espite our tremendous effort levels on the day, season 2022 finished on a very disappointing note with our WAFL league side's elimination loss to Peel, but off-field we continued to grow our business and the profile of the Bulldogs brand on many levels:

- 1. Our Membership growth continues to translate into growth of related and new revenue streams
- 2. Our 2022 Corporate Sponsorship was 24 per cent up on 2021
- 3. The obvious red and white dominance in our crowds was testament to our merchandise sales which are the envy of the league
- 4. Our WAFLW team competed in their third season, won four games, produced two AFLW draftees and our Rogers Cup girls again played finals footy to validate our belief that our women's programme is strong and the future is bright
- 5. All 3 male teams played finals footy for the first time in seven years
- 6. Our 6500 crowd for WA Day was the biggest crowd of the competition in 2022 and what could be better than banking some serious money while continuing to torture the Moss Street Fairies
- 7. We will again post a healthy net profit to continue building our balance sheet in readiness for redevelopment of Fremantle Community Bank Oval

Our off-field team lead by CEO Cameron Britt are without peer, totally committed and the best in the business, thank you to all and I look forward to a 2023 season full of continued achievement.

To have four players in one year play, 100 (Dylan Main), 100 (Chad Pearson), 150 (Zac Strom) and 200 (Haiden Schloithe) games is confirmation of the culture and attractiveness of our club as a destination when the Perth Football Club haven't had a 150-game player in the last 25 years!

Our player retirements need to be celebrated but the fact that all leave us as premiership players is particularly satisfying.

Haiden Schloithe retires as probably our most decorated player in the last 45 years and while Mason Shaw and Steve Verrier only had brief AFL careers, they never hesitated to return home to the Bulldogs where they both became wonderful players, but even more importantly, even better citizens.

Nick Suban's competitive edge may be a loss on-field in 2023, but he will assist Todd Curley in the coaches box next year which shows the esteem he is held in, at Fremantle Community Bank Oval.

Season 2023 will only get harder on and off the field, with your Board's focus being:

1. More development and on-field success in both our male and female programs with all possible resources allocated sensibly to both programs, to support achieving this goal

- the redevelopment of Fremantle Community Bank Oval is almost to a point of seeking funding and this is an absolute priority for your Board

- Our colts team playing (and winning) a WAFL final, our first participation since 2018



FINANCE REPORT

n 2022 we have achieved a strong financial outcome for the Club, with a full-year cash profit result of \$158,383 and a net profit of \$119,702.

From an operational perspective, we experienced significant revenue gains from the key income activities of Gate Receipts \$105,000, Membership/Retail Sales \$278,000 and Commercial Partnership arrangements \$675,000.

These income streams exceeded budget, some markedly so.

Our financial performance places us in the fortunate position that we can invest into our football programs, facilities and people. By doing so, we structure and steward the club towards sustainable success, on and off field.

We continue to pursue incremental growth and have clear financial foundations.

As detailed in our 'Bullish' strategic plan, we aspire to:

Be profitable

Be debt free

Preserve and grow our asset base

eason 2022 for me, is a reminder to never take playing in Grand Finals (winning premierships) for granted. It feels like a season of 'so near, yet so far for both male and female football programs, a season where the stars did not quite align.

Our League, Reserves and Colts teams all played finals, with all seasons coming to an end early in their finals campaign. Our WAFLW team secured much needed wins but rue the loss of winnable games which prevented finals action. While our Youth Girls showed courage in reaching the preliminary final, opponents Peel Thunder were the team to advance to the Rogers Cup Grand Final.

In stating this, it is not a case of being 'glass half empty' - far from it. We had four out of five teams play finals, we had many positive stories/results from each team, but for different reasons we could not make it happen. It is again a case of 'back to the drawing board' to analyse and review each program, so as to highlight and understand where we can/ need to improve.

The challenges and focus for the female programs are on maintaining continuous improvement in 2023. Our on-field results will take care of themselves, if we continue to improve on the basics, raise our expected standards and strengthen our overall depth of talent.

The introduction of our female 'Metro Development Squad' in the back end of this season, is a great start in commencing a structured talent pathway for our players. There are certainly no negatives when you engage 50 young females so early in their development, all of whom display a desire and commitment to learn and improve.

For the male teams, we will need to ensure all 'areas of improvement', highlighted in the post-season review, are the focus pre-season and in-season, with the first major objective being to secure quality recruits for our retiring premiership stars - one being one of our best of all time.

Our league team will certainly look a lot different without Nick Suban controlling the midfield, the forward key pillar in Mason Shaw, the versatile Steve Verrier and the champion Haiden Schloithe.

Haiden's on-field performances have been simply outstanding and will no doubt be hard to replace, but we are talking about a team and losing four



Brilliant Schloithe claims fifth F&B

he remarkable career of Haiden Schloithe concluded at the end of the 2022 season by him bringing up his 200-game milestone but also while remaining right at the peak of his powers culminating in winning the WJ Hughes Medal for a fifth time.

