Despite the obvious disappointment on the final day of our season, we continued to grow our business and the profile of the Bulldogs on almost every possible level:

1. We eclipsed our 2020 record Membership of 2394 by 66 per cent finishing on 3980 Members,
2. Our Corporate Sponsorship and support continued to reach unprecedented new levels
3. Our retail activities delivered bumper returns, with considerable merchandise sales growth
4. We competed in our third consecutive Men's League WAFL Grand Final
5. Our Youth Girls competed in their third consecutive Rogers Cup Grand Final
6. We achieved a Net Operating Profit of over \$200,000, "unassisted" by any COVID-19 related Government support programs.

After the COVID-challenged 2020 year, we continue to grow the Bulldogs brand and relevance, on and off the football field and further ingratiate the South Fremantle Football Club into our community. CEO Cameron Britt and his team continue to be the standard-bearers for an off-field team in the WAFL. General Manager, Football and Community Marty Atkins, Commercial Manager Russell Fletcher and Club Operations Coordinator Beth Mews in the Office, are due much of the credit for this achievement.



Their efforts need to be acknowledged and I sincerely thank them.

The 2021 Grand Final disappointment was a reminder of how hard premierships are to win but I can't help but think what may have been, had we had a full squad available from which to pick our team.

However, our performance was brave, we discovered more kids who can play league WAFL footy or even higher, and as one Bulldogs premiership captain commented to me, "the Bulldog spirit lives on".

Season 2022 will present all the usual challenges with our focus going forward being on:

1. More on-field success in both our male and female programs
2. Growing Membership to our "Everest" goal of 5000 Bulldogs Members
3. Continuing to push for funding of the re-development of Fremantle Community Bank Oval
4. Growing the relevance of the Bulldogs brand within both our Metropolitan and Country communities.

The redevelopment of Fremantle Community Bank Oval is a massive focus and with a new Mayor and CEO, co-operation with the City of Fremantle in this regard continues unabated. Despite the 2021 Grand Final returning to Optus Stadium, both the City of Fremantle and your Board remain of the belief that Fremantle Community Bank Oval is a viable

FINANCE REPORT

In 2021 we have achieved a strong financial outcome for the club, with a full-year cash profit result of \$241,266 and a net profit of \$200,235.

Following the financial success of 2020, your club leadership recognised that responding in 2021 in a positive financial manner was a clear imperative, and as such we are very pleased to provide a substantive net return to our members, further consolidating and growing our cash reserves.

From an operational perspective, we experienced significant revenues from several of our core activities, including Game Day Attendances (Gate Receipts \$78,593), Membership (\$124,091), Merchandise/Memorabilia (\$157,251) and Commercial Partnership activities (\$738,000).

Each revenue generating activity listed above represents an increase on 2020 reported revenues, and in the case of Merchandise/Memorabilia and Commercial Partnership, considerable commercial uplift was achieved, increasing profits.

We are very satisfied with our financial performance in 2021, and we are confident that we can continue to govern and operate the club in a smart and responsible fashion, facilitating further incremental growth whilst increasing club profitability and value for Members.



WJ HUGHES MEDAL*Schloithe becomes four-time winner*

Haiden Schloithe's position in history as one of the best and most decorated players to ever pull on a South Fremantle jumper has been cemented with him taking out the 2021 fairest and best award to become a four-time WJ Hughes Medal winner.

As he nears the 200-game mark in his WAFL career with South Fremantle that started in 2011 on the back of a successful colts premiership winning stint, Schloithe delivered another outstanding 2021 season that was capped off by claiming the Bulldogs' fairest and best award.

Schloithe took out the WJ Hughes Medal in the glittering ceremony held to celebrate the 2021 season at the Esplanade Hotel Fremantle and it further cements what is a remarkably decorated career he is building.

It was also announced on the night that Schloithe has signed on for another season in 2022 as well which will have him on track to become just the 20th player in South Fremantle's history to reach 200 games all things going well.

The 181-game superstar produced one of the best seasons of his career in 2021 and that saw him finish third in Sandover Medal voting, named to the WAFL Team of the Year for a sixth straight time and now winning the WJ Hughes Medal.

Schloithe kicked 24 goals in 22 games in 2021 splitting his time between playing as a forward and midfielder while averaging 24.1 possessions along the way while often copping close attention from the opposition.

**HAIDEN SCHLOITHE**

Schloithe finished the Hughes Medal vote count with 170 votes to claim the award for a fourth time while premiership wingman turned on-baller in 2021 Tom Blechynden was recognised for his breakout season by finishing as runner-up with 136 votes.

Premiership defender Chad Pearson cemented himself as one of the elite defenders in the competition in 2021 and he finished third in fairest and best voting with 135 votes

Premiership midfielder Jacob Dragovich had another standout season where he became a 100-game player along the way and finished in fourth position with 127 votes.

Star recruit and versatile key position player Blake Schlensoog was next on 122 votes while Noah Strom was sixth with 118 votes, Brandon Donaldson seventh with 108, Nick Suban eighth with 101, Mason Shaw ninth with 95 and Cody Ninnette 10th with 94.

It was a night to celebrate the continued greatness of Schloithe, though, as he added a fourth Hughes Medal to a career that has already included him winning a premiership, becoming a life member, representing WA three times and winning the 2017 Sandover Medal.

By becoming a four-time winning of South Fremantle's fairest and best award, Schloithe joins some elite company in the history of the Bulldogs as well.

The first player at South Fremantle to win four fairest and best awards was the legendary Steve Marsh who won AW Walker Medals in 1950, 1951, 1952 and 1956.

