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## MISSION ACCOMPLISHED (PART A)

For the best part of the last decade, our club has been on a path of recovery and every year I report to members our status both on and off the field. It has been an extremely tough period for our great club with tougher decisions required along the way to ensure our survival. There has certainly been some ups and downs during this period but our focus remained at all times to ensure the Swan Districts Football Club got back to a position of financial stability. Our Members and Supporters have remained totally committed to our club so I am very proud to announce that after many years of hard work by our Boards (past and present), Staff, Coaches, Players, Assistants and a massive team of volunteers, the Swan Districts Football Club is now debt free and has a positive bank balance for the first time in nearly a decade.

The significant gains we have made over recent years and the development of our current strategic plan 2018 - 2022, has put the club on a secure financial footing while also increasing its relevance and building a sustainable business model. This stronger off field performance has now put the club in a position to start focusing more resources on its men's football program to ensure sustained success and also continue developing our equally important women's programs.

We are now in the final stages of creating our Football Specific Strategic Plan 2020 - 2024. This five year plan will provide sustainable and enduring

success in all WAFL and WAFLW grades as we look to enhance all our football programs.

The off-field success also would not be possible without the ongoing and loyal support of our many sponsors and community partners.

Sincere thanks to Steel Blue who continue their long association with our club, Midway Ford, BHP, Pilbara Motor Group, Chevron, Community Bendigo Bank Mundaring and Swan Towing along with our many other support sponsors which enable us to continue to deliver our purpose to build community and develop people.

Season 2019, as always, has proved extremely challenging with massive changes and development to the landscape both on and off the field.

This year on the field we saw the introduction of the inaugural season of WAFLW, the first Mid-Season AFL draft and a host of other football adjustments including our continued club transformation to ensure our future relevance and sustainability.

Our club is extremely proud to have been a major driver behind the establishment of the WAFLW competition and continues to lead the way forward. ## WAFL MENS

2019 started with a strong sense of what was possible with a genuine belief we would be in the top third of the competition. After a couple of early unexpected injury setbacks, we reset and attacked the season. With massive commitment from all players, coaches and support staff, the first half of the season was solid however we only managed to put two wins on the board along with seven losses under 12 points.

As the season progressed and fatigue took its toll, we were unable to sustain the same intensity and couldn't improve on the win loss ratio in the second half of the season. Many young players made their debut's in 2019 and we look forward to supporting them in 2020 and beyond.

As previously mentioned, our renewed financial position has allowed us to now focus more on how we can improve our on field performance and compete again in the top echelon of the WAFL competition. We are extremely confident our rise back up the ladder will be in the very near future and will become part and parcel of our club's performance into the future.

Congratulations to Adam Pickering on holding a steady course during his first two years at the helm. In what has been a difficult time for our fortunes on the field, Adam held firm in his belief that building a strong culture first will produce sustained benefits into the future. Adam's strong leadership was recognised by being appointed for a further two years as senior coach.

As our League fortunes wavered, the Reserves had a steady stream of players moving up which created a situation of re-inventing the team week on week.

Our Colts again were relatively strong and finished in the final five for the sixth consecutive year. Unfortunately, our season ended in the first week of finals, but all players represented our club in the finest manner possible and we congratulate them all for their efforts.

Congratulations also to all coaches, assistant coaches, medical staff, support staff and the huge number of volunteers who gave up their time willingly week in week out across all grades.

I would also like to acknowledge the retirement our co-captain in David Ellard. Dave returned to Swans after an amazing AFL career and immediately set about instilling strong camaraderie across the playing groups. Unfortunately, injuries took their toll and although he strived to continue to help his team mates, his body just couldn't recover. David leaves us with tremendous memories and the knowledge the Swan Districts Football Club was a major influencer in his long and outstanding career. We thank him for his efforts and wish him all the very best in his future endeavours.

## COMMUNITY

A lot has been said about our community aspirations and we are extremely proud to provide incredible outcomes across our many programs throughout the Pilbara and into our Metropolitan zones. # CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

**The 2019 season presented many highlights for the club that all Swans supporters can be very proud of. Whilst there wasn't success for our men's League side, our women's League team played in the inaugural WAFLW final and our Colts also played in the finals.**

We also continue to transform the club to be a more outward-looking engaged community enabler. It's essential we keep faith with the club's vision and strategy to ensure Swans remain relevant, builds a new generation of fans and is financially sustainable.

While it's very important to our football club and supporters to play in finals and win premierships, we exist for a deeper purpose. We build community and develop people. We're becoming a well-connected and community-engaged club that improves people's lives. Our club has a role to play in strengthening community, creating social value and building environments where people can be the best they can be.

We continue to deliver the objectives in the club's Strategic Plan 2018 - 2022. The plan concentrates on two deliverables - relevance and sustainability. That's financial sustainability and a sustainable business model including enduring and sustainable football success.

We've established accountable and transparent business practices and continue to be more strategically focussed. We're building financial security and providing the club with the resilience to meet unexpected future external challenges as they may arise. To this end, we need to continue building a business model with new revenue streams, so the club's future isn't dependent on winning grand finals.

The club's now debt free after reaching a peak debt of over \$700,000 in 2012. We've continued increasing operating surpluses in recent years with this year's forecast surplus being \$300,000 (after depreciation). It's the first time in almost 10 years the club has been in a cash positive position. We've also made strong improvements in the balance improving working capital ratio (from 0.57 in 2017 to forecast 1.0 this year) and increasing non-current assets by an additional \$300,000. Thank you to the club's Finance Manager, Gerard Roelofs for his oversight and direction.

We continue to reshape our WAFL and WAFLW home game days to help build the next generation of Swans fans. This includes a new value proposition including music, giveaways, competitions and our very popular Swans Play Zone providing free games and activities for the kids.

The club's new mascot, Madjitil Maali proved very popular on match days and we also provided the Swans Nest, a sensory zone providing a quiet place for kids and families to rest and reset before re-joining the fun and games. Ross Leipold, Jenny McBride, Jess Belladonna and Lucy Atkinson must be acknowledged for delivering such an innovative platform for our home game days.

This year we secured three Federal government grants to build a new women's football changeroom, purchase a new ground audio system and replace a large section of the old metal roof of the clubrooms. We also continue to work closely with other stakeholders preparing a Business Case to redevelop the club's current football club facilities with a new community hub servicing the needs of the Swans community and our future football programs. Thanks to Jim Dougan for his fabulous pride in taking care of our facility.

We're no longer relying on mainstream media for the club's relevance. It will come from a strong symbiotic connection with community. Our very active community driven working committees - the Aboriginal Advisory Committee chaired by Cheryl Thomas, Disability Advocacy



# CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

Inclusion Committee chaired by Eliza Outred and Youth Committee chaired by Jim Benson, continue to educate, energise and mobilise our players, staff, volunteers and members to help deliver community outreach programs targeting marginalised communities. This year we also began the club's multicultural outreach strategy.