Schloithe had made the decision that 2022 would always likely be his final WAFL season but even he might not have expected that he would finish in such dominant and outstanding form.

The 29-year-old had a good enough first half of the 2022 season where he was spending a significant percentage of games in the forward half, but once he became a permanent on-baller throughout the second half of the season, his form was irresistible.

Schloithe ended up averaging 27.9 possessions in the last eight games of the season and that form was recognised by being named to the WAFL Team of the Week in seven of those while racking up plenty of votes both in the Sandover and Hughes Medal counts.

By the end of the season, Schloithe ended up named to the WAFL Team of the Year for the seventh straight season while ending up runner-up in the Sandover Medal and then claimed a fifth WJ Hughes Medal as the South Fremantle fairest and best.

By becoming a five-time fairest and best winner, it puts Schloithe in rarefied air in the history of the South Fremantle Football Club. The only player in the club's history to be a five-time fairest and best winner is the legendary Stephen Michael.

Schloithe claimed his first Hughes Medal in 2014 with his second coming in 2017 when he also won the Sandover Medal. He claimed another fairest and best award in 2019, then another in 2021 and now closes his career by winning the medal for a fifth time.

In many ways it's a shame that Schloithe has announced his retirement following the 2022 season, but at the same time seeing a player going out while at the absolute top of his game still is also something to cherish.

Schloithe played another 19 games in 2022 and kicked 23 goals to take his career-tally to 200 matches and 219 goals.

Along the way, he has won five Hughes Medals, a Sandover Medal, has represented Western Australia three times and he is a South Fremantle premiership player and life member.

As good as Schloithe was in 2022, he was far from the only standout performer in a South Fremantle

team that reached the finals for a seventh consecutive season.

Emerging defender Toby McQuilkin was tremendous and consistent all season long to finish runner-up in fairest and best voting. On the back of being Player of the Finals in his debut season in 2021, he took the next step in 2022 to also be named to the WAFL Team of the Year.

Another standout defender, Chad Pearson, took out the third-place in the Hughes Medal count after another strong season where he continues to cement himself as one of the best and most versatile defenders in the competition.

He also celebrated his 100th game for South Fremantle in the elimination final against Peel Thunder.

Other award winners for 2022 including the retiring Mason Shaw ending his career with a fifth John Gerovich Trophy as the leading goalkicker having kicked 23 goals in his 12 appearances.

Steely Green was still eligible to play colts but played some impressive league football to win the Shearer Family Trophy as Best First Year Player while Jarrad Doney took out the Culver Family Award for courage and perseverance, and the Warren Medal for Best Clubman went to Josh Cuneo.







MILESTONES CELEBRATED IN 2022

here were plenty of memorable moments throughout the 2022 season, including Haiden Schloithe, Chad Pearson, Dylan Main and Zac Strom reaching significant milestones.

Schloithe brought up his 200th game in what proved the last appearance of his remarkable career in the elimination final against Peel Thunder.

He became just the 20th South Fremantle player to reach 200 games, and the first since his long-time teammate and great friend Ashton Hams who retired on 205 matches at the end of 2018.

Most importantly to Schloithe, he's both a premiership player with South Fremantle from 2020 and a life member of the Bulldogs have reached 150 games.

The script could hardly have been written any better for Strom to reach 150 games with South Fremantle to see him earn life membership of the Bulldogs in the Round 14 win over East Fremantle at the WACA Ground

Strom paid tribute to late uncle David as he reached the milestone as well.

"It was a bit sad that our uncle David won't be there after he passed away earlier this year. He was always a huge supporter of mine and my sponsor for the last couple of years," Strom said.

"He managed to stay away for a lot more games than he was expected to but he will be someone I am always thinking about pre-game and how important a milestone like this would be to him as well."

Only 12 other men have ever done what Main has already done by captaining South Fremantle to a WAFL premiership and now he cements his place further at the Bulldogs by reaching 100 games.

The 2020 premiership captain reached the mark in the Round 9 victory against Perth to book his name on the No. 21 locker.

Also in the elimination final, Pearson reached 100 games to etch his name onto the No. 12 locker.

Pearson broke into the South Fremantle team late in the 2017 season and from Round 2 of 2018 he was in the side and hasn't looked back.


Already Pearson is a premiership player having played twice in the WAFL State Team and being named to the WAFL Team of the Year in 2019 and 2020.

he 2022 season saw the end of an era in a lot players with the Bulldogs, while Suban finished his remarkable career at South Fremantle having arrived already with 156 AFL games under his belt, and three WAFL premierships.

> Schloithe retires an all-time great of the South Fremantle Football Club and he fits comfortably being placed right up there in the champions of the Bulldogs for what he has achieved since arriving at Fremantle Community Bank Oval having grown up in Katanning.

