, working with coaches Guy McKenna, Rodney Eade and Stuart Dew," said Prescott. "I had jobs as a midfield and forward coach and overseeing and running the development program."

When the coronavirus pandemic disrupted the 2020 season, the Suns were forced to drastically reduce their coaching staff, and Prescott, his wife Kate and their sons Xavier and Will returned to live in Perth.

"My No. 1 priority was to settle the family back in Western Australia because we had done too much travelling, which wasn't ideal for the boys," Prescott explained. "The Claremont job was a bit of a surprise. Obviously, I wanted to stay involved with coaching; that's what I love doing.

WATERMAN IN RARE COMPANY BY KEN CASELLAS

For Alec Waterman, a brilliant and powerful midfielder in his teenage years, to emerae from the depths

in his teenage years, to emerge from the depths of despair four years ago and reinvent himself as a dynamic forward for Claremont was one of the most heart-warming stories in football in 2020.

The 24-year-old left-footer joined a rare group when he was voted the winner of the E. B. Cook Medal as the fairest-and-best player in the league side after a dominant season in attack.

He joined Ian Richardson as only the second footballer in Claremont's 95-year history to be named as the fairest-and-best player in the same year as being the club's leading goalkicker when employed as a permanent forward.

Richardson, another skilful left-footer, won the Cook Medal when he was the club's leading scorer with 62 goals in 20 matches in 2008, his first season in the senior side.

In the abbreviated season of eight qualifying-round matches and two finals for the Tigers this year, Waterman stood out like a beacon with his superb play. He scored 26 goals and played a significant role in several others. He ended the season in a blaze of glory, scoring four goals in the side's final qualifyinground match against West Perth, four against South Fremantle in the second semi-final and three against the Bulldogs in the grand final.

His was a notable feelgood comeback to stardom after his career was in limbo in 2016 and 2017 when he was laid low with glandular fever which left him fatigued and exhausted both physically and mentally.


This was a serious blow to the young man who had represented Western Australia in the 2012 16s carnival and had shone for the State at the under-18 carnivals in the following two years, as well as earning the Mel Whinnen Medal as the best player with 22 disposals, seven inside 50s, two goals and five tackles when Claremont beat South Fremantle in the 2013 colts grand final.

Waterman was selected by the West Coast Eagles in the 2014 national AFL draft before being struck down by his debilitating illness the following year. He was unable to play in 2016, 2017 and 2018, and he now admits that he was concerned that he might not be able to play again. "But I never gave up hope," he said. "However, I didn't think I'd be able to play the same footy as I used to play. I was okay with the prospect of being able to play a bit, here and there, and being a part of a team would be good. There were days when I thought that was possible.

"The first couple of years were pretty ordinary and I was in no-man's land before I started to feel a bit better towards the end of 2017, and I was most appreciative when Harro (coach Darren Harris), Darcy Coffey (football operations manager) and Kepler Bradley (player development manager) got in touch. I can't thank them for reaching out, showing me that love and understanding and not putting any pressure on me."

He started with a running program, and midway through the 2018 season he made his long-awaited return to action and played eight reserves matches for the Tigers. He began the 2019 season with the reserves before graduating to play in 12 league contests and kicking 19 goals.

This year Waterman was used in a variety of forward roles, playing at full-forward, at centre-half-forward and on a flank.



"This season was weird, with the interrupted pre-season and the late start," he said. "Then, in a couple of practice games I hardly got a kick and scored just one goal. Practice games are different, and you don't get a proper read on things.

"Then, in the round one game against Subiaco, I played a pretty good game, and we all did. And I kept building on that."

Regarding his outstanding form in the finals against South Fremantle, Waterman said: "It is something I pride myself on, to play well and have an impact in big games. Bolts (Jye Bolton) does it in big games when he wins the ball constantly. As a forward, a way to have an impact is to give your team an option and be strong, and when you get an opportunity, kick a goal."

Waterman admitted that losing this year's grand final by three points to South Fremantle was heartbreaking. "After the second semi-final (in which Claremont defeated South Fremantle by 47 points) we were really confident," he said. "We knew that they weren't at their best, and how it was in the grand final was exactly what we expected, tight football with lots of pressure.

"But we thought we were good enough to get the job done. It was one of those games in which the result could go either way, a flip of the coin.

"Winning the fairest-and-best was awesome, and to have my name on the honour board alongside some of the best players who have played for the club will be pretty cool. But at the end of the day I would trade the medal for a premiership, every day."



service operator, declared that he was feeling good and his body was in good shape.

"There's definitely plenty of football ahead of me," he said. "Talk that I may be drafted is not a burden," he said. "This time around, I'm not too fussed. If an AFL club comes knocking, it's great. But if not, it will not worry me at all; it's not the end of the day like it was for me five or six years ago. Now, it's still important, but it is not as critical.

"It's a win-win situation. If I don't get drafted, I get to play for Claremont. And I can't wait to do that."