Stephen Michael then won five fairest and best awards in 1977, 1978, 1979, 1981 and 1983 and he is the only player in history to have now won more than the four that Schloithe has received.

By winning a fourth Hughes Medal, Schloithe goes past Kris Miller, Wally Matera, John Todd, Clive Lewington, Frank Jenkins and Arthur Edgar who have all been crowned club champions three times.

Other major award winners on the night included young gun Toby McQuilkin being named Player of the Finals, Mason Shaw winning the John Gerovich Trophy as leading goalkicker and Blake Schlensoog being named Best First Year Player.

Jake Florenca made a successful return from a ruptured Achilles and took out the Culver Family Award for courage and perseverance while Ben Rioli was named Best Clubman and received the Warren Medal.



Aiden Hall, Jaxon Bellchambers and Jesse Motlop were rewarded with league games after progressing from colts' football in 2020.



in; your roles are a major part of the development of the 60 plus players in the program.



MILESTONES CELEBRATED IN 2021

It was a memorable season in 2021 for so many ways at the South Fremantle Football Club, including some significant milestones reached by players along the way in both the men's and women's teams.

Jacob Dragovich has spent his entire football life with South Fremantle and has been able to turn a promising colts career into an outstanding league career.

He made his debut back in 2015 and has never looked back, and in Round 14 of this season, he celebrated his 100-game milestone.

It might not have been the result at the end of the day that Dragovich and the Bulldogs were hoping for against East Perth at Leederville Oval, but it will still always be a day for him and his young family to remember forever.

The milestone means that Dragovich's name goes onto his No. 2 locker as part of a career that now includes him being a premiership player with the Bulldogs while being a regular top 10 finisher in fairest and best voting over the past six seasons highlighting his consistently outstanding performances.

Nick Suban also reached his 100-game milestone in the WAFL during the 2021 season. While 33 of his now 106 games were played between Claremont and Peel Thunder, it's a significant milestone for the four-time premiership star who also played 156 matches at Fremantle.

Then on the South Fremantle women's side, Chae Salbie made history in 2021 by reaching 200 games played in the various senior teams at the Bulldogs.

Now looking ahead to 2022 and there's already some huge milestones to start looking forward to.

Four-time Hughes Medal winner Haiden Schloithe is on track to become the 20th player with the Bulldogs to reach 200 games. He needs 19 appearances to get to the mark.

Jason Maskos also needs just 19 more games to get to the 150-match milestone which would see him earn life membership on top of being a league, reserves and colts premiership player.

Another Hughes Medal winner and premiership player, Zac Strom, is also on target to earn life membership by reaching 150 games, currently sitting on 138.

This year's third-place getter in the fairest and best count, Chad Pearson, has currently played 82 games and is on target to join the 100-game club and get his name on the No. 12 locker.

Mason Shaw also needs just 27 more goals to become only the 11th player with the Bulldogs to kick 300 goals.

RETIREMENTS

Premiership heroes call time

Brock Higgins and Blayne Wilson joining South Fremantle became a key moment in the Bulldogs' current run of success with the pair instrumental in the 2020 premiership and now they have retired together after outstanding WAFL careers.

Higgins announced his retirement after a trademark outstanding performance full of heart in the 2021 WAFL Grand Final for South Fremantle against Subiaco at Optus Stadium.

The big man had to earn his place back in the South Fremantle side after an injury interrupted season and then missing selection for the qualifying final against Claremont.

But he got back in for the second semi-final and had a remarkable 138 hit outs over next three finals to end his career right on top of his game as one of the league's elite ruckmen.

Wilson, unfortunately, didn't get to finish his career on the field having injured a knee in the second semi-final against Subiaco.

He tried his darndest to get back to play in the Grand Final but it wasn't to be and he was honoured at the

WJ Hughes Medal awards night for his career with South Fremantle along with Higgins.

Higgins arrived at South Fremantle in 2014 with Wilson joining him a year later, and with the former settling into his spot as the lead ruckman and Wilson as a leader of the defensive unit, they were cornerstones in the Bulldogs returning to being a WAFL powerhouse.

South Fremantle didn't play finals between 2012 and 2015, but the presence of Higgins and Wilson were significant factors in that changing and they were important parts of the Bulldogs returning to finals action in 2016.

Both players were key parts of the South Fremantle teams that made preliminary finals in 2016, 2017, 2018, got to a Grand Final in 2019 and then won a premiership in 2020 while also remaining important players in the Bulldogs side that got back to the Grand Final in 2021.

Higgins began his WAFL career at East Perth in 2011 as a big man tried in key positions as well as in the ruck, but with the alignment at the time with the West Coast Eagles he found himself unable to quite lockdown a position.

He did play 14 games in 2013 but couldn't quite break into the team during the finals with the influx of players dropping back into East Perth's team as they made the Grand Final before losing to West Perth.

The big man was after a fresh start and he arrived at South Fremantle in 2014 and never looked back.

Having been forced to play a variety of positions at East Perth, it quickly emerged the ruck was his best position once he arrived at the Bulldogs and over the past eight years he has been the best and most consistent player in the WAFL in that position.



Despite often giving up height or athleticism, it was on pure heart and determination that Higgins became a cornerstone of the South Fremantle team.

Along the way he represented Western Australia in 2018, was named to the WAFL Team of the Year in 2017 and was a remarkable powerhouse of a workhorse in the middle for South Fremantle.

He would carry the ruck virtually on his own week after week, season after season, and do an incredible job of simply wearing down his opposition whether there were one, two or three of them any given week.