> Having grown up admiring Kyle and Ashton Hams who were his immediate South Fremantle heroes, Schloithe not only got to be the teammate to the dual premiership winning twins, but went on to produce his own remarkable career.

> Not only did Schloithe begin his career at South Fremantle with a colts premiership and being rook-

> > ie-listed by the Dockers, once he settled into the league side firstly under Paul Hasleby and then Todd Curley, he cemented himself as one of the elite players in the WAFL competition.

> > Whether playing as a classy on-baller equally adept at winning contested ball or being damaging out in space, or being a crafty goalkicker, Schloithe became an unstoppable force over a 200-game career with South Fremantle.

> > He celebrated his 200th game in the elimination final loss to bring an end to career that sees him retire having won a Sandover Medal, five Hughes Medals as fairest and best and representing Western Australia three times, being in the WAFL Team of the Year the last seven straight years since it began and being a life member of the Bulldogs.

> > Upon retiring, Schloithe couldn't help but be proud of what he achieved.

> > "Having been retired for a few days and getting the chance sit back and reflect it's a huge honour and something I'll cherish forever to play 200 games for the South Fremantle Football Club," Schloithe said.

"I will be forever grateful to club for giving me the opportunity to play at the level and live out a child-hood dream.

"The people and club has pretty much been my life and family for 10-plus years and what they mean to me I cannot put into words. I love the club and it will always hold a special place in my heart and footy career."

The thing that Schloithe will cherish more than anything from his career at South Fremantle is the bond he's made with his teammates.

Whether that's veterans like Craig White, Kris Miller and Paul Mugambwa who were there early in his career, or those who he came through colts with like Shaw, Verrier, Dylan Main, Jason Maskos and Brendon Ah Chee, or the next generation like Steely Green, Riley Colborne and Toby McQuilkin, Schloithe will treasure the memories with all of them.

And he's already counting down the time to that first reunion of the 2020 premiership.

"I've been lucky enough to play with some incredible players over the years, there is too many to name," he said.

"The blokes that shared in my 200 games, and the 2020 flag will be ones I remember forever."

The reason for retirement before even turning 30 is so that Schloithe can focus on other aspects of his life and career without the significant commitments that go into playing WAFL football.

So in the short-term that means he won't have any official involvement at the Bulldogs in 2023, but he doesn't expect that to remain the case forever given how much he loves the club.

"I'll still be coming down to watch and support the club as much as I can and going forward maybe in a few years I'll look to get back involved in some capacity with coaching," Schloithe said.



ason Shaw burst onto the scene in the colts with South Fremantle and was drafted on the back of that, but it was back at the Bulldogs where he put together an outstanding WAFL career.

Shaw kicked 12 goals across the 2011 and 2012 colts grand finals including winning the Mel Whinnen Medal in the first of those premierships before being drafted to Port Adelaide at the end of 2012.

He returned to South Fremantle in 2016 ready to make an impact, and that's exactly what he did as the spearhead in attack ever since.

Now Shaw retires having played 133 games, kicking 296 goals and winning the Bernie Naylor Medal as the league's leading goalkicker in 2020.

He also won the John Gerovich Trophy as the Bulldogs' leading goalkicker five times, including for his 23 goals in 12 matches again in 2022.

Shaw's consistency the past seven seasons saw him kick 51 goals in 2016, 44 in 2017, 47 in 2018, 55 in 2019, 24 in 2020, 52 in 2021 and then 23 in 2022.

Shaw's best haul was seven goals that he kicked in Round 20, 2018 against Perth at Fremantle Community Bank Oval. He kicked six goals on another four occasions throughout his career, twice each in 2018 and 2019, and he kicked five goals 14 times including in Round 18 of this year against Subiaco.

Shaw especially enjoyed playing against the Demons in his career kicking 51 goals from 13 matches against them while Claremont proved his toughest opponents with 20 goals from 19 games.

He never played a season with South Fremantle where he didn't play finals as well with Shaw also the vice-captain of the 2020 premiership team, and the captain of the team that reached the 2021 grand final.

Across his career, Shaw enjoyed great success with South Fremantle taking part in 92 wins from his 133 games, and he will go down as the club's 12th highest goal scorer behind only Bernie Naylor (1034), John Gerovich (744), Jon Dorotich (459), Ray Bauskis (436), Steve Marsh (418), Sol Lawn (407), Noel Carter (317), Brian Ciccotosto (312), Brad Hardie (308), Graham Scott (301) and Ryan Murphy (300).

hen Nick Suban arrived at South Fremantle he had already put together quite the football career in the AFL and WAFL, but he only added to that legacy over the past five years.

Suban joined the Fremantle Dockers from the North Ballarat Rebels before making his AFL debut in 2009, and going on to play 156 games including in the 2013 grand final.

For most of his AFL career, he was a crucial and consistent member of the Dockers team and a high-quality AFL footballer right up until his last season in 2017 when he still made 12 appearances to earn life membership by surpassing the 150-game milestone.