THE RP RODRIGUEZ SHIELD

The RP Rodriguez Shield honors a distinguished West Australian football administrator and respected contributor to WA Football, Pat Rodriguez. The Rodriguez Shield was introduced in 1957 and is presented to the most consistent team over the three grades of football. Rodriguez began his administrative career with Claremont, and later served terms as senior Vice President and President of the WANFL, and as President of the ANFC. Independent Auditor's Report

To the Members of Claremont Football Club Inc.

Qualified Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial report, being a special purpose financial report, of Claremont Football Club Inc. ("the Club"), which comprises the balance sheet as at 31 October 2020, the income statement and the statement of cash flows for the year ended on that date, notes comprising a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

In our opinion, except for the matters described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion section of our report, the financial report of Claremont Football Club Inc. presents fairly, in all material respects, the financial position as at 31 October 2020 and its financial performance for the year then ended in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 1 of the financial report, and the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act (WA) 2015.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

Revenue Recognition

As is common for organisations of this type, it is not practicable for the Club to maintain an effective system of internal control over cash receipts from gate takings (which has been reflected within "*Facilities - Other Income*") until their initial entry in the accounting records. Our audit relating to these items was therefore limited to the amounts recorded in the financial statements.

Redevelopment Activities

We draw attention to Note 4 in the financial report with respect to the Club's redevelopment activities. The funds received and spent on these activities have not been accounted for in this financial report (with the exception of amounts funded by the Club's loan facility as disclosed in Note 8), and as such our audit procedures have been limited to that of the Football Operations as presented in the financial report. As a result, we have not obtained appropriate audit evidence to provide a basis for an audit opinion on these activities and the effect of these has not been determined on the financial performance, position and cash flows of the Club.

The directors are responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Club's annual report for the year ended 31 October 2020, but does not include the financial report and our auditor's report thereon.

Our opinion on the financial report does not cover the other information and accordingly we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial report, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial report or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared to satisfy the financial report preparation requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2015 (WA). The directors have determined that the club is not a reporting entity.

Basis of Preparation

The report has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Act, and the following policies:

Reporting Basis and Conventions

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical cost.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the club in the preparation of the financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

(a) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash on hand and in banks and short-term deposits are stated at nominal value.

For the purposes of the Statement of Cash Flows, cash includes cash on hand and in banks and money market investments readily convertible to cash within 3 months, net of outstanding bank overdrafts.

Bank overdrafts are carried at the principal amount. Interest is charged as an expense as it accrues.

(b) Trade and other receivables

Receivables are recognised at amortised cost less any Expected Credit Losses (ECL). The club has reviewed its impairment methodology under AASB 9 for financial assets under the new ECL model for all its assets held at amortised cost. There has been no change in the impairment impacts on the financial statements as a result of this change in methodology.

Receivables from related parties are recognised and carried at the nominal amount due. Interest is taken up as income on an accrual basis.

(c) Property, Plant and Equipment

Depreciation is calculated primarily on a straight line basis so as to write off the net cost of each fixed asset over its expected useful life.

Major depreciation periods are:

- * Leasehold improvements 4-16 years
- * Plant and equipment 3-20 years; and
- * Furniture and fittings 5-20 years.

(d) Inventories

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(e) Leases

Leases are classified at their inception as either operating or finance leases based on the economic substance of the agreement so as to reflect the risks and benefits incidental to ownership.

Operating leases

Operating lease payments associated with short-term leases and leases of low-value assets are recognised on a straightline basis as an expense in profit or loss. Short term leases are leases with a lease term of 12 months or less. Low-value assets comprise of office equipment.

Contingent rentals are recognised as an expense in the financial year in which they are incurred.

Finance leases

Leases which effectively transfer substantially all of the risks and benefits incidental to ownership of the leased item to the club are capitalised at the present value of the minimum lease payments and disclosed as property, plant and equipment under lease. A lease liability of equal value is also recognised

Capitalised lease assets are depreciated over the shorter of the estimated useful life of the assets and the lease term. Minimum lease payments are allocated between interest expense and reduction of the lease liability with the interest expense calculated using the interest rate implicit in the lease and charged directly to the statement of financial performance.

The cost of improvements to or on leased property is capitalised, disclosed as leasehold improvements, and amortised over the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements, whichever is the shorter.

(f) Trade and other payables

Liabilities for trade creditors and other amounts are carried at cost which is the fair value of the consideration to be paid in the future for goods and services received, whether or not billed to the club.

(g) Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the association is expected to be entitled in exchange for transferring goods or services to a customer. For each contract with a customer, the association: identifies the contract with a customer; identifies the performance obligations in the contract; determines the transaction price which takes into account estimates of variable consideration and the time value of money; allocates the transaction price to the separate performance obligations on the basis of the relative stand-alone selling price of each distinct good or service to be delivered; and recognises revenue when or as each performance obligation is satisfied in a manner that depicts the transfer to the customer of the goods or services promised.

Variable consideration with the transaction price, if any, reflects concessions provided to the customers such as discounts, rebates and refunds, any potential bonuses receivable from the customer and any other contingent events. Such estimates are determined using either the 'expected value' or 'most likely amount' method. The measurement of the variable consideration is subject to a constraining principle whereby revenue will only be recognised to the extent that it is highly probably that a significant reversal in the amount of cumulative revenue recognised will not occur. The measurement constraint continues until the uncertainty associated with the variable consideration is subsequently resolved. Amounts received that are subject to the constraining principle are recognised as a refund liability.