Higgins quickly became the heart and soul of the Bulldogs, and whether it was the likes of Ashton Hams, Ryan Cook, Shane Hockey and Tim Kelly early on or Jake Florenca, Tom Blechynden and Nick Suban more recently or Haiden Schloithe and Jacob Dragovich the whole way, his midfield grew an extra leg with him as their ruckman.

Not only that, but Higgins was a big part in creating a terrific culture off the field for the playing group and his passion for the South Fremantle Football Club became infectious, even his Higgs's Heroes video interview series won't be soon forgotten. By the end of the 2021 Grand Final where Higgins put in a massive performer to be South Fremantle's best afield, he had amassed 132 of his career 163 WAFL games with the Bulldogs and his legacy will long live on.

Then there is Wilson who carried on his family's history at South Fremantle when he joined the Bulldogs in 2015 after his time with the West Coast Eagles came to an end after playing nine AFL matches.

He began his career in Mandurah rising through the ranks of Peel Thunder where he would go on to play 36 WAFL games before the alignment between West Coast and East Perth saw him go on to play 29 matches with the Royals.

That included Wilson taking part in the 2013 and 2014 Grand Finals for East Perth before signing with South Fremantle ahead of the 2015 season.

Wilson immediately slotted into the South Fremantle back-line and ever since has been a mainstay of the defensive unit alongside the likes of Zac Strom, Josh Pullman, Marlion Pickett, Jason Maskos, Chad Pearson, Noah Strom, Steve Edwards and others along the way.


What Wilson's trademark soon became was that he was outstanding at reading the entries inside the defensive 50 from the opposition and his ability to take intercept marks was a key aspect of the Bulldogs.

Not only was Wilson tremendous with his overhead marking but also his kicking skills were elite and he would be outstanding at setting up play for South Fremantle out of the back-line.

As a result, he was one of the best defenders in the competition throughout his entire 124-game career with South Fremantle.

Along the way, he was named to the WAFL Team of the Year in 2016, played for WA in 2015 and earned his name on the locker by reaching 100 games and will always be a premiership player from 2020.

There's no question what a hole Higgins and Wilson will leave at South Fremantle moving forward both in terms of what they provided on the field but also off it, but they will both be forever remembered as all-time greats of the Bulldogs.



One of the great highlights of 2021 was the South Fremantle Football Club elevating two men to Legend status and inducting another eight greats into the Bulldogs' Hall of Fame.

It was the third instalment of the South Fremantle Football Club Hall of Fame following ceremonies in 2011 and 2015, and it was a night to cherish and celebrate the greats of the Mighty Red V.

Brian Ciccotosto and Tony Parentich were the two Hall of Fame members who received Legend status.

Ciccotosto enjoyed a brilliant playing career with South Fremantle amassing 212 games between 1967-78 while playing in the 1970 premiership. He would then go on to be the club's chief executive for 23 years up to the end of 2012.

Parentich played 161 games between 1952-61, is a triple premiership player, won the 1957 fairest and best and represented Western Australia eight times.

The eight men then inducted into the Hall of Fame were Marty Atkins, Brad Bootsma, Tom Bottrell, Sir Ross Hutchinson, Toby McGrath, John Porter, Peter Sumich and Peter Worsfold.

Atkins remains the club's games record holder having made 266 appearances between 1989-2003. He played five state games, played in the 1997 premiership and is currently the GM Football/Community.

Bootsma is another 1997 premiership player who amassed 165 games with South Fremantle between 1994-2005 on top of his 23 matches for Fremantle in

the AFL and five for WA.

Bottrell followed in the famous footsteps of his father, Tom Senior, and played exactly 200 games between 1992-2003. He was part of the 1997 premiership, played for WA and has since served as the club's chief executive.

Hutchinson was inducted posthumously with his award accepted by his son, Ross Junior. He played 18 games for South Fremantle in 1947-48 including the 1947 premiership. He was also coach from 1947 through 1949.

McGrath finished his South Fremantle career one of the most decorated players in club history from his 234-game career. He finished with a Sandover Medal, Simpson Medal and two Hughes Medals.

Porter was a key member of the 1997 premiership team during his 190-game career from 1990-99.

Sumich became a West Coast AFL star, kicking 514 goals from 150 games and the 1992 and 1994 premierships. He also played 112 games for South Fremantle, kicking 178 goals and playing in the 1997 premiership. He coached the Bulldogs in 2000 and 2001.

Worsfold was until recently South Fremantle's longest serving captain from a career that saw him play 155 games including the 1997 premiership. He also played 31 matches with the Brisbane Bears.

The selection committee comprised of Jim Christie, Richard Woodgate, John Todd, Brian Ciccotosto, Murray MacDonald, Peter Dougan and Peter Christie.

Usually if a team is bleeding 11 debutants in a season or is fielding sides with a bevy of youth they will be in a rebuilding phase, but that's not the case with South Fremantle finding the perfect mix of being successful and bringing through the next generation.

South Fremantle's league side not only managed to secure a sixth consecutive top two finish in 2021 and reach a second straight WAFL Grand Final, but did so while having a decidedly youthful team on the park and having 11 debutants along the way.

It was an interesting mix with the three debutants in Round 1 against West Perth at Fremantle Community Bank Oval. Cam McCarthy made his long-awaited debut with the Bulldogs at league level while Geelong recruit Blake Schlensog joined him along with gutsy midfielder George Wessels who was rewarded for his standout pre-season work.

The next debut came in Round 3 against Peel Thunder and it was time for emerging big man Hamish Free to lead the ruck for the first time at league level with a sign of what's to come with the retirement now of premiership star Brock Higgins.