There were times Suban found himself out of the team, though, and that saw him play in Claremont's 2012 premiership and then in the back-to-back flags at Peel Thunder in 2016 and 2017.

By that stage he had 156 AFL and 33 WAFL games under his belt, and plenty to be proud of, but Suban was anything but ready to hang up his boots and with his family committed to remaining in Perth, he signed at South Fremantle.

He played his first game for the Bulldogs in 2018 and fit in immediately, and over the past five years actually spent more time as a midfielder than any other time throughout his career where he largely played off half-back or in midfield tagging roles.

Suban went on to put together a tremendous five seasons with the Bulldogs where he amassed 87 games and was a key contributor in the 2020 premiership.

That meant he joined rare company in WAFL history by playing in a fourth premiership across the three clubs that he played with.

Having played 156 AFL games, 120 in the WAFL and winning the four premierships and playing in an AFL grand final all means that Suban crammed a lot into his playing career after moving to the other side of the country.

Suban won't be lost to South Fremantle either with him set to join the coaching staff under Todd Curley from 2023.

teve Verrier's league career with South Fremantle spanned three stints and along the way he was always one of the hardest working and most committed of players as he announces his retirement for good at the end of the 2022 season.

Verrier began his career with the Bulldogs by being part of the colts premiership winning team of 2011 and on the back of that was drafted to Richmond. He spent the 2012 and 2013 seasons with the Tigers in the AFL and while he didn't make his AFL debut, did play 31 VFL games.

He then returned to South Fremantle for the 2014 WAFL season and quickly became a key player for the Bulldogs and someone who could play a variety of roles.

It didn't take long for Verrier to become one of the more reliable and consistent performers in the Bulldogs set up over the next seven seasons culminating in him playing in the 2020 premiership triumph.

Illustrating Verrier's standing among his peers and the inner sanctum of the South Fremantle Football Club also saw him win the Warren Medal and best clubman in 2019.

Following the 2020 season, Verrier decided to step away from WAFL football in 2021 but the calling was there to return and he was back in 2022.

Once he settled back into the line-up, Verrier found his groove once again in the midfield for the Bulldogs and had another strong season which he should be proud of as he now moves into retirement.

Verrier ends his WAFL career having played 134 games with South Fremantle, which included 15 finals and 2020 premiership.

He also got to live out every boy's dream by playing alongside brother Brendan who was able to play 76 games with South Fremantle until concussion symptoms brought a premature end to his career at the end of the 2019 season.



Winmar, Farmer the latest to be honoured

wo of South Fremantle's greatest Indigenous players received well-deserved recognition in 2022 for their outstanding careers.

South Fremantle has a rich history of being home to some of the all-time great Indigenous footballers to ever play the game, and without question two of those are Jeff Farmer and Nicky Winmar.

Not only are the pair both trendsetters and ground breakers who started their careers with South Fremantle before going on to do remarkable things in the AFL, but they are two of the most supremely talented and spectacular players to ever grace the football field.

And in 2022, Winmar was inducted into the Australian Football Hall of Fame while Farmer took his rightful place in the West Australian Football Hall of Fame.

Winmar began his senior football career with South Fremantle in 1983 and over the next four seasons played 58 matches for the Bulldogs before joining St Kilda.

It was at the Saints where Winmar became one of the game's most dynamic players, but also will always be

remembered for standing up to racism and creating that famous image for lifting his jumper to point to his skin at Victoria Park.

All up, Winmar would go on to play 230 games for St Kilda before ending his career with one season at the Western Bulldogs in 1999.




He has remained a tre-

mendous ambassador ever since and his statue sits outside Optus Stadium.

Meanwhile, Farmer got his start with South Fremantle too before joining Melbourne and quickly becoming one of the true stars of the AFL as a small forward.

He would become lovingly known as 'The Wizard' and went on to kick 224 goals in his 131 games for the Demons, but it was his spectacular goals and high-flying marks that really grabbed the spotlight.

Farmer then finished his AFL career with another 118 games for 259 goals at Fremantle to see him finish with 249 games and 483 across the two clubs. He wasn't done either, returning to South Fremantle for the 2009 season and helping the Bulldogs win the premiership before he sailed off into the sunset.



ot only did South Fremantle reach the finals for a seventh straight WAFL season in 2022, but also continued to blood new talent to keep the next generation coming through with another nine players making their debuts.

While Brendon Ah Chee, Jordan Boullineau and Josh Cuneo had previously played at other WAFL clubs, they made their first appearances for South Fremantle in 2022 while Lachlan Taylor, Riley Colborne, Steely Green, Darryl Anderson, Jacob Sax and Tyson Headland made their first WAFL appearances.

Taylor joined South Fremantle from the Northern Territory this season and was there for Round 1 to get his first taste of playing in the WAFL. He would go on to play five games in his first season and played some terrific reserves football when not in the league side.