Our General Manager, Community Kara Antonio and her regional and metropolitan staff have again achieved amazing social outcomes in the club's rapidly growing number of community outreach programs. All of our community staff are to be congratulated for their tireless work delivering a growing number of school and community programs that improve the lives of so many people.

The club's partnership with the WAFC's local football development council and football clubs in the Swans community continues to go from strength to strength. This year the club provided 380 Auskick kids in six clubs with new playing jumpers and also 350 weekly Coach's Awards for all Year 6 junior club coaches to present to a player after every game. We also enjoyed watching three integrated football games, three youth girls games and two youth boys games on our WAFL and WAFLW home games. A big thank you to the Council's

Chair Ian Westmore and his committee and staff for their unstinting support.

This year both the senior men's and women's playing groups had mental health education sessions. The club has also appointed Rod Manton as chaplain for the men's team and Karen Van Namen for the women's team. This added another layer helping us create a safe and secure place at the club where we want everyone to feel comfortable enough that they can talk to someone.

The club is now in the final stages of creating its Football Strategic Plan 2020 - 2024. This five-year plan will provide sustainable and enduring success in all WAFL and WAFLW grades. We're resetting the club's football culture and brand together with creating a strong value proposition for coaches and players so Swans will become a destination club they want to join. The club's improved financial position will provide the resources we need to deliver on this plan, although it will be undertaken in a measured and accountable strategy. The key to a strong sporting club is a sustainable business model that remains profitable when the team underperforms. Boom and bust performances present a high risk and is a dangerous way to run a business, especially a not for profit.

Our Football Manager, Phil Smart

continues to be a strong and committed advocate and performer for the club. He's responsible for all football operations including the senior men's teams, the men's talent development program and the women's program.

We're delighted head men's coach Adam Pickering has extended his contract for a further two years. He'll play a key role in helping the club deliver the outcomes of the football strategic plan.

The club's Talent Manager, Greg Harding worked tirelessly driving the club's Colts and Academy programs. While our men's talent program is funded by the WA Football Commission, Greg does a tremendous job ensuring all players and coaching staff have a very close affiliation with the club.

Kara Antonio, the senior women's coach, was instrumental in helping take our women's program to another level. We'll continue to increase our investment in women's football providing opportunities for girls in the Swans community to play in the WAFLW and AFLW.

# FOOTBALL DIRECTOR'S REPORT

**It is a privilege to be able to present the Football Report for the 2019 season. The Swan Districts Football Club is in an exciting time, having embarked on a 5-year strategic plan to transform our football club in to a well-connected community club. With the many community initiatives now at the forefront of our clubs thinking outlined by the President and CEO in this Annual Report, our club has never lost sight that we are a football club in the WAFL competition which is steeped in history. To be sustainable we have to continue to build community, develop people and be competitive across all grades of football, both men and women!**

Although as an outsider looking in one would say that it was a disappointing season (and it was on the field!) there were a lot of positives to come out of the season. By the end of the season we had played a total of 42 players in the senior side with an average age of 22.48 second to only Peel with an average age of 22.06. As experience goes, 29 players have played between 1-25 games with only 4 players having played 51 - 100 and 6 players playing more than 100 games, compared to Subiaco who played 38 players and having 20 players with 50 + games experience. 31 of our players or 83% were local district players, second to only Claremont who played 95% of local district players.

Under the second year of senior coach Adam Pickering's leadership the season commenced full of promise, with the recruitment of some senior players such as Hampson, Simpson, Glass McCasker and Kohlmann to complement our senior list of Notte, Ellard, Riggio, Howard, Palmer, Turner, Blakely, Gault, Payne and Wilson. Mixed with an exciting crop of youngsters such as Cipro, Coniglio, Fullgrabe, Italiano, Raynor, Clarke and numerous colts players leading to a couple of strong performances in the pre-season competition. The season was shaping up to be exciting!

Our first three games were lost by under 12 points with opportunities to win all three matches, however we just couldn't get it done, with our first win coming against West Perth in round 4. We again put in some strong performances over the next three rounds, at one stage leading Subiaco by 22 points late in the third quarter, but to be beaten by 18 points by the end of the game. By the end of round 7 after beating the Eagles by 14 points, we were just out of the top 5 by a game with a percentage of 101.07%!

It was an equally tough start for our reserves team who after round 7 were sitting in eighth position with two wins. Conversely our colts were proving unstoppable sitting on top of the ladder with six straight wins.

As the winter set in and our younger players found the going a bit tougher, we played some good football, however inconsistency and inexperience led to a couple of larger losses, which had not been a signature of the season to date. Although there had been some games we would rather forget, to the players credit we won two of our last four matches against both of the AFL teams, Peel Thunder and the Eagles. This highlights that we do have fighting spirit in our senior ranks and with the infusion of some experienced senior players to guide our younger players when the game is up to be won, the Football Department is confident of a stronger showing in 2020.

By the end of the season the league team sat tenth with four wins, definitely not a true indication of a season that commenced with so much promise. The reserves rallied and ended up seventh with five wins and a draw. After a sensational start the colts were hit with the State Program and managed to hold on to fifth position winning eight games but ending the season in the first semi-final.

All players and coaches were feeling disappointed at the conclusion of the season and plans have been developed to ensure a competitive 2020. A core group of colts and reserves players have already started a pre-season program to develop their strength over the summer period and I know we will see them return to the track late January fitter and stronger than this year pushing to play senior football. Players that didn't meet tough new fitness and strength measures have also been to extra training before all players commenced pre-season in early December.

The club also embarked on a nationwide recruitment program, the first time that we have been in a position financially to do this for several years. In Early December it was announced that AFL Draftee hopefuls Sam Fisher and Frank Anderson would be arriving at Steel Blue from the VFL together with teammate Deven Costigan. Sam, Frank and Deven will add a wealth of experience to our club and provide leadership to the emerging young talent. The club will also announce more new arrivals to Steel Blue in the coming months!

As the Director of Football I would like to acknowledge and thank a number of people who make our club a leader in the WAFL competition. The Past Players and Officials Association who provide morning tea at every colts home game for all home and visiting parents. We are the only WAFL club that does this and it takes an enormous effort by the ladies to prepare and serve such a wonderful spread every game. To the coaches - Simon Bergin and his support staff in the colts program, Mitch Burgess and his support staff in the Reserves and Adam Pickering and his support staff in the league. The time commitment for each and every coach is significant and goes above just the hours they are at the football club. To Greg Harding as the Development Manager in the Colts program, just like Tommo as previous manager, knows every junior player with potential in our development zone, including the Pilbara and South West, as well as many players just outside of our district. To Paul and Rose as trainer and Strength and Conditioning, well done on getting all of the players on the oval each and every week. We were extremely lucky the minor serious injuries we had to carry throughout the year, a great indication of the program you developed throughout the year and the support you provided players. To Phil Smart, Football Manager, during a season of highs and lows, Phil kept it all together, and has been critical in the off season in recruiting the types of players we have identified through our strategic plan. Much of Phil's work goes unseen and ensures that players can get on with what they love to do, play football! To the Board of Directors, and especially President Peter Hodyl, thank you for your relentless drive to ensure that our football club continues to have relevance in the WAFL and remains competitive across all three grades of senior football and the grades of junior football commencing with the under 14's development program.