Round 8 was the next opportunity for some new faces to get their first chance in the WAFL for South Fremantle. Three players who look capable of being staples moving forward all got their chance against the West Coast Eagles with Manfred Kelly, Toby McQuilkin and Jarrod Salmeri helping the Bulldogs to the 66-point triumph at Fremantle Community Bank Oval.

Round 12 saw another pair of exciting debutants with bright futures with Aiden Hall and Trent Newton getting their chance against Perth also at Fremantle Community Bank Oval.

A player with an immediate AFL future then burst onto the WAFL league scene in Round 15, and the way he adapted to playing in the big time showed to everyone why he will be on the biggest stages of all as early as 2022. Jesse Motlop played his first game in Round 15 against Swan Districts and never looked back.

The final debutant of the season then saw Jaxon Bellchambers rewarded for his strong form in the reserves

with a debut in Round 16 against Subiaco at Leederville Oval.

The 2021 season didn't quite turn out to be the homecoming everyone was hoping for with McCarthy returning to the Bulldogs after his 70-game AFL career at the GWS Giants and Fremantle Dockers.

Following a distinguished colts career with South Fremantle, he entered the AFL having not played a league game for the Bulldogs.

There was great excitement and anticipation surrounding his debut in Round 1 on home turf against West Perth as a result.

He couldn't quite get into the game but he was back into the team for Round 5 against Subiaco where he showed good signs with 12 possessions and a goal. He played the next two weeks as well but unfortunately that was his season done. He will always be a welcome face down at the Bulldogs though.

Schlensog arrived at the port upon recommendation from his former Geelong teammate Tim Kelly, and immediately from his debut appearance in Round 1 it was obvious he was going to be able to have a significant impact.

He settled into a role at centre half-back immediately where his intercept marking and ability to set up play from defence was superb.

Then out of necessity he was thrown forward against Claremont in Round 12, kicking a couple of goals. He went on to kick five against Peel and four against Swan Districts highlighting his versatility.

By the end of the season, he had

proven he could play equally well forward and back, he was an outstanding overhead mark and was rewarded with selection in both the WAFL State Team and WAFL Team of the Year.

Wessels was the other Round 1 debutant after returning to South Fremantle for his second crack at playing league football.

He banged down the door for a spot in the team and proved himself to be hard at it, strongly competitive and a good ball winner. He played nine games all up for the season including the preliminary and Grand Finals.

Free arrived at South Fremantle over summer to provide some support for Higgins in the ruck department, and he got the chance to carry the load in the middle in Round 3 against Peel.

He would go on to play 11 games all up in 2021 showing good signs that he is a ruckman to be banked on moving forward, including games of 52, 48, 42 and 35 hit outs.

Kelly came into 2021 on the back of winning the Prendergast Medal as the fairest and best of the reserves league-wide last year, and simply couldn't be ignored from his debut by the time Round 7 came around.

He locked down a spot in the forward-line the rest of the season where his ferocious tackling and defensive pressure became his trademark. He loved kicking a goal too and kicked 10 of them in his 17 matches, and is another of the debutants with a bright future.

Another player with plenty to look forward to is McQuilkin. He might have initially stood out for his blonde hair and long sleeves, but his football soon did the talking and

he delivered some standout defensive performances.

There was none better than his showing in the Grand Final where he locked down 144-game AFL veteran Brandon Matera in a performance that captured the eyes of everyone watching.

Salmeri earned his chance for a Round 8 debut after standout reserves form, and he played some good league football in his five appearances as well. He had 18 possessions against East Perth and should have plenty more ahead of him.

Hall, like McQuilkin, might have stood out with his look early on in his Round 12 debut, but his football soon did the talking. Showing a fearlessness that could inspire his teammates. Once in the team, he never looked back and featured in all four finals.

Newton is another who made the most of his chances as part of the defensive unit in the back end of the season. His strong final showings showed that he can be a part of the South Fremantle team for a long time to come.

Motlop was tearing it up in the colts when he got his league chance in Round 15, and immediately looked at home. The son of former AFL star Daniel, he kicked two goals on debut and would kick nine goals in his eight league appearances, including one in each of the four finals. He now has an AFL future to embark upon.

Bellchambers is another whose form in the reserves couldn't be ignored, and he got his league chance in Round 17. He had 26 possessions in his two games and there should be more chances coming his way.





THE YEAR OF BULLDOGS IN THE AFL

South Fremantle products once again were at the forefront of the AFL action during the 2021 season.

Even for the historic Grand Final played at Optus Stadium had a South Fremantle flavour to it with Tim English a key member of the Western Bulldogs team that ultimately would lose to a drought breaking Melbourne.

But all in all, nine South Fremantle products were on AFL lists during 2021 with all bar one playing at least one match.

The season started with seven players from the Bulldogs at AFL clubs. Brendon Ah Chee and Tim Kelly remained at the West Coast Eagles while Billy Frampton was with the Adelaide Crows, Callum Ah Chee the Brisbane Lions, Shai Bolton and Marlion Pickett the Richmond Tigers, and Shannon Neale at the Geelong Cats.

Then in the Mid-Season Rookie Draft, Matthew Parker was rewarded for his hard work and tremendous form upon returning to South Fremantle for the 2021 WAFL season by being selected to join Richmond immediately.

English confirmed his position as a key part of the Western Bulldogs line-up in 2022, ending up having the best and most consistent season of his AFL career.

He would end up splitting his time between playing in the ruck and as a tall target in the forward-line, going on to play 22 games for the season and kicking 19 goals.