Rental Income

Rental Income is recognised on a monthly basis at month end when the owner's statement is received from the property managers.

Sales revenue

Events, fundraising and raffles are recognised when received or receivable.

Donations

Donations are recognised at the time the pledge is made.

Grants

Grants are recognised at their fair value where there is a reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all attached conditions will be complied with.

Interest

Interest revenue is recognised as interest accrues using the effective interest method. This is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and allocating the interest income over the relevant period using the effective interest rate, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the net carrying amount of the financial assets.

Other revenue

Other revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(h) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the Balance Sheet are shown inclusive of GST. Cash flows are presented in the Cash Flow Statement on a gross basis, except for the GST component of investing and

financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

(i) Income Tax

The financial statements have been prepared on the basis that Claremont Football Club operations are exempt from income tax.

(j) Going Concern

The financial report has been prepared on a going concern basis, which assumes continuity of normal business activities and the realisation of assets and settlement of liabilities in the ordinary course of business.

For the year ended 2020 the Club made a net surplus of \$498,504 (2019: net surplus of \$150,050), generated net cash inflows from operating activities of \$410,189 (2019: inflows \$239,374) and at balance date had a working capital deficiency of \$57,726 (2019: \$459,276). Included in this working capital deficiency is \$53,640 of revenue received in advance (2019: \$206,996).

During the year the Club made principal repayments of \$122,296 with respect to its Westpac Bankiag Corporation "Westpac" five year secured loan which matures on 21st September 2022. As at balance date the Club has made repayments of \$245,113 in excess of its minimum repayments representing more than one year's scheduled minimum payments and there is no principal amount outstanding.

The Club has an overdraft facility with Westpac of \$400,000 which is repayable on demand; and as at balance date the entire amount of this overdraft facility was undrawn.

The Board has prepared a budget, which indicates that the Club will have sufficient cash flows to meet all commitments and working capital requirements for the 12 month period from the date of signing this financial report. On this basis, the Board is satisfied that the going concern basis of preparation is appropriate.

(k) New or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations adopted

Claremont Football Club Inc. has adopted all of the new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period. The impact from adoption of these Accounting Standards and Interpretations have been assessed below. AASB 16: teases

The Association has adopted AASB 16: Leases retrospectively with the cumulative effect of initially applying AASB 16 recognised at 1 November 2019. In accordance with AASB 16 the comparatives for the 2019 reporting period have not been restated.

Based on the assessment by the Association, it was determined there was no impact on the Association. As such, the Association has not recognised a lease liability and right-of-use asset for all leases (with the exception of short-term and low-value leases) recognised as operating leases under AASB 117: Leases where the Association is the lessee. There has been no significant change from prior year treatment for leases where the Association is a lessor, as the Association's current leases are short term in nature.

Lease liabilities are measured at the present value of the remaining lease payments, where applicable. The Association's Incremental borrowing rate as at 1 November 2019 was used to discount the lease payments. The right-of-use assets, where applicable for the remaining leases have been measured and recognised in the statement of financial position as at 1 November 2019 by taking into consideration the lease liability and the prepaid and accrued lease payments previously recognised as at 1 November 2019 (that are related to the lease).

The following practical expedients have been used by the Association in applying AASB 16 for the first time:

- For a portfolio of leases that have reasonably similar characteristics, a single discount rate has been applied.

- Leases that have a remaining lease term of less than 12 months as at November 2019 have been accounted for in the same way as short-term leases.

- The use of hindsight to determine lease terms on contracts that have options to extend or terminate.
- Applying AASB 16 to leases previously identified as leases under AASB 117: Leases and Interpretation 4:

Determining whether an arrangement contains a lease without reassessing whether they are, or contact, a lease at the date of initial application.

Not applying AASB 16 to leases previously not identified as containing a lease under AASB 117 and Interpretation 4.

Any new or amended Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted.

Redevelopment Activities

The Club has completed redevelopment activities at Claremont Oval pursuant to an agreement with LandCorp whereby the parties have agreed to the cancellation of the existing lease, and the granting of freehold title of the Clubhouse land to the Club on a conditional use basis. Redevelopment Activities were funded by Landcorp, up to an amount of \$16.5m, and have not been reflected in this financial report.

Maintenance Fund

During 2018, the excess land to the North of the Club facilities was sold by the Government and \$1.5m of the proceeds was granted to the Club pursuant to the terms of a Trust Deed.

Under the terms of the Trust Deed, the Club is required to keep these proceeds, and any interest earned, in an auditable Trust Account. The funds held in the Trust Account (separate to the financial statements) may only be applied to the costs of repairing, maintaining, and renewing the Club's premises in accordance with an Asset Management Plan that has been approved by the Government.

During the year, \$93,238 was expended on such repairs and maintenance. Of this amount, \$14,300 was sourced from the Trust Account, with the balance being funded by operating cashflows. At year end, the closing balance of the Trust Account was \$1,500,127.