# FOOTBALL MANAGER'S REPORT

**Season 2019 saw the men's league and reserves teams not make finals but the clubs WAFLW side playing off in the Grand Final in the inaugural season of WAFLW. Our colts again made finals and with our Rogers Cup team, have highlighted many talented youngsters for the future.**

The Men's league team had a disappointing season after losing several close games early and fading off in the second half of the season. Swans on average put out on the park each week the youngest of any of the WAFL clubs except Peel who are topped up with Fremantle young draftees. Swan's also had the highest number out of all the WAFL teams with 31 of our metro or country zoned players playing league football. In total 83% of the total number of players that played in our league team are from the club's zones.

These figures are not there to make an excuse but just to state facts. Since 2010, the club has generally found it tough on field mainly due to the lack of resources that have been invested into our football department and our philosophy has been "to develop our own and promote from within with selective recruiting". The selective recruiting has been light as we have not had the finances to recruit the players that were needed.

That said, the current Board have always indicated that once the club's finances stabilise and we are able to

build our cash reserves, there will be an increase in spending in the Football Department. This has taken a lot of work from all at the club over nearly a decade to turn the financial position around. That said, the club will continue to be managed with a strong financial focus, so we don't return to a period of uncertainty. I must thank the current CEO and the Finance Committee over the last couple of years for their strong management in this area.

It is pleasing to announce three recruits to our club that will make a big influence to our on-field fortunes. Frank Anderson (Northern Blues VFL), Sam Fisher (Northern Blues VFL) and Nelson Waite (East Perth WAFL). These are all regular league players who should be consistent top performers. As of writing, we are still working to possibly add one or two more players. Although we are now able to add some top end talent, the club will continue our strong philosophy of developing our own zoned players.

The WAFC have taken a stronger hand in the running of the talent programs and we will endeavour to work with the WAFC as a partner in our youth programs. Swan Districts still has a one club approach. Colts and development squads are still very much an integral part of our club. The Club will not relinquish this rest assured.

The Colts had another positive year playing finals once again under the guidance of Simon Bergin (Coach) and Greg Harding (Talent Manager). There are numerous players that will go on and play league football for the club. Congratulations to Riley Garcia and Jake Pasini on being drafted into the AFL, we wish them every success.

The inaugural season of WAFLW saw our female team lead from the front again with the League team making the Grand Final but unfortunately falling short on the day to East Fremantle. Well done to Kara Antonio (Coach) and Jo Taylor (Female Football Operations).

I would like to thank all our Coaches and support staff (listed in the annual report) across our Male and Female programs for the wonderful jobs they do in supporting our players.

However, there are a few people I need to thank. Ross, Jenny, Gerard and Jess for their wonderful support they give to the Football Department throughout the year. To Jeff Dennis, Peter Hodyl, Andy Homes and the entire Board, thank you for the guidance and support over some difficult times.

Finally, to our head club coaches Adam Pickering and Kara Antonio, we say thank you for the season gone and good luck as we move into a new exciting era for Swans.

# GENERAL MANAGER'S COMMUNITY REPORT

**This year has been big, and we haven't slowed down. With our Pilbara and Perth programs, it's an exciting time to be involved at the football club in our community space.**

Our V Swans brand is growing and building with an increase in funding across our Pilbara towns. This has enabled us to provide more services to the local communities both within schools and within the wider communities, targeting newborns to elders, building on our positive reputation and programs that we have delivered for over the last decade. We currently have 12 staff permanently based in the Pilbara and another three in Perth which will grow by at least another five in 2020, all working to bring the V Swans Programs to our communities across Western Australia.

With all the hard work of our V Swans Programs and staff across the Pilbara, it was great to be awarded the winner in two categories at the 2019 Pilbara Community Services Excellence Awards. We were awarded the 'Most Outstanding Medium Organisation Award' and 'Best Pilbara Organisation'. A credit to the outstanding work our staff does in our schools and in our communities in the Pilbara.

Our Perth community programs are rapidly growing in schools and within the wider Perth community. Our current programs target; Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders, Social Inclusion - Peoples with disability, Multicultural and Youth. All programs are built on our Active Education Framework which uses sport as a common language to engage and connect with our program participants.

Another fantastic milestone in our community space this year was long-time club sponsor, Pilbara Motor Group

(PMG), providing us with a 21-seater bus to help deliver and grow our community programs in Perth and in the Pilbara. The Swans Community Bus will enable us to continue to provide our communities with opportunities to become more engaged with programs, activities, services and events that our team deliver throughout the year. We would like to take this time to thank Dave Watson and the team at PMG for continuing to go above and beyond with their ongoing support for our V Swans and Community programs.

## EDUCATION PROGRAMS

### V Swans Hedland and Newman

Major Partners BHP & Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet (NIAA) The beginning of 2019 saw our longest serving staff member Tracey Swami, relocate from Hedland to Perth after spending 12 years in Hedland. We welcomed our new Hedland trainee, Dana Bell to the Hedland team who was a past Shooting Goals student which strengthened our commitment to providing pathways to our V Swans students. We also had a number of staff changes mid-year with Emma McSweeney taking on a career change and Steve Thomson relocating back to his hometown in Melbourne, which saw the employment of Rob Goodin. Given all the movement of staff, our programs continued to run smoothly and many thanks to the Hedland team for your efforts. Newman welcomed a new staff member in Brittany Ebert, who was a former Kicking Goals student when she attended Newman Senior High School, along with a new school-based trainee in Lauren Taylor.

This region has our longest standing partnerships with BHP and the Department of Prime Minister and Cabinet (now: National Indigenous

Australians Agency - NIAA), who have provided the Pilbara Region and indeed the Club with a business model envied by many WAFL clubs. The financial support over the years has allowed our staff to reside and work in the towns providing consistency and trusting relationships with key stakeholders, families and children.

This year saw the inclusion of the newly established Shooting Hoops Program at Newman Senior High School which uses the V Swans Active Education Framework with Basketball being the sport of focus. This saw an increase in student enrolment numbers at Newman, which meant more engagement in our V Swans programs at an educational level.