English was part of the Bulldogs team that played in the Grand Final against Melbourne at Optus Stadium, and he has now played 69 games over the opening five seasons of his time in the AFL.

Brendon Ah Chee played some more solid AFL football in his six matches with the Eagles in 2021. He would spend the rest of his time playing with the WAFL Eagles, and has subsequently lost his place on the list after 58 AFL matches. He has committed to return to South Fremantle in 2022 and beyond.

His teammate at the Eagles, Kelly had his season cut short through injury but still played another 19 games and averaged another 23.9 disposals in the West Coast mid-field. After starting his career with Geelong where he played 48 games, has now played 37 with the Eagles and should bring up 100 in the AFL in 2022.

Frampton began his AFL career with Port Adelaide but it's now with Adelaide where he's locking down a regular position as part of the forward-line. He played a career-high 10 matches in 2021 and will look to build on that further in 2022.

Callum Ah Chee had a fine season in the defensive unit for the Brisbane Lions having settled there having originally started his AFL career with the Gold Coast Suns. Played 21 matches in 2021, a career-high, and has now played 84 across the two Queensland clubs.

Bolton continued his rise as a genuine star of the game with Richmond even if the Tigers missed out on finals. He was part of the premiership success the previous two seasons and now has cemented himself as more of a midfielder who can drift forward. Averaged 19.7 touches a game, kicked 23 goals and won the Mark of the Year for his speccie against Geelong at the MCG.


His Tigers teammate Pickett remained a regular member of the Richmond team. Playing largely on the wing, the dual premiership player added 18 matches to his career tally of 38.

Neale wasn't quite able to breakthrough for an AFL debut in his first season with Geelong but remains on their list for 2022.

Parker joined Richmond mid-season and went on to play six matches to add to the 19 he previously played at St Kilda. He has signed with the Tigers for 2022.

TALENT REPORT

As the new season approached both players and staff looked forward to a more stable and consistent year in 2021, with the challenges of 2020 still very evident as we entered the football season, 2021 produced some mixed outcomes for the SFFC Talent Pathway.

After having a couple of minor delays in the pre-season our programs settled into a regular and enthusiastic routine in preparation for the year ahead. With all Talent pathway programs back online, all roads led to a hectic but positive vibe around the club. As with any elite Talent Pathway program, desire, dedication, discipline, and a willingness to learn dictate program outcomes. For our future talent to strive to be the best they can be, our focus will continue to be to provide the best possible environment, resources and staff for young players to achieve their goals.

On a personal level, I'd like to thank our wonderful and dedicated coaching, medical, strength and conditioning, and support staff who have gone above and beyond to give our players the opportunity to perform at elite levels. From our 14s to our colts staff your efforts are appreciated and have not gone unnoticed.

14S ACADEMY

The 14s is our first 'touch point' of the SFFC Talent Academy. Whilst we know young players in this age bracket change significantly, the entry point to a WAFL talent system is a vital learning element of a young players journey. This year a 65-player squad came to together for an intense 10 week 'skill acquisition' training program in August, finishing with two practice talent Identification matches against East Fremantle. To all our academy coaches and support staff, we say thanks. For our players to develop, we need our coaches to continually grow and develop with them and under the watchful eye of our Director of Coaching Clint Gardiner and via our SFFC Coaching Academy, we believe we are not only developing

players for the future but developing a strong core of coaches to educate our players. We look forward to the progression of this young group as they move through our talent system.

15S ACADEMY

After a taste of the Talent Pathway in 2020 a determined squad of 60 players assembled in late May to continue their on-going development. Players were put through an extensive three-month training and welfare program in preparation for carnival matches held against the South West Academy and Claremont in the July school holidays. While the results of these games are irreverent it was pleasing to see the development and competitive nature of players in all facets of the program. The real highlight being seven regional based players selected into this year's academy. This current group is now preparing for a Futures program which gets underway in mid-December. Another step up in their quest to be future senior footballers at the SFFC.

UGS RAMS ACADEMY

The importance of the work being done in our regional zone cannot be underestimated. The challenges of bringing our regional talent to the city remain a high priority to give our future male and female talent every opportunity to represent the SFFC.

This year an enhanced working partnership with the Stephen Michael Foundation had the UGS Rams Academy reaching new heights. Led by highly experienced Academy coaches Liam Anthony and Tony Micale in conjunction with the wonderful ground work of Wheatbelt Regional Development Manager Paul Reid, saw over 55 young male and female athletes and local coaches exposed to a four month specialised training program, which culminated in the senior UGS Rams finishing a very competitive third in their annual Kulin Carnival and a number of Junior UGS Rams participating in the July school

holiday metropolitan 15s regional carnival. At the time of writing our current working group is looking to implement similar for our Gascoyne region.

FUTURES PROGRAM

With no 15s program in 2020 due to health restrictions the Futures program kicked off in December 2020 with a larger than usual training squad. Head Coach Dom Foster and his coaching staff had the challenging job of bringing a squad of 60 down to 40 players ready to perform in a six-match program in late February. While a 2-4 result might not seem like a good return for effort our players and staff can be extremely proud of their overall performance. A strong second half against a highly talented West Perth in Round 4 was the turning point for this group. 'A strong self-belief' within the squad carried over into Rounds 5 and 6 with strong wins over Claremont and Peel respectively. A special mention must be made of Ashton Ferreira and Ruben Hawksley who both made their debut in the Colts program in 2021. We look forward to seeing several of our 2021 Futures boys graduate into our Colts ranks in 2022.