Colborne is only 19 years of age but broke through to be in the team for Round 1 this year and settled nicely into the Bulldogs' back-line. He went on to play 11 games this season including kicking a memorable first career goal in Round 5 against Peel Thunder.

While Green was still eligible to play colts in 2022 and played State 18s, he showed he is already more than up to holding his own at league level. He might be small, but his pace and ball winning ability stood out in the eight matches he did play in 2022.

He made a stunning debut with 25 possessions in Round 1 against Subiaco and went on to play six of the first seven games.

He then returned to the league line-up in spectacular fashion in Round 20 where he racked up 31 disposals in the 64-point win against Subiaco and he also got his first taste of finals action the next week against Peel Thunder.

Cuneo had previously played 45 games with East Fremantle in the WAFL before taking a break, but he made his return to state league football in 2022 at South Fremantle.

He made his Bulldogs debut in Round 1 against Subiaco and became an important part of the defensive unit as the season went on with his versality and running ability became a feature of his

play.

Cuneo went on to play 15 matches in his first season with South Fremantle while also getting his first taste of finals in the WAFL to now be at 60 games for his career.

Boullineau had previously played 27 games with Peel Thunder before also taking a break from the WAFL, and then returning with South Fremantle in 2022.



He was another to be part of the back-line and was there for Round 1 and it was only injury that saw him limited to 12 games in his first season with South Fremantle. Now 39 games into a WAFL career, he looks more than capable of being a staple of the Bulldogs defence for years to come.

It seems strange to have Ah Chee on the list of debutants at South Fremantle given how experienced he is, but before he was drafted to Port Adelaide he didn't make a league debut with the Bulldogs.

Now after an AFL career that saw him play 27 games with the Power and another 31 at the West Coast Eagles along with 29 matches in the WAFL with East Perth and the Eagles, he finally got to make his South Fremantle debut in Round 3 against Claremont.

Ah Chee went on to have a terrific season for the Bulldogs too and no longer was he asked to sit out on a wing or half-forward flank like he has through most of his career.


He spent more time in the midfield for South Fremantle and produced some outstanding performances including 30 possessions in Round 13 against Swan Districts.


Sax is another player who continued to bang the door down in the reserves for a chance at league level and that opportunity presented for him in Round 8 against East Perth.

THE YEAR OF BULLDOGS IN AFL/AFLW

outh Fremantle once again had some of the genuine stars of the AFL competition running around in 2022 having hailed from the Bulldogs with the talent showcased from the club on the national stage.

It wasn't just the AFL competition where the Bulldogs were well represented either with another pair of South Fremantle products playing for the Fremantle Dockers in AFLW while another two sisters were drafted to the West Coast Eagles.

Callum Ah Chee played another 21 matches with the Brisbane Lions in 2022 including the three finals to take his career tally now to 105 since making his debut at the Gold Coast Suns in 2016.

Tim English continued to emerge as one of the best versatile big men in the AFL throughout 2022 with the Western Bulldogs. He played another 16 games and has now played 85 matches since 2017.

Shai Bolton is now one of the genuine superstars of the AFL with Richmond and his 2022 season was brilliant going on to average 17.5 possessions a game to go with kicking 43 goals while splitting his time between playing the midfield and forward-line.

He's now 90 games into a career that has included already included winning two premierships and is only going to continue improving.

The 2022 season might have been a challenging one at the West Coast Eagles, but Tim Kelly battled hard in the midfield to end up playing another 17 games and finishing third in fairest and best voting. He has now played 102 AFL matches having started his career at Geelong in 2018.

Marlion Pickett was another strong performer for Richmond throughout 2022. He got his chance in fairytale style in 2019 at the Tigers starring in the premiership win of that year following 98 WAFL games with South Fremantle, and how he's put together 57 games in the AFL with the Tigers.

Billy Frampton started his AFL career with Port Adelaide where he played three games across 2018 and 2019, but it's at the Adelaide Crows where he's received more opportunities. He played another six games in 2022 to take his career tally to 24.

The 2022 season didn't quite turn out how Matthew Parker hoped with Richmond and he elected to return home, and he will play with South Fremantle again in 2023. That brings to an end an AFL career that saw him play 30 games and kick 23 goals across St Kilda and the Tigers.

Shannon Neale was able to breakthrough to make his AFL debut in 2022. While he couldn't hold a place in the powerful Geelong premiership winning team, he still showed encouraging signs for the future in those two appearances.

Jesse Motlop was in his first AFL season and he was another to impress as a small forward with Carlton offering a glimpse into what his future could mean. He played 12 matches for the Blues and kicked 12

Meanwhile in the AFLW action in 2022, Mim Strom and Makaela Tuhakaraina were both part of the Fremantle Dockers teams, and then both Zoe and Lauren Wakfer were drafted to the West Coast Eagles.