2019 saw over 400 students enrolled in the Kicking Goals, Shooting Goals and Shooting Hoops Programs across the two High Schools. These programs are fully integrated into the PE curriculum at the schools meaning our program does not sit separately from the curriculum, it is the curriculum. With full classes in all levels from Year 7 to Year 12 at both Hedland and Newman Senior High Schools, this program is a very popular and vital outcome for the schools in this region.

We would like to thank our Major Partner BHP for their ongoing support and partnership with the V Swans programs and the football club, and the positive impact they have on our Pilbara communities. A big thank you to Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet (NIAA) for their continuing support with our Indigenous Advancement Strategy Programs. We would also like to thank Kicking Goals Program partners, the West Coast Eagles, for their continued support and regular player visits and mentoring throughout 2019.



We are excited to launch a brand-new program in 2020 - V Swans REACH Program, a female engagement program that will be launched in Hedland Senior High School in Term 1 2020, funded by BHP and supported by Lotterywest.

## V Swans Onslow

Major Partners Chevron - operated Wheatstone Project, Regional Development Australia, Department of Communities and Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet (NIAA).

Our staff led by Regional Manager - Adam Conwell and Development Manager - Kaiden Matera, throughout 2019 we have again increased the programs in which we deliver in one of the smallest communities which we work in, Onslow. Our staff now deliver over 12 programs to the Onslow community which include school education programs, fundamental movement skill programs, after school sports, school holiday programs, early years and parenting programs.

Our dedicated Powerhouse Youth and Community Centre has been up and running for the last two years and have grown and transformed into a hub for all youth in town to utilise after school, on weekends and throughout the school holiday period. V Swans are the largest community provider in town and continue to build on the positive reputation it has created over the last decade of delivery programs in Onslow. We are excited to see the inclusion of the V Swans Community Office Building which has been funded by Chevron-operated Wheatstone project, Shire of Ashburton and Department of Industry, Innovation and Science. This building will provide an open plan workspace for all V Swans staff including hot desks for other NFP businesses and organisations in town or who may be passing through town to access and utilise the space at their convenience.

This shows our commitment to continue to grow and develop our services in which we provide to the community of Onslow to ensure that we work with community, business and government to guarantee we make a difference to the community creating outcomes and opportunities for newborns to families and everything in between.

We would like to thank Program Partner Chevron - operated Wheatstone Project, for their continuous support to V Swans and the programs which we deliver inside Onslow School and in the wider community. A big thank you to Department of the



Prime Minister and Cabinet (NIAA) for their continuing support with our Indigenous Advancement Strategy Programs, along with the Department of Communities for their support with our Youth Engagement Program. We would also like to thank Regional Development Australia and West Pilbara Communities for Children for their guidance and support in the early years space.

## V Swans Roebourne

Major Partner Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet, Roebourne District High School and Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries

This year in Roebourne, we welcomed Matt Lorne after Beau McDonald relocated back down to Perth at the end of 2018. Roebourne is our toughest and most challenging community due to the dynamic and recent history of events within the town which provides us with many challenges at times. Matt has hit the ground running and achieved incredible engagement and attendance outcomes from the V Swans Boys Academy Program, seeing an increase in participation and engagement from 22% in 2018 to 60% in 2019 which is a testament to the strong relationships and hard work he has put in over the course of the school year.

We are committed to continue to build on our Roebourne program by working with Roebourne District High School staff and management, along with local stakeholders and community groups to provide the students with opportunities to grow, develop and learn which will help them succeed once they finish their high school studies.

A big thank you to Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet (NIAA) for their amazing support with our

Indigenous Advancement Strategy Program in Roebourne.

## PATHWAY PROGRAMS

Our Pilbara Sports Academy (PSA) has gone from strength to strength this year, with ex Hockeyroo Olympian, Kate Starre taking on the role as PSA co-ordinator at the beginning of the year. Kate's extensive knowledge and experience as an elite athlete as well as years of study and experience in strength and conditioning and ACL prevention, has allowed her to develop and drive the program exceptionally well. In the space of the last 10 months, the program has grown from being solely delivered in Karratha to now having a number of athletes residing in Hedland. Athletes in the PSA program come from several different sports and have been scouted from their State Sporting Bodies and completed testing through a PSA Camp that was run during the year.

We are very excited to be working with the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries to continue to build the program to ensure we are able to engage more athletes in 2020 and beyond.

For the fifth year we have delivered our annual V Swans Leadership and Cultural Tour to our female youth across our programs in the Pilbara and Perth. This year, we travelled with 20 girls in our Swans Community Bus from Perth and different locations across the Pilbara to Newman, Jigalong and Karijini - running clinics, connecting with local communities and playing football matches on red dirt. The purpose of the camp is to educate and teach the young females the important life skills, leadership skills and the importance, significance and appreciation of our Aboriginal culture, language and

history through the use of our great game, AFL. The group this year connected with local Aboriginal Elders as they shared their history, culture and language in some of the most incredible landscapes Australia has to offer.

We would like to thank all of the local communities for welcoming us and sharing their time, stories and community with all of us.

## COMMUNITY PROGRAMS

This year, we have continued to grow our community programs in our Perth metropolitan area, managed and driven by our Community Program Manager, Swans Club Legend - Shane Beros. We sadly said goodbye to Cheryl Thomas, our Senior Administration Manager, who has significantly contributed to our V Swans and Community Programs and led the way in reshaping the club's Reconciliation Action Plan and Aboriginal Advisory Committee over the last four years. We wish her all the best for the next chapter, accepting a role at Koya Aboriginal Corporation, who we have and will continue to work closely with. We look forward to continuing to work with Cheryl in her new role at Koya and as the chair of our Swans Aboriginal Advisory Committee.

Some of the great work that has been done this year in Perth includes:

- Building and growing our active community working groups including the Swans Youth Advisory Committee, Swans Aboriginal Advisory Committee, Swans Disability Inclusion Advocacy Sub-committee and a newly formed Swans Multicultural Working Group. Each committee has members that include subject matter specialists from our region and local community including local shires, government departments, business and school representation, to ensure that we are inclusive and holistic in our planning and decision making moving forward.
- Our mentoring and engagement programs this year have also grown with the successful grant application and funding received through the Department of Justice and Shire of Mundaring to deliver programs in local schools including - Eastern Hills Senior High School, Swan View Primary School, Swan View High School and Kiara College - to help re-engage and reconnect students to school, family, community and culture. The program also delivers a number of school holiday activities to ensure youth are engaged and connected throughout the holiday period. This program has been supported by young Aboriginal Male and Female leaders and role models within our community.
- Make Your Mark Program - a 16-week program that had great success and many positive outcomes and is aimed at targeting Aboriginal Youth at Risk, delivered at Bassendean Oval, outside the school gates to ensure maximum participation and engagement.
- Continuing to develop partnerships with local high schools including Swan View Senior High School, Kiara College, Swan View Primary School, Eastern Hills Senior High School, Cyril Jackson Senior Campus, Ashfields Primary School and others within the Swans catchment area.
- Our Swans Social Inclusion Program - a 20-week program delivering football skills sessions at Durham Road and Cyril Jackson Senior Campus was a great success with a number of positive outcomes including providing causal employment and volunteer hours for many of the students from this program. We would like to thank the Department of Disability Services for funding this project, as we look to seek further funding through NDIS to grow this program to many other schools within the Perth metropolitan area.
- We held our second public National Reconciliation Week event with special guest speaker Dr. Richard Walley OAM.
- NAIDOC week events in the community included participating in Shire of Mundaring event, City of Swan event and Town of Bassendean event.
- NAIDOC Billboard Competition with local primary school students with winner, Bassendean Primary School student, Ky McEwen's artwork now on display at Steel Blue Oval.
- We also held our second NAIDOC home game with both WAFLW and WAFL teams playing a double header. Both sides wore newly designed jumpers by local young Artists. Our WAFL jumper was designed by Clayton Graham, Edward Lyndon and Jamison Ugle who are young emerging Aboriginal artists and were mentored by Kylie Graham. Our WAFLW jumper was designed by Madison Alone, a young emerging female Aboriginal artist and sister in-law of WAFLW Premiership player Ashley Sharp.
- This year Swans held three Perth Football League Integrated football

matches throughout the WAFL and WAFLW season, this included a training session for both teams on Steel Blue Oval in the lead up to the big game. Through this partnership, Toby Anscombe, a North Beach Integrated Football player, commenced casual work with us and helped mentor our Swans Social Inclusion participants over the 20-week program.

- Swans Big Campout provided an overnight camping experience at Steel Blue oval including many fun activities to enjoy with family and friends.

## ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

I must continue to thank our amazing partners, communities and local businesses that fund and support our programs and provide valuable guidance to our staff and management. It's their long-term contributions that has provided ongoing sustainable outcomes to the regions and we appreciate the extended support your staff provide in volunteer hours and mentoring.

# COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT REPORT

**In January 2019, the Community Development Committee was initiated to oversee the clubs growing community outreach programs and guide its transformation from traditional football club to an active and engaged community enabler.**

For more than a decade, our extensive community outreach programs had been primarily branded under the V Swans banner, however, with our expansion into new community areas, and a "one organisation" focus, it made sense for V Swans to come directly under the Swan Districts Football Club banner.

We are building on these great foundations under the leadership of Kara Antonio, our General Manager Community and her team, who are based right across the Pilbara, as well in our offices at Steel Blue.

Since January, we have made significant headway into new community areas, such as disability and multiculturalism. We are currently exploring new opportunities to take advantage of our highly professional community development team and business model to impact other areas such as community health and employment.

We have developed new partnerships with organisations such as Activ

Foundation, Rocky Bay and Intelife in the area of disability, and we are working with them proactively to increase opportunities for connection and involvement with their customers, as well incorporating young people into our active education programs at Cyril Jackson & Durham Road High Schools.

The Community Development Committee is supported by the Swans Aboriginal Advisory Committee, the Disability, Advocacy and Inclusion Committee, and the newly formed Multicultural Committee. # FACILITIES REDEVELOPMENT REPORT

**In 2019, with the retirement of Peter Snow from the Swans Board, I took over the chair role of the Strategic Projects Committee, which Peter had successfully lead for many years. With CEO Jeff Dennis, and the assistance of Peter Snow, who remained on the committee, Peter Hodyl, Sarah Curnow, Paul Rosair and other committee members Kylee Schoonens and Paul Murray, we have made significant progress in 2019.**

As our club has transitioned its strategic focus commercially to community outreach, the decision was made to focus the Strategic Projects Committee on the redevelopment of Steel Blue Oval.

Our mandate as a committee is to provide a facility that creates an environment that enables our mens and womens teams to prepare as best as they possibly can, as well as key focal point in the community, where everyone feels welcome and included. Like in other areas of our great club, where we are pioneering how football and community organisations are run, our approach to the redevelopment

is the same. As well as providing the best possible environment for our football programmes to be successful, we need to take into consideration the current and future space required for our growing Community Development team.

This has since been validated by an independent review commissioned by the WAFC that the best approach for WAFL clubs is to build a community facility that hosts a WAFL club, rather than the other way round.

It is vitally important that our new facility is commercially viable and provides long term revenue opportunities that make it sustainable over the life of the facility. Not only is the initial cost of construction significant, but so is the ongoing cost of running and maintaining the facility for years to come.

As a focal point in the Town of Bassendean, the redevelopment of Steel Blue Oval is now a part of the broader regeneration of the Town which we believe to be strategically important from a funding perspective.

Great support has been received from Town of Bassendean CEO Peta Mabbs, and Mayor Renee McLennan, and we feel that there is great alignment in our shared vision for Steel Blue Oval. We have commenced work on the economic modelling of the new facility with the Town of Bassendean and the Department of Local Government, Sport, Recreation & Culture.

Over the course of the year, we have been successful in receiving two federal grants. In excess of \$200,000 has been awarded for the construction of a new changeroom for our Women's team as well as the upgrade of our audio facilities around Steel Blue Oval. The new changerooms will be built on the eastern side of our existing facility, and will be completed prior to the start of the 2020 season.

The commitment to developing our young talent and allowing us to challenge those prospective players by playing senior footy is duly noted. 
To the team off the field, I cannot thank you enough for your support and dedication all year. Thanks to Aaron





# WAFLW LEAGUE COACH'S REPORT

**2019 was set to be a history making year for the club and the WA Women's Football landscape with the inaugural WAFLW Competition launched. We were one of the five WAFLW clubs to be granted a license, which highlighted the hard work and commitment of the female football coaching staff, volunteers and football club over the last twelve years in which we continue to lead the way in the women's football space both on and off the field.**

This exciting five-team competition saw a replicated version of the AFLW game, rules and structure with a 16-a-side, 15 round season. The competition watched upcoming talent grow and develop whilst showcasing our best AFLW players the state has to offer.

Ex Premiership Captain and current Fremantle AFLW Captain – Kara Antonio (nee Donnellan), took on the WAFLW Coach role and hit the ground running in the preseason with assistant coaches – Leith Woods, Kristen Nelson, Jackson Bowen and Ashara Wills. With a solid block of training under the belt for the entire club, we were set to be in good shape to make an impact in 2019.

The season saw inconsistency of team selection due to AFLW and State 18 injuries and commitments, which opened the door for our younger group of players to learn, develop and grow. The second half of the season is when we played our best football. With competitive team selections each week, we built a strong culture amongst the group where everyone was fighting for a spot in the 21 each week. Leading into finals, we had our strongest side. Fielding seven AFLW players and nine state 18 players, it was a great balance and mix of experience and youth which proved positively on the score board.