To Coach Dom Foster, assistants Cory Dell'Olio, Jarrod Parry, Dene White, Fabian Dawson and Cameron Dawe thank you for your tireless efforts to get the boys up each week. Dylan Hutchins (Strength and Conditioning Coach) and Ajla Bosnjak (Head Trainer) your work and time given to this program is very appreciated. Of course, we can't go past our wonderful Team Manager Leon 'Pops' Flanagan who is an integral part of the SFFC Futures 'fabric' an absolute legend who keeps us all in check.

COLTS PROGRAM

To be able get our program underway as planned was a relief to all involved. We entered 2021 quite 'bullish' on what this group could achieve. With an up-and-coming talented group of 'underage' players mixed with a blend of experienced squad members we hit the ground running with an excellent start to the year winning four of our first six games. From here our group were mentally and physically challenged and our results reflected this shift in momentum. Every team goes through challenges during a season, either losing players through injury, state duty or being promoted up to play at higher levels. We never use this as an excuse for underperforming. It did however allow us to test the depth of our playing group. We had 53 players used (83 per cent) of our squad, 30 squad members playing their first game in 2021. Nine Colts players being promoted to senior football in 2021. With two players Jesse Motlop and Aiden Hall (both Colts aged boys) playing regular League football culminating in both being selected to play in the 2021 WAFL Grand Final.

In summary our group were good enough to play finals football this year. Part of any young players' journey is to continue learn as you go. Unfortunately, our squad fell just short of the finals, thus missing a valuable learning experience.

To all our wonderful Colts staff a huge collective thanks, it has been a pleasure to watch you all go about your business of providing our young stars the best environment to perform.

All our programs work particularly well and we are working hard behind the scenes to test their performance through an extensive evaluation process that is under way.

A challenge we do have is getting the required funding from schools as their budgets are lean. However, we are currently devising a new model that will see some a tripartite arrangement with the school, Department of Education and a private sponsor.

A big thanks to the Program Sub-Committee chaired by Gordon Gatti, Colleen Hayward and in particular Liam Anthony and Andrew McCarrey who managed the program delivery with their teams.

BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT

The ability to raise funds during this period has also been challenging but I am pleased to say we have managed very well. Our funding streams are dominated by grant funding but we are working hard to even this distribution into areas such as private donors, sponsors and fees for service.

The team are also focused on understanding the true costs of our programs and we are pricing them based on this. As we were establishing ourselves we were doing some of the programs for 'love' but this has now shifted as we have built a strong reputation and following.

A big thanks to the Business Development Sub-Committee of Damien Eves, Des Headland, Gavin Jahn, Ash Dawson, and in particular Julie Jackson who worked tirelessly on the grant delivery.

FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

The SMF is now performing very well in this space thanks to the efforts of Ash Dawson who has been outstanding in her Board role. Our policies and pro-

cedures are in great shape and the focus we have on ensuring our cashflow is well managed is in my opinion, better than most successful businesses.

We do have some challenges from time-to-time matching grant funding with staff numbers which is not unusual for the not-for-profit space. However, we are excited by the good financial position that we are currently in that will ensure our sustainability for years to come.

STAFF PERFORMANCE

The SMF has grown significantly over the past twelve months with staff numbers growing to around 25 with most staff being part-time. We have a diverse staff cohort in age, background and skillset.

Our Senior Leadership Team meets fortnightly to cover operational issues, team cohesion and spend some time on leadership skills development. It is fair to say leading people is not easy and requires continuous improvement and focus. I'd like to take this time to thank our Senior Leadership team of Liam Anthony, Julie Jackson, Andrew McCarrey and Tony Micale for their continued passion and commitment to drive our organisation further.

SUMMARY

While we continue to experience some growing pains that you would expect from any organization that has grown at the pace of change, overall we are extremely happy about the position that we are in and excited by what the future holds. The opportunities for the SMF are endless, our aim will be to make sure we pick the right ones that can deliver on our goals.

Our staff are our greatest asset, and I could not be

REMEMBER WITH PRIDE - OBITUARIES

It is with sincere and deep regret that since our last Annual General Meeting we record that the following former Players, Life Members, Life Time Members and Supporters are known to have passed away.

ROBERT JOHN BRACEWELL – Died November 18, 2020. A Fremantle identity who married into our well known Gabrielson/Richardson/McGuinness clan, and who cared for his late wife, Valma for many years.

LEO EDWARD MANSER – Died aged 98 on November 19, 2020. Lived a long and fruitful life and current director, Hayley is a member of the Manser family.

STEVEN KENT 'NIPPER' CRONAN – Died in Bali on November 19, 2020. Well known Fremantle identity and sportsman, who represented South Fremantle at reserves level and a brother of 1980 premiership player Phil (Cap 1048).

GARRY DAVIDSON – Died suddenly in Tasmania on November 26, 2020 aged 66. Football Operations Manager from 2012 to 2014 and enjoyed a rich football history, playing 30 games for Geelong and 10 for Richmond. He coached premiership sides, Glenorchy in 1983, and North Hobart in 1987 and 1989. Member of Tasmanian Hall of Fame.

IAN MCNEIL DARROCH (CAP 882) – Died December 12, 2020 after a prolonged battle with cancer. Played four league games in 1965 and member of a highly regarded South Fremantle family including brother in law Lindsay Hurst. Son Brett played for a number of years reaching reserves level and Ian was an active participant in the Past Players & Officials Association.