While neither was able to make it on the field in the second AFLW season of 2022, the future is bright for them and having the sisters drafted to the Eagles became one of the great feelgood stories of the football year.

TALENT REPORT

olts and Futures pre-season began under the watch of Clayton Anderson, who did a great job of getting staff organised and training underway before moving across to the WAFC and me stepping in to the role of Talent Manager. In what was a potentially tough start to the year, the staff and players all played a big role in making sure pre-season was smooth and kept running at a high level even with a changeover in management.

The colts group were determined to bounce back after a disappointing end to 2021 just missing out on finals and it was clear we had a talented and driven group from the start of 2022. The colts and futures shared a pre-season venue at Nicholson Reserve and while hectic at times with two large squads on the same ground, it provided a good opportunity for our futures boys to have a first-hand view of the talent pathway at South Fremantle and what lays ahead for them in the coming years.

For myself personally, coming into this role midway through pre-season has been a challenging but extremely rewarding experience, and it wouldn't have been possible without the assistance of our staff all the way from 14s up to colts. A special mention needs to be made for the colts and futures staff who were massive in their efforts when I was fresh to the role and went above and beyond in their roles which gave me time to get across everything and get to work.

14S ACADEMY

14s development squads are the first taste of the talent pathway at South Fremantle Football Club and where we first welcome the most talented players in our zone as South Fremantle players. This is an extremely important program for the development of our players as it works them at a different level to community football and prepares them for the rigors of the talent pathway as they progress upwards. The players went through a seven-week training program followed by two games against Perth and East Fremantle. An initial squad of 100 players was refined to two squads of 30 who would take part in these games. The coaches put in a huge amount of work both in talent ID and making sure training ran smoothly with a large player group. Success in a 14s program is defined by whether the players develop in their mindset and ability as footballers, and these players clearly developed in both of these aspects throughout the seven weeks, and are well placed to move up through our talent pathway.

15S ACADEMY

Our 15s this year were a very talented group who were keen to build on a successful 14s program in 2021. A group of 80 players were invited down and worked to make it into the final squad of 60 who took part in a 10-week training program followed by two

games against Swan Districts and Subiaco. Again, in the 15s we are not worried about wins and losses, but it was extremely pleasing to see the 15s boys developing and playing a style of game similar to our colts team. The 15s boys will now look to the futures program starting up in November 2022.

UGS RAMS/GASCOYNE BULLDOGS ACADEMIES

The work in our regional zones in both the Upper Great Southern and Gascoyne regions has been extremely important in identifying and developing talent for SFFC. The work of the Stephen Michael Foundation across both regions has helped us deliver high-level development programs in regions from where South Fremantle has had many strong footballers come and play.

In the Upper Great Southern region, the leadership of coaches Liam Anthony and Tony Micale in partnership with Wheatbelt Regional Development Specialist Paul Reid we saw close to 80 players attending a four-month training program leading into the Great Southern Colts Carnival in Lake Grace and the Regional 15s Carnival in Perth in the July school holidays.

In the Gascoyne region, there has been a mountain of work done by Tessa Daly and her team to get our most talented young players involved in higher-level development programs and stay in football in Carnarvon and Exmouth. We are aiming to get a program similar to the Upper Great Southern running in the Gascoyne with increasing numbers of kids attending and being developed by high-level coaches.

FUTURES PROGRAM

The futures program began pre-Christmas 2021 with a group of 65 players all aiming to make the final squad of 40 leading into six pre-season games in 2022. The program had its challenges with a change-over of Talent Managers in January, but the work of head coach Dan Richards and coaching director Clint Gardiner ensured that the program kept running during this time period and the players got a full preseason thanks to Dan, Clint and the coaching and S&C staff.

The program was a challenging one overall for both players and coaches, with the group not winning a game across six rounds, but the group continued to work and develop and set a good foundation for the boys to move on to colts football.

In 2022 we had nine futures aged players transition to the colts program and train for the majority of the season, which was a credit to the work of these boys

to be able to stay with the colts program and to train at the level required. We are looking forward to seeing our futures boys continue to develop in 2023 in our colts program.

A big thanks needs to go to coach Dan Richards, Clint Gardiner and their assistants Fabian Dawson, Cam Dawe and Scott Faulkner for their efforts in both planning a program and implementing it with a focus on football development for all of the boys. Also thanks to Dylan Hutchins (S&C coordinator) and Emma McElligott (head trainer), who put in a big body of work making sure the boys could get back from injury and play a part in our fixtures. And finally to Leon 'Pops' Flanagan, who kept all of us together in a tough season and worked tirelessly to make sure the boys (and coaches) were always doing the right thing.

COLTS PROGRAM

The colts program began with lots of optimism about the group (despite some uncertainty around the COVID situation), and we felt like we were in a good position to make finals for the first time in four years. The year started off shakily with a tough loss to Subiaco but we quickly bounced back with a strong win against Claremont in our next fixture. This turned out to be the story of our year with big momentum swings for us determining how we performed each week.