Finishing in third position after the home and away season, we had a hard run in the finals as every game was a sudden death match. Week one we played Claremont, who were the only side not to get the better of us all season, and that day was no different. Week two we took on the minor premiers in Subiaco which we knew was going to be a tough game on their home turf. Our performance was the most consistent of the entire year. We were able to get on top early and continue to build on that lead throughout the game, which locked us in to the final game of the season.

The grand final saw us take on East Fremantle who we had only beaten once all year, however had some very tight contests, so we knew we had

our work cut out for us. The week had a massive build up, with Channel 7 broadcasting the game live, saw the nerves increase and the excitement rise. The game never looked in our favour. We started strong with 80% of ball in our forward half, however missed opportunities to capitalise on the scoreboard hurt us. East Fremantle kicked a couple against the flow of play and into the wind in the first which put us on the back foot from the start. We continued to give effort, however nothing seemed to go our way and we were beaten by a better side on the day.

As disappointed as we were as the final siren rang, our 13 league debutants and nine state 18's will be much better off for the run and experience on the big stage and this is only the beginning of what we can achieve. We want to continue to build on our culture, where we set high expectations and standards of players and staff and continue to keep each other accountable. I am extremely proud of what the group achieved and excited to see where we can go in season 2020.

We welcomed a new reserves coach in premiership player Tracey Schischka, with her assistants – Brayden Todd, Sarah Fragomeni and Jodie Eaton. Our reserves team had a tough year. With a number of serious injuries of key players early in the season, this saw an inexperienced team take the field most weeks. A challenging year for Tracey and the coaching team, who on a number of occasions had to pull the boots back on herself to ensure numbers for game day. We watched players grow and develop over the year which was great to see, and we will continue to build over the off season aiming to have an impact in season 2020. The spirit of the group never dropped, and we always had big numbers at training which was a testament to the culture of the group. We look to raise the bar next year.

Our Rogers Cup welcomed a new coach in four time Premiership Player and Life Member of the Club, Fiona Boucher with assistants – Ashley Sharp and Steve Beasley. With seven key players from season 2018 moving up to senior league footy, we saw a brand-new bunch of girls take the field in our Rogers Cup team. Lots of new faces with exciting talent and skills. Throughout the season, we had some incredible wins and some disappointing losses which saw us just miss out on finals. The coaches did an incredible job to bring a group of girls together who had never played football before and to be able to perform the way they

did week in week out was a credit to the coaching staff and the group as a whole. We are excited to see where this group can go in season 2020.

**George Hampson etched his name into WAFL folklore at Mandoon Estate on Friday night by winning the Swan Medal as Swan Districts' fairest and best player for the 2019 season.**

Hampson arrived at Swan Districts for the 2019 WAFL season and made an immediate impact playing both as a midfielder and with stints across half-forward.

The 29-year-old put together such an outstanding season that he was named the fairest and best winner for the 2019 WAFL season with Swan Districts to claim the Swan Medal, just edging out last year's winner Tony Notte and third-place getter Jesse Turner.

Other major award winners on the night included Mitchell Bain named fairest and best in the reserves and Seb Bright in the colts, but it was a night where the ever-growing glittering career of Hampson deserved to be celebrated.

Hampson arrived at Swan Districts already a well-credentialed and successful WAFL footballer having played the first 62 games of his career with Subiaco where he won a fairest and best award in 2013 and premiership in 2014.

He then moved to East Fremantle in 2015 and when fit, maintained and built on his reputation as one of the best players and pure match-winners in the competition whether playing in forward-line or midfield.

He capped his time with the Sharks by winning the Lynn Medal as fairest and best winner in 2018 before then this past off-season, joining Swan Districts to continue his WAFL career.

Hampson had no trouble fitting in at

Swan Districts either and while it wasn't quite the season as a team that Swans were after, he certainly did all that he could to try and lift them to as many wins as he possibly could.

In the end, Hampson went on to average 23.6 possessions a game in 2019 for Swans including three times picking up 30 or more touches and going over 20 another 10 times highlighting his tremendous consistency while also getting forward to kick 19 goals.

What winning the Swan Medal means now that with Hampson already having won Subiaco's Outridge Medal in 2013 and East Fremantle's Lynn Medal in 2018 is that he is the first player in history to be the fairest and best winner at three different clubs.

It's a remarkable performance considering the hurdles that he has overcome with things not ending on particularly pleasant notes at both his previous clubs and it might have been easier for someone with less strength of character to not take on the challenge of moving to another club.

Throw in the troubles with his body that he did battle for a period, and thankfully now appears over, and it has been anything but a smooth ride but that's all the more reason to pay tribute to someone who has now made history during his 127-game WAFL career that still should have plenty left in it.

Runner-up to Hampson in Swan Medal voting was Tony Notte who put together yet another remarkable season and even with 237 WAFL appearances to his credit, he is showing no signs of slowing down either.

Having already won Swan Medals in

2013 and 2018, Notte finished as runner-up for a second time as well highlighting the remarkable consistency that he's now shown over the course of 162 consecutive matches.

Third-place in Swan Medal voting went to Jesse Turner who backed up a tremendous 2018 season with an even better one in 2019 where he spent more time as an inside midfielder and went on to average 21.4 disposals per game.

Alex Howard, who will celebrate his 150th game in Round 1 next year, was acknowledged with the Jack Hickling Memorial Award as the most outstanding player on and off the field in 2019.

Josh Cipro was another player to impress for Swans in 2019 showing he can be an important part of the midfield moving forward and he was rewarded with the RA Newbey Award as Rookie of the Year.

Meanwhile in the reserves, Mitchell Bain backed up his win as colts fairest and best 12 months earlier by winning the FA Bonney Sweetapple Memorial Award as the fairest and best winner.

He claimed the award ahead of runner-up Callum Garcia while Patrick Italiano and Jiah Reidy shared third place.

And in the colts, Seb Bright won the EJ McManus Award as fairest and best in a season that also saw him make his league debut with Swan Districts and show some encouraging signs.

For the second straight season, Kade Wallrodt was runner-up in colts fairest and best voting while Jak Watson finished in third place.





## SWAN MEDALIST

# FINANCE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

## COMMITTEE

The Committee comprises Des Hardiman (Chair), Neville Bassett, Jeff Dennis, Matt Hewitson, Peter Hodyl, Gerard Roelofs and Brendan Valentine. Meetings were held monthly one week prior to the Board. The committee acknowledges the strong financial management and reporting provided by Jeff Dennis, Gerard Roelofs and staff. All members, staff and supporters should be very pleased with the financial position of the club as at 31 October 2019.