PATRICK FRANCIS DALY (CAP 760) – Died December 28, 2020. Played 124 league games (1953-60), 1954 premiership player, State representative on seven occasions, assistant coach and awarded Life Time Membership in 2006. Alongside Tony Parentich and Johnny Colgan formed South Fremantle's devastating centre-line of the 1950s.

SUE ZUKS-BAKER – Died early January 2021. Husband Nik has been a great benefactor to South Fremantle.

NEIL WILLIAM 'MICK' REED – Died January 17, 2021. Great South Fremantle man who helped in so many ways including having Tambellup recruit Bruce Williams (Cap 795) living with his family, and as member of WA Police Force.

NEIL DONALD BOLTON (CAP 871) – Died January 30, 2021. Played three league games in 1964 and was a strong South Fremantle man. Director from 1990-93. Son Nick (Cap 1193) played 52 league games.

CHRISTOPHER MATTHEW MARTINOVICH – Died February 15, 2021. Father Kris and brothers Ted and Ivan assisted club as chiropractors. Chiropractor and member of medical team for 46 years from 1965-2011, rewarded with Life Membership in 1983 and inducted into South Fremantle Hall of Fame in 2015. Without the professional care and services provided by Chris, plenty of players would have missed many more games, or had much shorter careers.

GLAD WAYNE – Died February 21, 2021. Wonderful South Fremantle supporter and volunteer who assisted the office with the "mail out" of the newsletter and her red and white uniforms were a constant at all home games.

STANLEY WALTER LEBECK – Died March 11, 2021. Son Damien (Cap 1169) played 17 games between 1989-91.

NEIL HERBERT BOLT – Died March 17, 2021. Son Gavin (Cap 1120) played one game in 1986.

RONALD ARTHUR 'TIGER' PAGE – Died March 22, 2021. Son Michael (Cap 1071) played eight games in 1981-82.

DONALD ROY DIXON (CAP 708) – Died April 16, 2021. Father Norm (Cap 399) played 98 games and son, Don Jnr (Cap 988) played 15 games making three generations of Dixons playing at senior level. A 'Golden Boy' playing in 1950, 1952, 1953 and 1954 premierships, a State representative twice, played 134 games, awarded Life Membership and inducted into South Fremantle Hall of Fame.

GLADYS NOEL SNARY – Died May 10, 2021. True South Fremantle identity, lifelong and steadfast supporter who loved and enjoyed the company of

all supporters at our game day afternoon teas. Sister Norma awarded Life Time membership in 2003.

ELIZABETH 'BETTY' CORNELL – Died May 18, 2021. Mother of 1980 premiership player Kevin (Cap 1024), and Graham who played colts and reserves before being big part in Warriors program. Grandson Mitch (Cap 1341) was a premiership player in 2005.

DIANNE ELIZABETH MCKAY – Died suddenly on May 19, 2021. Husband Joe (Cap 989) was one of South Fremantle's greatest playing 169 games and winning Walker Medal in 1976, playing in 1980 premiership and was made Life Member. Represented WA 11 times and an inaugural inductee into the club's Hall of Fame.

SHANE MICHAEL ANTHONY – Died May 29, 2021. Father of Liam, Stephen Michael Foundation employee, and former East Fremantle and North Melbourne player.

JOHN DOUGLAS MCCARTHY – Died May 2021. Father of Stephen, 24-year employee of the club.

MLADEN SAMBRAILO – Died June 16, 2021. Master boat builder whose sons, Mark (Cap 1105) and Matt (Cap 1122), played 65 games between them in the 1980s.

MAUREEN DUFFIELD (NEE HUGHES) – Died July 12, 2021. Daughter of former President and Life Member WJ Hughes Snr, sister of former President Bill Hughes Jnr and our Patron/Number 1 Ticket Holder Eileen Bond.

NOEL PATRICK BRYAN – Died June 28, 2021. True South Fremantle man and former member of Committee of Management in premiership year of 1970.

IRENE EDWARDS OAM – Died July 29, 2021. Grandmother of current staff member Kahlan Woods and 2020 premiership player Jarrad Doney.

JOHN LEWIS 'JACK' EDWARDS – Died August 13, 2021. Wonderful South Fremantle man, never missing a home game until recently. On many occasions recited "The Ode" at ANZAC Day games. Brother Sir Hughie Edwards VC, DSO, DFC (Cap 495) was Governor of WA in 1974-75, and played seven games in 1934.

KEVIN MILLER (CAP 852) – Died August 13, 2021. Played 102 games between 1963-69, was winner of Walker Medal in 1965 and a wonderful natural-gifted sportsman. Became a successful premiership playing captain/coach at Tammin and Beverley Football Clubs.

JOHN FRANCIS 'JACK' SPOWART (CAP 817) – Died mid-August 2021. Played three league games in 1959 and was captain of reserves. Later played in Meckering and Geraldton.

NORMA SNARY – Aged 94, died August 27, 2021 less than four months after losing sister Noel. Lifelong and steadfast lover of South Fremantle and inaugural Life Time Member. The Snary sisters will be missed especially at home games and at our game day afternoon teas.

PETER GEORGE AMARANTI (CAP 750) – Aged 88, died September 20, 2021. Wonderful player in reserves premiership sides of 1952, 1953 and 1954. Won reserves fairest and best in 1952 and 1954 while playing 12 league games. Moved to Subiaco and won fairest and best in first year, playing 169 games. After retiring, was active Past Player and sponsored club through his Engineering Company.

PETER MAXWELL SAVELL – Aged 84, died September 24, 2021. Long-time member and supporter who was team manager of reserves in early 1970s.