Although we had an even year of wins and losses (8-8), we managed to win important games at crucial times of the year to secure our first finals berth in the colts since 2018. Even though the final game against Subiaco was an extremely tough way to go out, the fact we made finals and managed to win a final in arguably our best game of the year against East Perth should show it was a successful year for our colts. Although we definitely felt like we had more to prove and the ability to match it with the best teams, the learning experience of playing finals will be valuable for our boys going forward whether that's in colts or senior footy.

In 2022 we had two colts aged boys play league football for most of the year in Steely Green and Riley Colborne, and in total we had 11 colts aged players play senior football for SFFC. This is a credit to the work done by head coach Larry Cavallo and his assistant coaches not only this year but throughout the past years during their time in the colts pathway.

A big thanks to head coach Larry Cavallo and his assistants in Glenn Davies, Pierce Dawson, Barry Stanton, Tony Watson, Louis Cronan, Steve Goodall and Chris O'Connor who made it a smooth transition into the Talent Manager role for me due to their ability pitch in and go above and beyond in their roles. Also thanks to Courtney Kranz (head physio) and her medical staff and Alex Webster (S&C coordinator) who put in a huge amount of work which paid off

in terms of a relatively small number of injuries in 2022 when compared to other programs and other years.

cross the past 12 months the Stephen Michael Foundation (SMF) has experienced further growth, welcomed more staff and increased its Program Scope throughout different regions of WA. I am excited to announce we have launched our third Strategic Plan 2022-24 and welcomed our new Cultural Ambassador, Nick Abraham.

On the back of two COVID-impacted years, we have continued to evolve and expand in the regions we work. Through sheer determination and collaboration, the team have undergone a significant amount of planning and program delivery to build relationships with all communities we are involved with. Not only have we fostered key partnerships, but we have also ensured the strength of our brand remains at the centre. Our increasing ability to collaborate with like-minded people and organisations is a key to the success of engaging youth and something our staff at the Foundation pride ourselves on.

This year we have continued to put together and deliver excellent programs throughout WA in both schools and in the community. We are currently working across 40 Local Government Authorities (LGAs) and delivering programs to over 30 schools, constantly receiving outstanding feedback from all stakeholders about the delivery of our programs.

PROGRAM DELIVERY

The Rising Leaders Program continues to be our flagship program covering a range of topics focused on building character and self-confidence whilst also developing key skills required for young people to emerge as leaders within the community. We understand that each community or school has differ-



ent needs, and as a result our programs are tailored accordingly. We recognise 'One shoe does not fit all.'

Our unique approach of running programs both in and out of schools for all communities in which we are involved with, has provided our team with a greater sense of connection in community, as well as the ability to influence youth in a positive light.

The ability to work across many portfolios is one of our greatest assets, as we continue to deliver exceptional programs and I thank them all for the effort and passion to deliver great outcomes for our youth. A huge thanks to our ever-growing staff for their continued efforts in program planning, delivery, and review.

STAFF PERFORMANCE

The SMF has grown significantly over the past twelve months with staff numbers growing to around 25 with most staff being part-time. We have a diverse staff cohort in terms of age, background, and skillset. Our Senior Leadership Team meets fortnightly to cover operational issues, team cohesion and spend some time on leadership skills development. I'd like to take this time to thank our Senior Leadership Team of Liam Anthony, Julie Jackson, Andrew McCarrey, Rory Yates, Tessa Daly and Tony Micale for their continued passion and commitment to drive our organisation further.

DONATIONS AND SUPPORT

Despite the exciting level of funding that has been secured through new partnerships, the SMF do not have enough resources to meet the growing demand for our programs. Every week we receive requests for program delivery in new regions plus additional requests from existing communities to increase program delivery and reach. For this reason, we continue to seek funding support through donations and sponsorships. With programs being delivered across metro, regional and remote WA, we can also provide unique and rewarding volunteer experiences for anyone wishing to give back to the community.

This year SFFC named us as the Charity partner for the WA Derby Day Game, while this was a great opportunity for the Foundation to fundraise it provided some additional exposure to the wider community. We look forward to being provided this opportunity in the future.

FAYE MINETT (92) - Died December 19, 2021. Mother of Kevin and Life Member (2000) Sue Gurney.

PETER PRINCE - Tragically killed in a traffic accident in Vietnam in early January 2022. Son-in-law of premiership player (1970) Frank (Cap 891) and Mary Legena (nee Neesham). From the Prince family who conducted the well known, Launch and Rottnest Ferry services.

MAXWELL BARRETT (91) - Died December 28, 2021 and JEAN BARRETT (92) - Died January 12, 2022. Parents of premiership player (1980), Life Member (1982), Hall of Famer (2015) and 200 game player Rod (Cap 1004).

DAVID STROM - Died April 20, 2022. Wonderful human being and great South Fremantle person, serving as Director from 2011-2017. Sponsor and relative of our Zac (155 games) and Noah (88). A real fighter during prolonged health battle.