## KEY OBJECTIVES

To align with the Strategic Plan (2018-2022) under the Business Sustainability pillar, the committee includes risk under its responsibilities as well as reviewing the monthly financial reports. With the support of the Board and the leadership of the CEO, a very clear financial discipline has been implemented over the past three years with the objective of correcting the Balance Sheet current ratio deficit, diversifying revenue opportunities and building a sustainable economic model for the future.

## NEW DEVELOPMENTS / ACHIEVEMENTS

The following items were addressed and discussed in committee during 2019:

- An audit tender was conducted between two firms, with William Buck being successful and endorsed by members at the AGM.
- Matt Hewitson and Brendan Valentine were added to the committee with Peter Snow retiring from the Board. This has further strengthened the risk management process.
- A revised Terms of Reference for the Finance & Risk Committee was endorsed, to be consistent with all sub-committees.
- An investigation of our telco phone tower agreements by management, discovered a shortfall in electricity payments going back 4 years. This resulted in a bonus \$180,000 revenue this year. The majority of this has been reflected in Balance Sheet Equity and not shown in the P&L this year. This resulted in a (favourable) adjustment to the 2018

accounts.

- The V Swans and Community Engagement divisions were merged financially, to form a Community Programs cost centre.
- We successfully applied and were granted a \$168,000 Commonwealth Sports Grant to build new women's changerooms for 2020.
- An Internal Control Framework was prepared, endorsed and implemented.
- A complete Risk Management review was conducted and resulted in a new Risk Policy, a Risk Register and Framework for assessing and management of all Club risks.
- A review of Honorary payments and policy was undertaken in consultation with the WAFC.
- Trade Debtors and Trade Creditors continue to be monitored strongly and efficiently.
- Home Game and events are reconciled by the Operations staff after each event, providing the Finance & Risk committee with relevant data and ratios.
- Improved audit process and preparation of accounts resulted in a smooth audit and improved Financial Statements - presented in full at the back of this Annual Report.
- Strong Budget 2020 preparation by management and committee discussion.

## RESULT

The result for the year is a healthy surplus of \$202,791 after depreciation (last year adjusted \$103,480). In addition, \$163,818 was added to Total Equity as a prior year restatement due to a back-payment in electricity from the phone tower Telcos. The net increase in cash for 2019 was \$397,797.

## BALANCE SHEET IMPROVEMENTS

A critical strategic focus over recent years has been the improvement to the Current Ratio. This measures the ability to meet current liabilities with sufficient cash and other current assets. This working capital deficit was over \$750,000 five years ago. At the end of 2019 it is now a positive \$96,000.

The surplus for the year amounted to \$202,791 (2018: restated surplus \$103,480).



## NOTE 1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

### NEW OR AMENDED ACCOUNTING STANDARDS AND INTERPRETATIONS ADOPTED

Swan Districts Football Club (Inc) has adopted all of the new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

Any new or amended Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted.

The adoption of these Accounting Standards and Interpretations did not have any significant impact on the financial performance or position of the Club.

The following Accounting Standards and Interpretations are most relevant to the Club:

#### AASB 9 Financial Instruments

The Club has adopted AASB 9 from 1 November 2018. The standard introduced new classification and measurement models for financial assets. A financial asset shall be measured at amortised cost if it is held within a business model whose objective is to hold assets in order to collect contractual cash flows which arise on specified dates and that are solely principal and interest. A debt investment shall be measured at fair value through other comprehensive income if it is held within a business model whose objective is to both hold assets in order to collect contractual cash flows which arise on specified dates that are solely principal and interest as well as selling the asset on the basis of its fair value.

All other financial assets are classified and measured at fair value through profit or loss unless the entity makes an irrevocable election on initial recognition to present gains and losses on equity instruments (that are not held-for-trading or contingent consideration recognised in a business combination) in other comprehensive income ('OCI'). Despite these requirements, a financial asset may be irrevocably designated as measured at fair value through profit or loss to reduce the effect of, or eliminate, an accounting mismatch. For financial liabilities designated at fair value through profit or loss, the standard requires the portion of the change in fair value that relates to the entity's own credit risk

to be presented in OCI (unless it would create an accounting mismatch). New simpler hedge accounting requirements are intended to more closely align the accounting treatment with the risk management activities of the entity. New impairment requirements use an 'expected credit loss' ('ECL') model to recognise an allowance. Impairment is measured using a 12-month ECL method unless the credit risk on a financial instrument has increased significantly since initial recognition in which case the lifetime ECL method is adopted. For receivables, a simplified approach to measuring expected credit losses using a lifetime expected loss allowance is available.

#### Impact of adoption

AASB 9 was adopted using the modified retrospective approach and as such comparatives have not been restated. There was no impact on opening retained surpluses as at 1 November 2018.

#### BASIS OF PREPARATION

These general-purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards - Reduced Disclosure Requirements and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB'), the Associations Incorporation Act 2015 (WA), and associated regulations, as appropriate for not-for profit-oriented entities.

#### Historical cost convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### Critical accounting estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the Club's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements, are disclosed in note 2.

#### COMPARATIVE FIGURES

Certain comparative figures have been reclassified to conform with the financial statement presentation adopted for the current year.

#### REVENUE RECOGNITION

Revenue is recognised when it is probable that the economic benefit will flow to Swan Districts Football Club (Inc) and the revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

#### Sales revenue

Events, fundraising and raffles are

recognised at the time the pledge is made.

#### Donations

Donations are recognised at the time the pledge is made.

#### Grants

Grants are recognised at their fair value where there is a reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all attached conditions will be complied with.

#### Interest

Interest revenue is recognised as interest accrues using the effective interest method. This is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and allocating the interest income over the relevant period using the effective interest rate, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the net carrying amount of the financial asset.

#### Recruitment Revenue and Expenditure

Transfer fees both received and paid for players are brought to account as income/expenses on an accrual basis upon obtaining a contractual agreement.

#### Other revenue

Other revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

#### LEASES

The determination of whether an arrangement is or contains a lease is based on the substance of the arrangement and requires an assessment of whether the fulfilment of the arrangement is dependent on the use of a specific asset or assets and the arrangement conveys a right to use the asset.

#### (i) Club as a lessee

Finance leases, which transfer to the Club substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to ownership of the leased item, are recognised at the inception of the lease at the fair value of the leased property or, if lower, at the present value of the minimum lease payments. Lease payments are apportioned between the finance charges and reduction of the lease liability so as to achieve a constant rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability. Finance charges are recognised as an expense in profit or loss. Capitalised leased assets are depreciated over the shorter of the estimated useful life of the asset and the lease term if there is no reasonable certainty that the Club will obtain ownership by the end of the lease term.

Operating lease payments are recognised as an expense in the statements of comprehensive income on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

Lease incentives are recognised in the statements of comprehensive income as part of the total lease expense.