RAYMOND JOHN 'LIZARD' RICHARDS (CAP 736) – Aged 90, died October 28, 2021. Played 148 quality games between 1951-58, premiership player in 1952 and 1954, captain in 1958 and represented WA 13 times. Captain/Coach of Claremont in 1959 and 1960 taking his total to 195 WAFL games. Made Life Member in 1967, inaugural inductee in club's Hall of Fame and inducted to WA Football Hall of Fame. One of South Fremantle's great full backs, also gave time on Committee of Management, as selector, training staff and in Past Players & Officials Association.



RESERVES WOMEN'S REPORT

My 2021 season with the South Fremantle Senior Women's program was vastly different in all aspects when compared to that of the 2020 season. Although subject to some minor restrictions and lockdowns, season 2021 did not have as many of the distractions.

The pre-season training sessions commenced in November with an inclusion of a group of players new to the club for a season that commenced on February 21. The training program progressed very well, and the main emphasis was on working as hard as we could on both fitness and skills to ensure that we were able to get the 2021 season off to a good competitive start.

The reserves had a 15-week fixture that included 12 games with three byes. The results were four wins, which were won in the first eight games of the season, and eight losses. This does not appear to be or even reflect what would be considered a successful outcome for the year but the contributions and efforts by the players on game days could never be questioned. They continued to have that never give up attitude and commitment regardless of the circumstances which was often against some stronger and more skilful teams.

My main aim at the beginning of the season was to purely assist with player development but also to set up a platform on the basis that all players must strive and be capable of playing league football. This platform was a combination of some very senior and experienced players from within the club together with some relatively new players with experience and some younger players from the 2020 Rogers Cup group.

Although there was improvement in both fitness and skill levels when compared to 2020 there was unfortunately a significant number of injuries sustained in both the league and reserves squads that had a very large impact on the season outcome. Basically, from the latter part to the end of the season many significant contact injuries were sustained including knees, ankles, shoulders, fingers, and concussions which were considered to be season ending injuries.

It should be noted that approximately 45 girls played reserves football in 2021 which we knew was not going to be easy, but many thanks go out to all those girls who did play for your persistence and commitment for the 12 games was outstanding. All players played their part to the best of their ability which was usually against some more experienced and skilful teams. The composition of the team changed quite regularly and was generally made up of senior players, girls playing their first year of football, players coming back from injury, some playing up from our Rogers Cup team, players from the club's regional zones and although not ideal others made themselves available from other competitions to ensure that we had a full team on the ground each week.

Some memorable moments for the season were as follows:

- **Round 4:** lost to Peel (Premiers) by 30 points after being 60 points behind at three quarter-time. Our inside 50s for the last quarter were 16 to nil.

- **Round 5:** We beat East Fremantle by nine points a game which we were not expected to win. Chae Salbie playing her 200th game.

- **Round 7:** lost to Swan Districts by seven points where they kicked a goal in the last two minutes. We played the game with only one interchange player.

- **Round 8:** Shakira Pickett kicking four goals against Subiaco.

As usual you generally get overwhelmed with the support that you receive from people and the many volunteers who assist in so many ways during the year and again season 2021 was no exception.

*From a club's perspective a very special thank you to everyone involved and in particular Bruce Willis and his fellow members of the Board of Management, the office staff, staff with the Stephen Michael Foundation making the necessary arrangements for the girls to come up from the Upper Great Southern regional zones and the club's trainers and medical staff assisting wherever possible during the week prior to game day etc.

***Beau McDonald** - the Head Coach of the Senior Women's program again for his help and assistance in setting up the weekly training sessions and the many hours at the selection table on a Wednesday night. Season 2021 still brought some difficult times during the year due to the large number of player injuries to ensure that we had two competitive sides available for each game. The amount of time and effort put in by Beau was over and above expectations and was well appreciated by everyone involved.

***Marty Atkins** - No one will really know about the many phone calls and emails that went into his assistance in helping with the planning for both the league and reserves team which included liaising with the regional zones, players and in some cases their parents to ensure that everyone was available. The program was easier to manage due to his efforts and organisation.

***Andrew McCarrey and Adrian Ivancich** - Assistant coaches for their support, assistance, and encouragement during the season.

***Jenelle Heard** - not only as an assistant league coach but our forward-line coach. Her valuable experience and knowledge was much appreciated by all the girls playing reserves.

***Malira Cocking and Kelly Chalmers** - for their unrelenting assistance and support as our team managers throughout the season was outstanding.

– **Best Clubman: Tahlia McRoberts** – there was not a job that she didn't put hand up to help with wherever she could and that included being a team runner, running water, scoreboard attendant etc.

I trust and hope that I have not forgotten anyone who helped this season but thank you so much to everyone for your help and assistance it was very much appreciated not only by myself but also all the players.


We can now look forward to season 2022 which no doubt will bring us some more challenges.

We entered the 2021 season in the knowledge that several players from the 2020 Rogers Cup squad would be moving into the senior squad. With this in mind, the objectives were to:

1. IDENTIFY NEW TALENT, FORM A WHOLE NEW SQUAD AND TEAM, BLENDING OLD AND NEW

- Noa McNaughton being recognised by winning WAFLW awards (Fairest and Best, Rising Star)

4. REMAIN COMPETITIVE

- We won 11 of 15 games, drew one and lost three
- We played in three finals, winning the preliminary final
- We played in the Grand Final for a second consecutive season

5. ENSURE THAT ENJOYMENT OF THE GAME WAS NOT DIMINISHED

- Training attendance, engagement, Zoom meetings, general banter, new friendships, direct feedback from players and parents