BRIAN JAMES WILLIS (Cap 755) - Died June 14, 2022 at the age of 92. Long association having played one game in 1953 and in 1952, 53 and 54 reserves premiership. Son Bruce, is a Director.

The White family are true blue representatives of The Premier Family Club.

RON CHRISTMAS - Died July 7, 2022. Long-time supporter and sponsor, and member of Social Committee in 1980s.

MARY BUCAT (103) - Died July 8, 2022. Matriarch of Bucat family. Son Bob (Cap 813) played 64 games and son-in-law Jack Sumich (Cap 803) played 60 games.

In all 12 Rioli family members have played over 413 games. A great personality who represented his family and the Tiwi Island people with class and distinction.

LAURIE GEROVICH - Sadly lost long battle with cancer on July 27, 2022. Older brother of Jerome (Jerry) and club legends John (Cap 771).

DENNIS NOVAK (Cap 902) - Died unexpectedly in early August 2022. Talented wingman who represented South in Thirds and Reserves, and played four League games in 1966.

THOMAS GRIFFITHS JONES - Died August 6, 2022. Dedicated life-long supporter, who served on Committee of Management in 1975 and 1976 and Assistant Team Manager with Robbie Moore in 1975-76.

TONY PARENTICH (Cap 744) - Died September 15, 2022. South champion playing 162 quality games between 1952-61. Premiership player 1952-1954, won Simpson Medal in in 1956, Walker Medal in 1957 and awarded Life Membership in 1963. Appointed Club Trustee 2001-21, inaugural inductee into South Hall of Fame and became Legend in 2015. Person of great character and a wonderful sports person playing cricket with the South Fremantle Footballers Cricket Club and participating in many legendary performances with the late Charlie Tyson. Also played A-grade at University under captain John Inversity with distinction.

CHARLOTTE EDNA (MONA) DOROTICH - Died September 22, 2022, Son Jon (Cap 1065) played 151 games and was premiership co-captain 1997 as part of a distinguished WAFL and VFL/AFL career. Inducted into South Hall of Fame 2015.

NOEL JOHNSON (Cap 630) - Died September 29, 2022 at the wonderful age of 98. True South man who played 11 games in 1943.

RAYMOND JONES (Cap 735) - Died September 22, 2022 aged 97. Part of 1953 premiership. Represented South in 24 games between 1951-53. Established successful architectural firm. Freo person through and through, and tossed coin earlier in 2022 at Collingwood game as their oldest surviving player.

BRETT LITTLE (Cap 1093) - Died after suffering a long illness, in late September 2022. From Pingelly and played 13 games between 1984-85.

ROBIN LOWREY (Cap 830) - Died October 13, 2022. From Pingelly and a goal kicking rover playing 23 games before a knee injury. Partner in Bridge Travel Centre and hard-working Member of our Committee of Management during 1977-80.



Gilchrist takes out fairest and best award

n the back of another strong Rogers Cup season from the South Fremantle Youth Girls and the best ever WAFLW season from the league team, and there was pretty to celebrate at the Allomes Medal Presentation Evening in July.

The 2022 season saw South Fremantle's WAFLW team take significant leaps forward by winning four games and remaining in finals contention until late in the campaign. The Rogers Cup team once again qualified for finals and reached the preliminary final in another terrific season.

Those performances were celebrated at the Allomes Medal night with WAFLW star Liusaidh Gilchrist ending up named the league fairest and best winner, and claiming both the Allomes Medal and Fremantle Community Bank Community Award.

Also on the evening Amanda Ingraham was presented with the Best Club Person Award.





INCREASE MATCH-DAY COMPETITIVENESS

Consistent and wide acknowledgment of the team's improvement by industry peers, media and other internal and external stakeholders was pleasing. Unfortunately, significant losses in key playing personnel through injury severely impacted overall team performance. A lack of continuity in team selection,

with an average of five player changes per week, presented challenges in settling both the overall team lineup and structures, but also players into roles.

Despite this, the team remained competitive and in finals contention until the second last round.

- Extremely competitive against highly successful teams, eg. Peel in Round 13 when we led by 21 points during third quarter and several games decided by two to three goals.
- Statistically, we kicked higher scores and conceded fewer points

An in-season analysis of match-day performances identified four key areas of deficiency. Shared with the playing group as "opportunities for improvement", each was explained and given context, i.e. why each was happening and the result. Underpinned by improvement in the fundamental skills, the four key opportunities for improvement are listed below and

will remain a key focus of our 2023 program:

Increase overall possessions and inside 50s (we are on average 60-70 less per game than the opposition)

Greater composure with the ball (for more effective possession to advantage and reduce turnovers)

Set up behind the ball (to restrict opposition transition and to win the ball back)

Responding to opposition run-ons (to prevent momentum swings and quick scoring against)