## INCOME TAX

Swan Districts Football Club (Inc) is exempt from paying income tax under the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

## CURRENT AND NON-CURRENT CLASSIFICATION

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification. An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in Swan Districts Football Club (Inc)'s normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in the Swan Districts Football Club (Inc)'s normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

## CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

## TRADE AND OTHER RECEIVABLES

Other receivables are recognised at amortised cost, less any allowance for expected credit losses.

## INVENTORIES

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Inventories are accounted for at purchase cost on a first in first out basis.

## FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

### Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. For financial assets, this is equivalent to the date that the Club commits itself to either purchase or sell the asset.

Financial instruments are initially

measured at fair value plus transaction costs, except where the instrument is classified at 'fair value through profit or loss', in which case transaction costs are recognised as expenses in profit or loss immediately.

### Classification and subsequent measurement of financial assets

Financial assets are subsequently measured at either amortised cost or fair value depending on their classification. Classification is determined based on both the business model within which such assets are held and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset, unless, an accounting mismatch is being avoided.

### Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss

Financial assets not measured at amortised cost or at fair value through other comprehensive income are classified as financial assets at fair value through profit or loss. Typically, such financial assets will be either: (i) held for trading, where they are acquired for the purpose of selling in the short-term with an intention of making a profit, or a derivative; or (ii) designated as such upon initial recognition where permitted. Fair value movements are recognised in profit or loss.

### Financial assets at fair value through other comprehensive income

Financial assets at fair value through other comprehensive income include equity investments which the Club intends to hold for the foreseeable future and has irrevocably elected to classify them as such upon initial recognition. Upon adoption of AASB 9, the Club has not made such an election to recognise fair value adjustments on financial assets through other comprehensive income. Financial assets are derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows have expired or have been transferred and the Club has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership. When there is no reasonable expectation of recovering part or all of a financial asset, its carrying value is written off.

### Impairment of financial assets

The Club recognises a loss allowance for expected credit losses on financial assets which are either measured at amortised cost or fair value through other comprehensive income. The measurement of the loss allowance depends upon the Club's assessment at the end of each reporting period as to whether the financial instrument's credit risk has increased significantly since initial recognised, based on reasonable and supportable information that is available, without undue cost or effort to obtain.

Where there has not been a significant increase in exposure to credit risk since initial recognition, a 12-month expected credit loss allowance is estimated. This represents a portion of the asset's lifetime expected credit losses that is attributable to a default event that is possible within the next 12 months. Where a financial asset has become credit impaired or where it is determined that credit risk has increased significantly, the loss allowance is based on the asset's lifetime expected credit losses. The amount of expected credit loss is measured on the basis of the probability weighted present value of anticipated cash shortfalls over the life of the instrument discounted at the original effective interest rate.

For financial assets measured at fair value through other comprehensive income, the loss allowance is recognised within other comprehensive income. In all other cases, the loss allowance is recognised in profit or loss.

### Classification and subsequent measurement of financial liabilities

The Club's financial liabilities include trade and other payables.

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or expires. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference in the respective carrying amounts is recognised in the statement of profit or loss.

## PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT

Plant and equipment are stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the items.

Depreciation is calculated on a straight-line basis to write off the net cost of each item of property, plant and equipment over their expected useful lives as follows:

Leasehold improvements: 20 - 25 years  
Plant and equipment: 2 - 20 years  
Motor vehicles: 6 - 7 years

The residual values, useful lives and depreciation methods are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each reporting date.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when there is no future economic benefit to the Swan Districts Football Club (Inc). Gains and losses between the carrying amount

and the disposal proceeds are taken to profit or loss.

## **IMPAIRMENT OF NON-FINANCIAL ASSETS**

Non-financial assets are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount. Recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value-in-use. The value-in-use is the present value of the estimated future cash flows relating to the asset using a pre-tax discount rate specific to the asset or cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. Assets that do not have independent cash flows are grouped together to form a cash-generating unit.

## **TRADE AND OTHER PAYABLES**

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the Swan Districts Football Club (Inc) prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. Due to their short-term nature they are measured at amortised cost and are not discounted. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

## **EMPLOYEE BENEFITS**

### **Short-term employee benefits**

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including non-monetary benefits, annual leave and long service leave expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

### **Other long-term employee benefits**

The liability for annual leave and long service leave not expected to be settled within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date using the projected unit credit method. Consideration is given to expected future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures and periods of service. Expected future payments are discounted using market yields at the reporting date on national government bonds with terms to maturity and currency that match, as closely as possible, the estimated future cash outflows.

### **Defined contribution superannuation expense**

Contributions to defined contribution superannuation plans are expensed in the period in which they are incurred.

## **FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENT**

When an asset or liability, financial or

non-financial, is measured at fair value for recognition or disclosure purposes, the fair value is based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date; and assumes that the transaction will take place either: in the principal market; or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market.

Fair value is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming they act in their economic best interests. For non-financial assets, the fair value measurement is based on its highest and best use. Valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, are used, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

## **GOODS AND SERVICES TAX ('GST') AND OTHER SIMILAR TAXES**

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of associated GST, unless the GST incurred is not recoverable from the tax authority. In this case it is recognised as part of the cost of the acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the tax authority is included in other receivables or other payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to the tax authority, are presented as operating cash flows. Commitments and contingencies are disclosed net of the amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the tax authority.

## **NEW ACCOUNTING STANDARDS AND INTERPRETATIONS NOT YET MANDATORY OR EARLY ADOPTED**

Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have recently been issued or amended but are not yet mandatory, have not been early adopted by the Club for the annual reporting period ended 31 October 2019. The Club has not yet assessed the impact of these new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations.

## **NOTE 2. CRITICAL ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS, ESTIMATES AND ASSUMPTIONS**

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year are discussed below.

### **Estimation of useful lives of assets**

Swan Districts Football Club (Inc) determines the estimated useful lives and related depreciation and amortisation charges for its property, plant and equipment. The depreciation and amortisation charge will increase where the useful lives are less than previously estimated lives, or technically obsolete or non-strategic assets that have been abandoned or sold will be written off or written down.

### **Impairment of non-financial assets other than goodwill and other indefinite life intangible assets**

Swan Districts Football Club (Inc) assesses impairment of non-financial assets other than goodwill and other indefinite life intangible assets at each reporting date by evaluating conditions specific to Swan Districts Football Club (Inc) and to the particular asset that may lead to impairment. If an impairment trigger exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is determined. This involves fair value less costs of disposal or value-in-use calculations, which incorporate a number of key estimates and assumptions.

### **Employee benefits provision**

As discussed in note 1, the liability for employee benefits expected to be settled more than 12 months from the reporting date are recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.



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
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
